

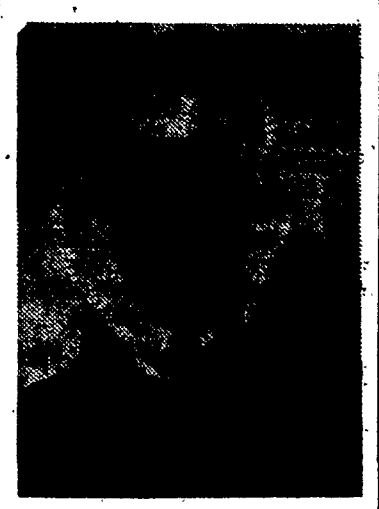
# First Eastern Rite Nun

Mother Sadie Nesser, formerly of 148 Vermont St., Rochester, will make perpetual vows in the Congregation of Our Lady of the Retreat in the Cenacle on May 31 in the Generalate House of the Cenacle at Rome, Italy.

Mother Nesser is of the Maronite Rite of the Eastern Catholic Church, but attended St. Nicholas Melchite Church and was active in the Youth Club of St. Nicholas Society. Before

entering the Cenacle on March 11, 1953, she was working as Receptionist in the County of Monroe Tax Foreclosure Office.

**HER PARENTS**, George and Turkmane Nesser are both deceased. Her sisters Mary, Idell and Rosaline, and her brothers Joseph, Peter and Thomas Nesser are all residents of Rochester.

After her First Vows in the Cenacle Novitiate House of Lake Ronkonkoma, Long Island on September 15, 1955, Mother Nesser was assigned to the Cenacle of Boston, Mass. A second assignment sent her back to

Long Island where she remained until leaving for her Tertianship, or third period of probation and spiritual formation, which began on October 15 of last year.

Of the 19 pronouncing their Final Vows on May 31 there are a number of Americans, one of whom, Mother Rita Kirby, was stationed at the Rochester Cenacle for a time. Officers in the group are from Cenacles of France, Holland, Brazil, England and Madagascar. Cardinal Marella will preside at the Ceremony.

**MOTHER NESSER**, with a portion of the other Tertians, will remain in Rome to assist in carrying on the works of the House until she is replaced by the new group of Tertians in the Fall. Then she will be assigned to one of the eleven Retreat Houses of the Eastern Province of the Congregation of Our Lady of the Cenacle.

This Province, under the direction of the Provincial Superior, Reverend Mother Gertrude Coleman, extends from Toronto, Canada, to Florida, and includes the two Cenacles of New Zealand which were founded, and are still largely staffed by American Religious of the Eastern Province, a number of whom have been members of the Community of the Cenacle Retreat House on East Avenue.

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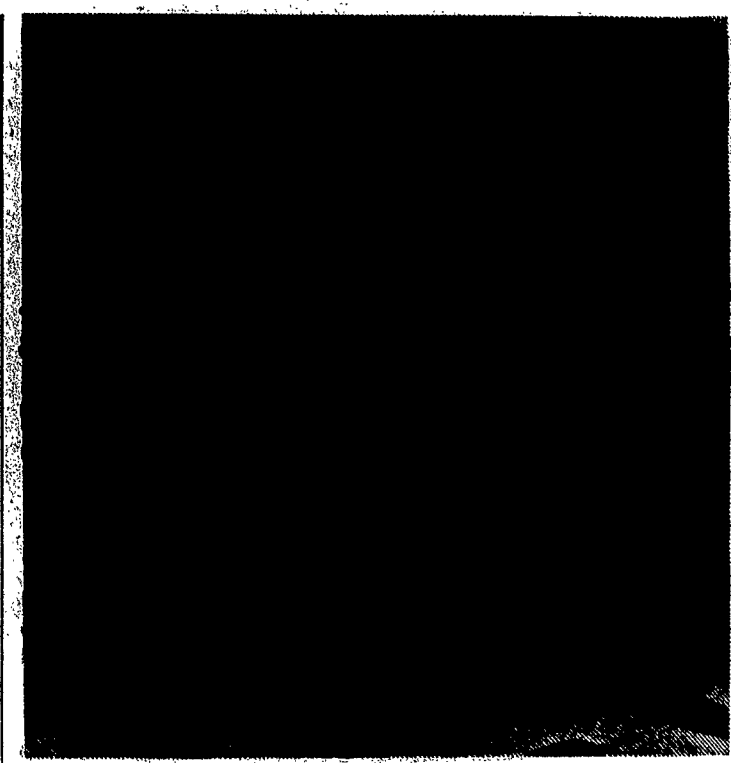

## Catholic Daughters Hear Talk At Breakfast

Seneca Falls — Catholic Daughters of America observed National Communion Sunday in St. Patrick's Church. A breakfast was served at the Hotel Gould where Rev. John P. O'Beirne addressed the group. Mary Barci, grand regent, welcomed the members and their guests and Clara Manzari entertained with piano selections.

Guest speaker was Robert P. Kennedy, assistant district attorney of Ontario County, whose topic covered the current trend in thinking "You can do anything as long as you don't get caught" with the resultant moral and physical effects.

He advised that the Natural Law is, in fact, the Law of God as written in the Ten Commandments and he analyzed each commandment as it pertains to the Law of the Land. He cited the increasingly large percentage of youthful offenders, not so large in rural areas, and stressed the great responsibility of parents and all agencies charged with the protection and guidance of youth; that character is formed in the earliest years before the school and teachers take over.

He urged that infractions of the law be not upheld but that youthful offenders be prudently corrected and not deserted by family and friends when they get into trouble. He noted the fact that newspapers, TV, and movies flaunt the immoral, adulterous living of their stars as ideals and patterns of living and particular guidance is needed.

In conclusion he advocated Christian living for everyone and the remembrance in prayer and good works of the Faithful Departed that they may be the Jury to decide our fate when the day of trial comes before the Great Judge from whom nothing is hidden and that the sentence may be a favorable one.
