Inchon, Korea — A 34-year-old mission pastor here claims he has discovered the eighth wonder of the world his tireless, energetic, 72-year-old curate.

"LAST SUNDAY evening, after a full day of mission work, I was exhausted," reports Father Thomas McKee, M.M., of Tulsa, Okla., "until my white-haired curate, Father John Morris, stepped sprightly into the rectory and nonchalantly announced that he had celebrated and preached at three Masses, baptized 19 infants, heard over 100 confessions, and driven 20 miles in a Jeep over rugged country roads.

"Instead of collapsing into a soft chair next to me, he told me to 'relax' while he popped over to the church to lead the parish Rosary and give Benediction. With him around, I think twice now before complaining of being tired."
