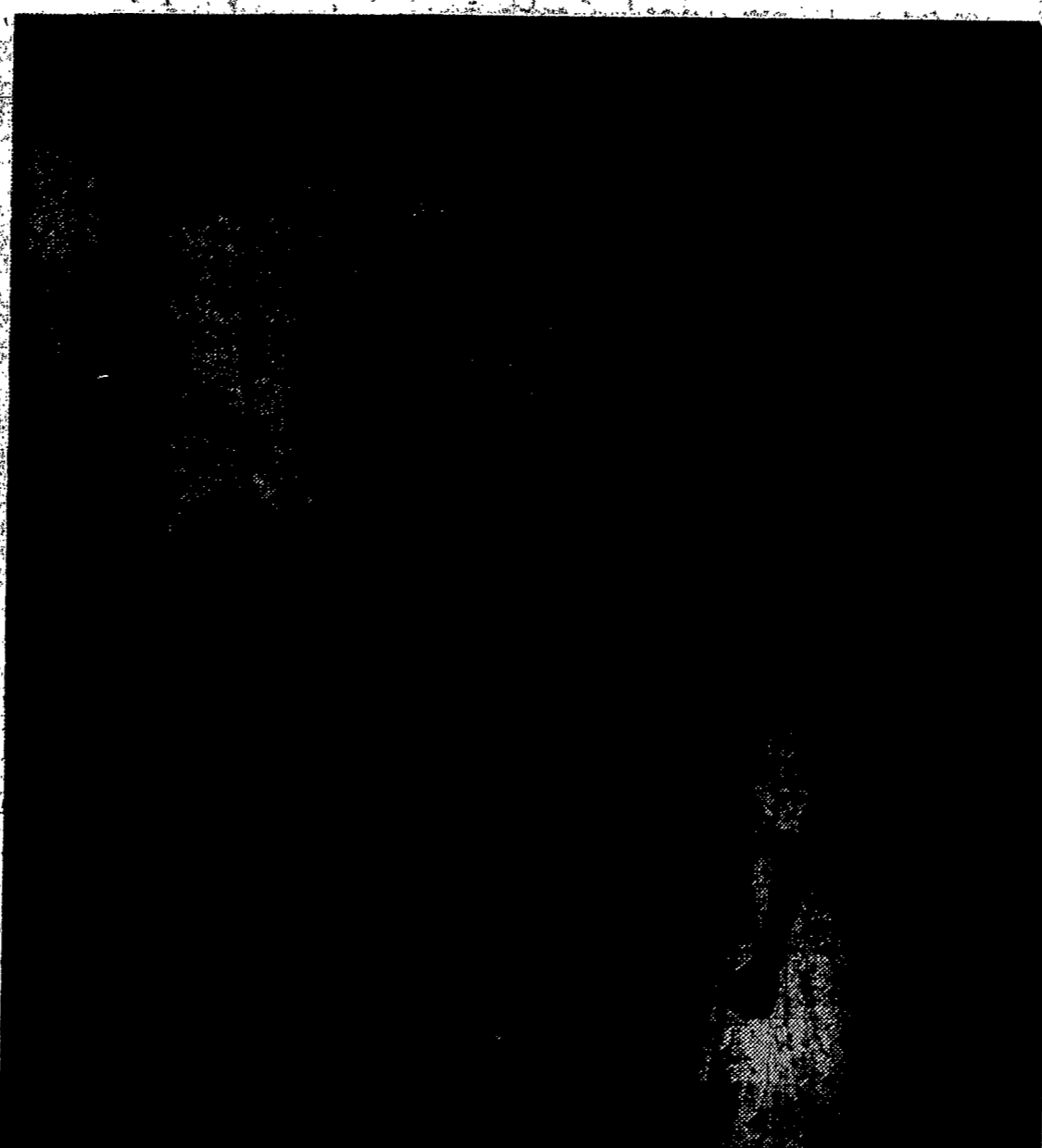
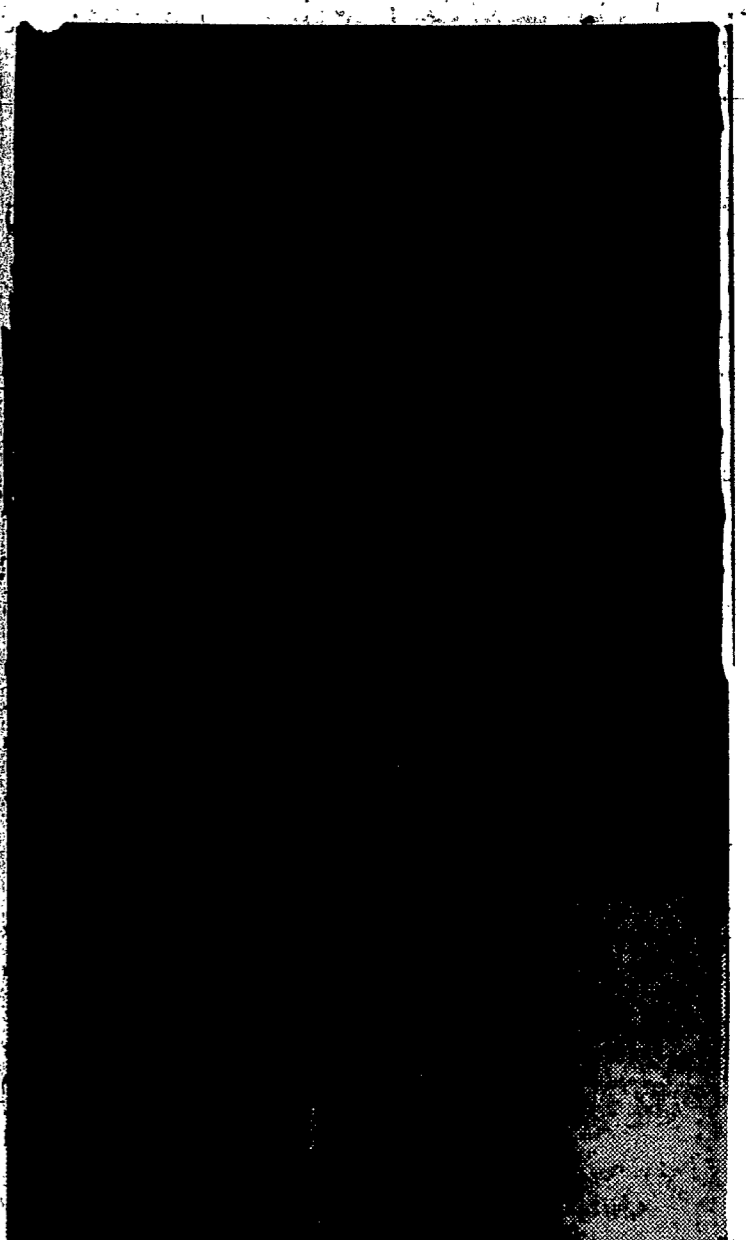




Rochester students Pauline Basamania, Diane Sciscioli and Irene Mignano prepare some of their work for the art exhibit.

"No amount of help is too small when the need is so great," chorused Dan and Margaret Whalen, husband and wife lay missionary team, on a recent visit to the Courier-Journal office.

THE EAST AVON couple, who both speak fluent Spanish, spend four months each winter aiding the sick and poor in Mexico. Together with Dr. Almaguer Chapa, the Whalens founded the Blessed Martin de Porres Dispensary this past winter where the needy, mostly of Indian blood, are invited for medical aid, food, clothing, and help in procuring jobs.

Located in Monterrey, the dispensary treated some 500 patients last February and March. All received free tuberculosis medication, a chief killer of
