

Bishop Dedicates Corning School

Corning—Upwards of 1,000 people, including 25 clergymen and 62 nuns from the diocese, attended ceremonies last Sunday afternoon at which Bishop Kearney dedicated the new St. Mary's School.

St. Mary's School will not content itself with teaching only the basic skills, but will seek also to give its pupils an understanding of the importance of religion, reverence and refinement, Bishop Kearney said as he dedicated the new school.

Bishop Kearney told the group that the "three R's" have become "six R's" today. And the conception of the original three "R's" should be expanded. Reading he said should include the understanding of good literature. Writing should provide the ability to express one's self. And arithmetic should be thought of as the key to an understanding of science.

But the school would not be doing its duty to its pupils, the Bishop declared, if it failed to teach them the importance of religion, reverence, and refinement.

BISHOP KEARNEY blessed the school and the crucifix which was placed in the hall. The Shrine of the Blessed Mother was brought from the old school and established in the new building.

After the service the clergy present were guests of the pastor, the Rev. Thomas F. Brennan, at dinner.

Among the persons attending were Sister Mary Elizabeth, a retired teacher at St. Mary's and now of the Mother House in Rochester, and the following former St. Mary's principals: Sister Mary Gregory, Sister Mary Suzanne, and Sister Mary

Rita. The present principal is Sister Mary Adolphine.

Also present were Sister Mary Magdalene, mother general, and Sister Mary Bride, assistant to the mother general, both of Rochester.

The school building project, which began in 1958, has provided a renovation of the north wing and construction of a new building on the site of the old south wing. The school was opened for classes last September.

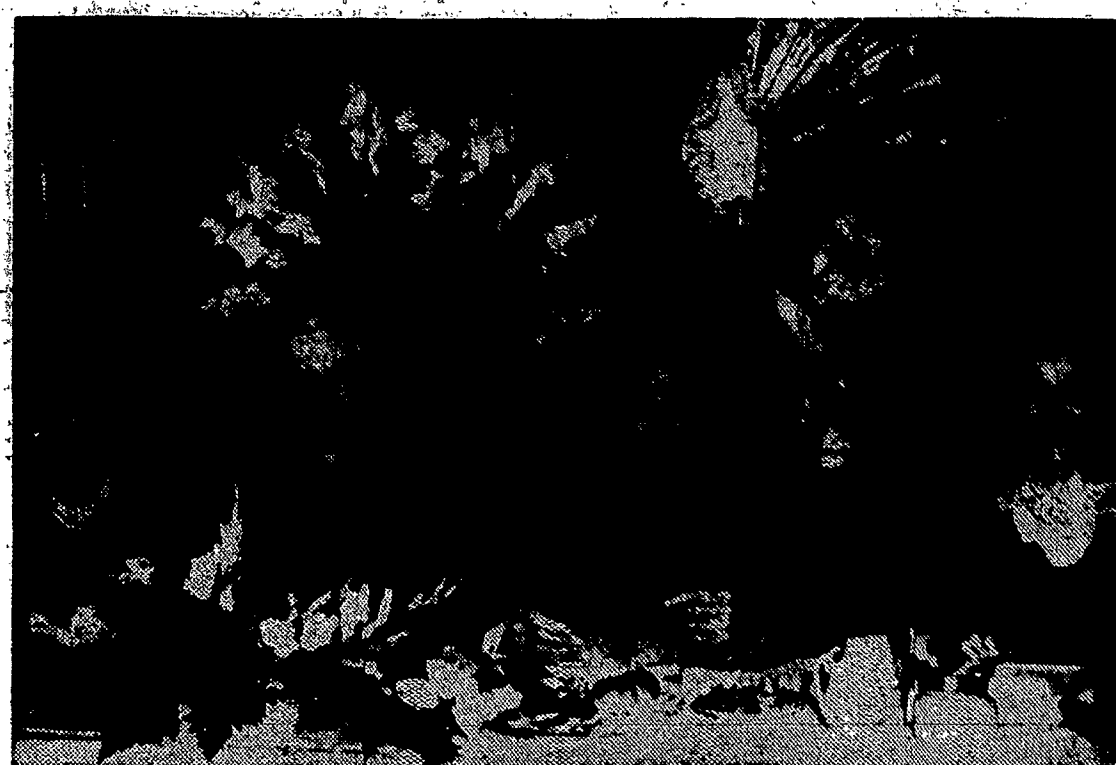
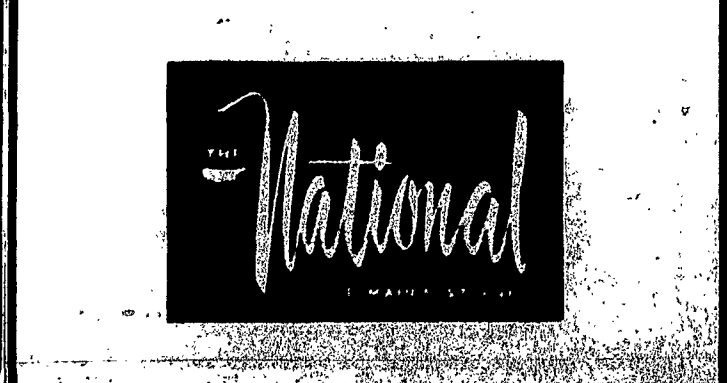

The new St. Mary's School and auditorium in Bath will be dedicated Friday, May 26, by Bishop Casey according to the Rev. John P. O'Malley, pastor.

THE BUILDING was begun at a groundbreaking July 17, 1960, and the hall was first occupied March 17 for a St. Patrick's Day dinner. The school was occupied March 27. Temporarily, the school was conducted in an abandoned hospital.

At present only kindergarten, first and second grades are in operation. Third and fourth grades will be added next fall, raising registration to 200. 92 per cent of Bath's school-age Catholic population.
