

Power Hitters

There is a pretty fair chance that a home run record will fall this season. Wrigley Field, with fences built to power hitters' delight, has been lambasted for an average of three homers a game. The pre-season prediction that records would fall there has thus far proved true.

In 1959, 200 balls were hit out of Detroit's Briggs Stadium. In 1957, 219 homers were socked in Cincinnati. Both are league records and should be in jeopardy come September.

THE ANGELS thought about erecting screens to keep some of the drives in play, but decided against it figuring that they had as much power as any other team could offer.

The usual controversy arose as soon as the Dodgers traded outfielder Don Demeter and infielder Charlie Smith to the Phils for Dick Farrell, a hard-throwing relief pitcher and Joe Koppe, an infielder.

The Phils figure Demeter is a fine fielding centerfielder and hope he can contribute 20 homers to their cause. Smith, a youngster, has good power and will be expected to fill the gap at the corner slot or possibly short-stop.

In Dick Farrell, the Dodgers acquired additional bullpen strength. The 27-year-old Farrell was 10-6 with the Phils last season and was credited with fifteen saves. There is no telling what he will do with a club like the Dodgers. Koppe is to be shipped to the minors.

Chicago Drafts

New Team

Eight players were drafted from National Basketball Association teams by the new Chicago entry.

THE GROUP consists of Gene Conley (Boston), Dave Pionick (St. Louis), Arch Dees (Detroit), Bob Leonard (Los Angeles), Frank Budd (New York), Ralph Davis (Cincinnati), Andy Johnson (Philadelphia), and Barney Cable (Syracuse). Dees is the tallest of the draftees at 6 feet 9 inches while Conley and Leonard are the most experienced.

Chicago paid \$25,000 each for the eight draftees. The team will begin competition next Fall.

Each NBA team was allowed to protect seven players and Chicago was allowed to pick any of the remaining players on each roster. Only one player could be drafted from each team.

BOSTONIAN Tom McNeely, an ex-Michigan State football tackle, has joined the list of candidates for a September bout with Champion Floyd Patterson. The unbeaten McNeely has shown plenty of power in demolishing his foes. Paul Pender is hoping to get a match with Gene Fullmer, the NBA middleweight champ. Luck of the Irish? Washington's Dick Donovan lost his first four starts this year. All four were defeats by one run and in none last season and was credited with more than four runs. His earned run average through this "tryout" period was 2.75. Who is the righthanded power hitter that is going to replace Jackie Jensen? The National CDA Sunday, May 7, was observed with a Mass at 7 a.m. for deceased members of the Court.

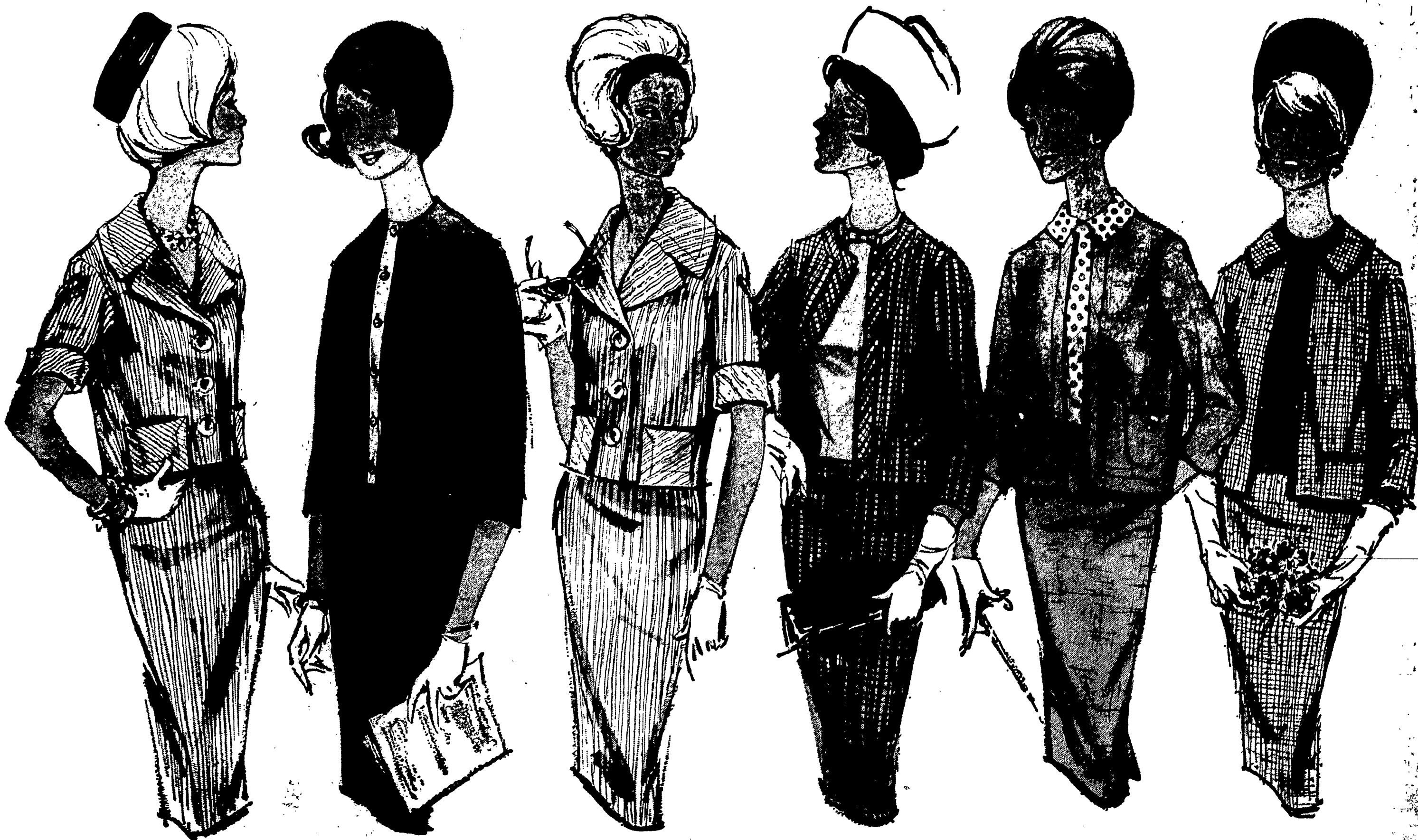
Honored At D'Youville
