

# School Cost Estimated Upwards OF \$400,000

Corning — The St. Patrick's Parochial School, now under construction near the church on Denison Pkwy., represents a project of "well over \$400,000," the Rev.

William Tobin, parish administrator, explained last week in a public statement to the press. "This means that each family in the parish will have to contribute about \$1,000," it was stated.

Cost of maintenance, he said, will be in addition to this.

**DETAILS OF** cost figures were supplied by the Rev. Father Tobin, who explained that "Many of our people are under the misapprehension that we are building the school for \$249,000."

The cost breaks down as follows, he said: general contract, \$249,750; plumbing and heating contract, \$51,238; electrical contract, \$25,568; architect's fees, \$19,500; site for new school \$35,000; insurance and bond, \$1,600; total, \$382,714.

"These figures do not include the furnishings nor the cost of tearing down our present school, which we believe will bring the figure well over \$400,000 in all," Father Tobin said. "In addition we are paying five per cent interest on the money we borrow."

**"THERE ARE** about 400 families in St. Patrick's Parish, which means that each family on the average will have to contribute about \$1,000, and this is only for preparing and constructing the school. The cost of maintenance is another item that is not to be overlooked.

"In our campaign for funds

for our new school, \$200,000 was pledged over a period of three years. At the end of the first year about \$70,000 has been received."

Construction of the building on Denison Pkwy. is about two-thirds complete, according to the holder of the general contract, Smith, Langhans & McLaughlin Construction Corp. It is expected to be completed by August 10 for occupancy in September.
