THE GROUP, although not new in the United States is the first to be organized in the City of Rochester. The Ladies of Charity of Elmira's Catholic Family Service has a distinguished record of activity.

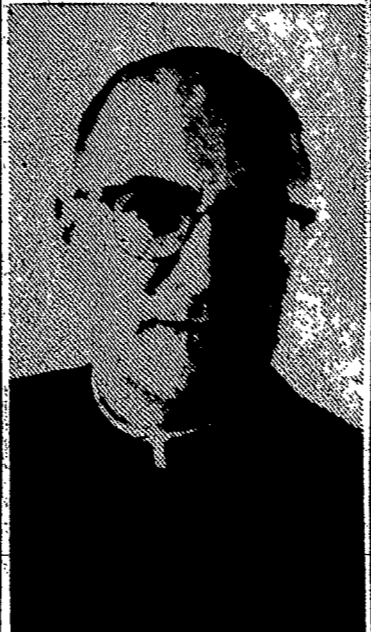

DINNER WILL be served at 7 p.m. Monday, May 22, in the school auditorium.

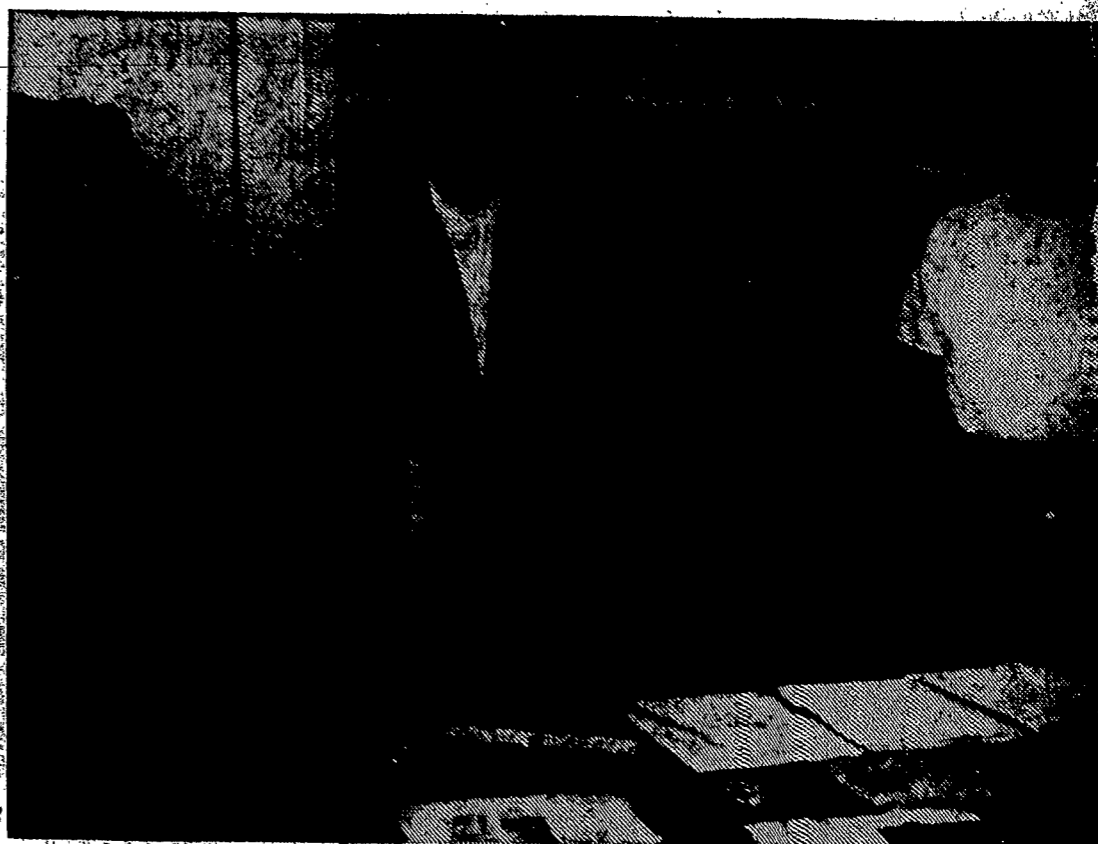
The committee has decided on a special theme in commemoration of the founding of Sacred Heart Parish by Rt. Rev. Msgr. George V. Burns just 50 years ago.

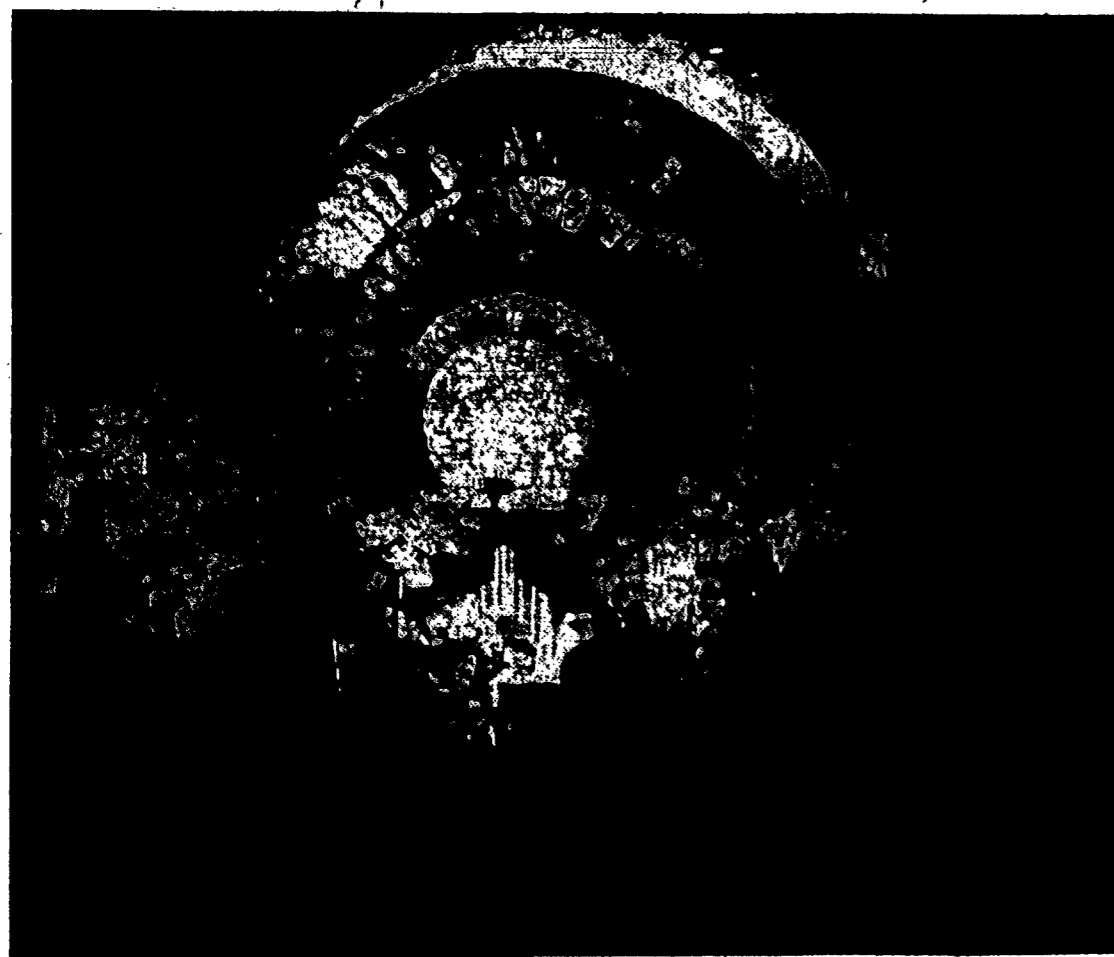
