As head of the education department of the National Catholic Welfare Council,

Monsignor Hochwalt is one of President Kennedy's leading antagonists on the school-aid issue. He concedes that his mail would indicate that many Catholics think the hierarchy is embarrassing the President.

According to a current Look Magazine article, Monsignor Hochwalt received a phone call after his TV appearance from a Democratic committeewoman in Dayton, Ohio, who "knew I was for Nixon."

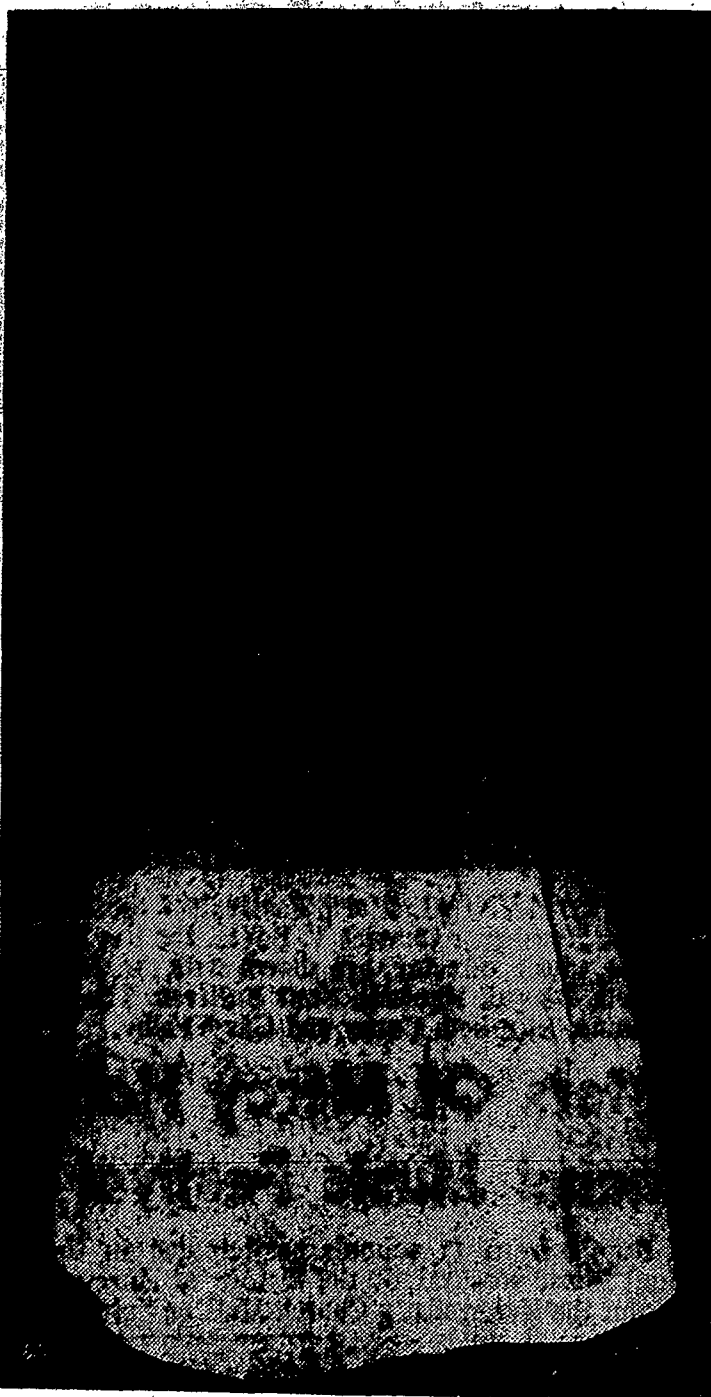
