Bishop Huwiler, a member of the White Fathers Order, was born in the Alpine village of Buttwil near here.

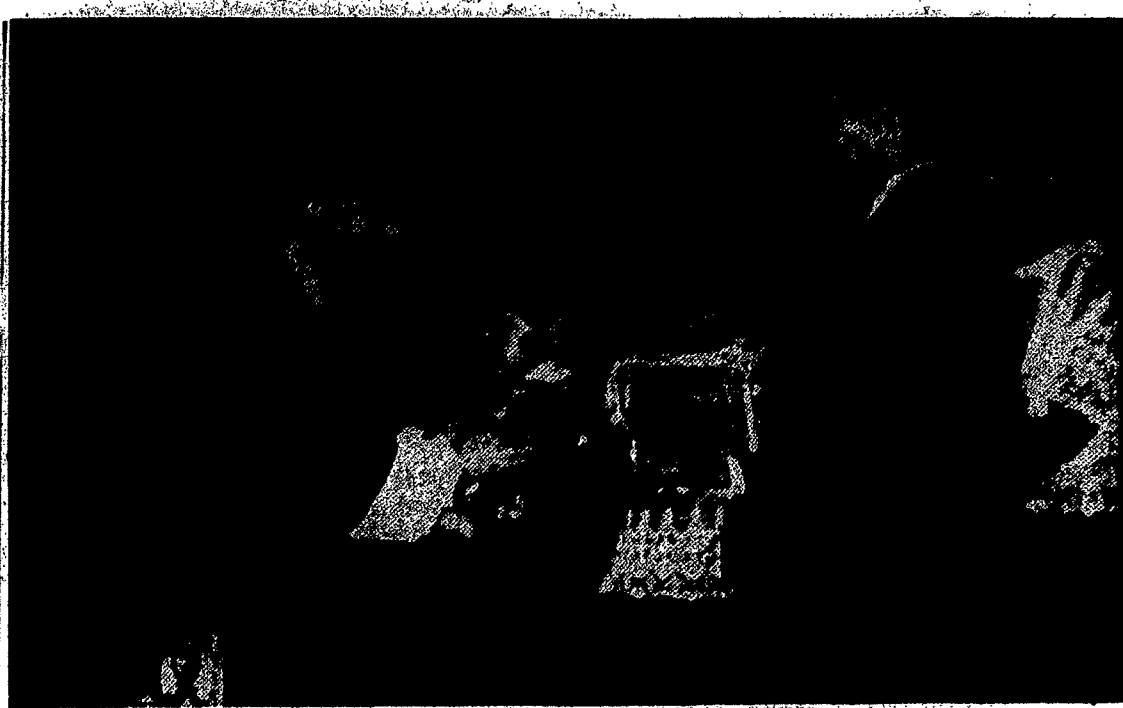
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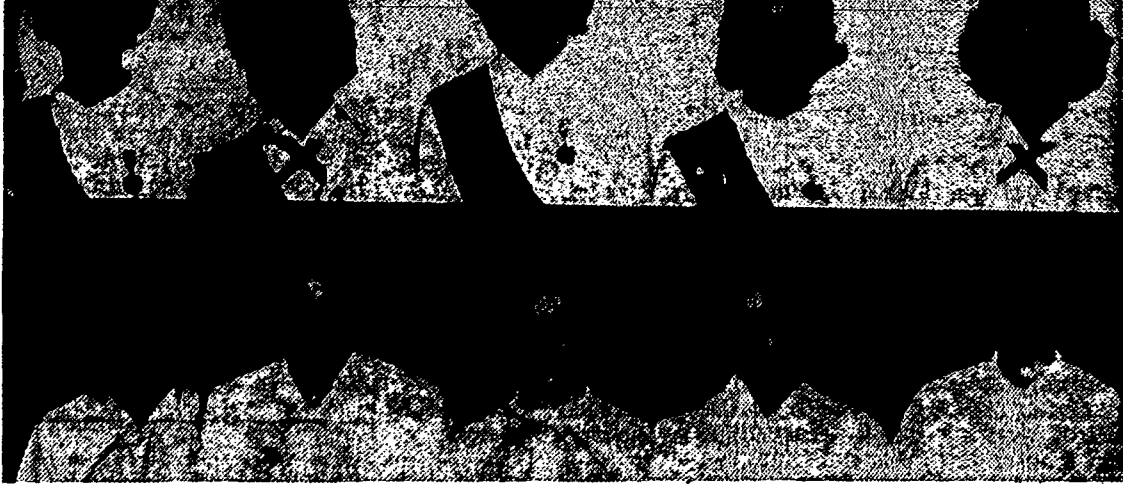
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Receives Scouting Honor

JFK Names Nursing Nun

Washington, D.C.—(RNS)—A nursing nun has been appointed a member of the Surgeon General's Consulting Group on Nursing Care, the White House announced here.

She is Sister Virginia Kingsbury of Marillac Seminary, Normandy, Mo., consultant to schools for the Western Provinces of the Sisters of Charity.

PRESIDENT KENNEDY announced establishment of the new consulting body after conferring with Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare Abraham A. Ribicoff and Surgeon General Luther L. Terry of the U.S. Public Health Service.

The group, headed by Dr. Alvin C. Eurich, vice-president of the Ford Foundation's Fund for Advancement of Education, will report to the President by Jan. 1, 1962, on the needs of the nation for better nursing education and services. Twenty-two educators, hospital administrators, and social scientists were named to the committee.

Geneva—Funeral service for City Judge Thomas A. Kane, prominent Catholic layman and civic leader, was held Wednesday, May 17, in St. Francis de Sales Church. The Rev. Thomas Kane of Rochester, a cousin of the judge, was celebrant of the solemn funeral Mass.

The Rev. Elmer McDonald was deacon and the Rev. Anthony Valente sub-deacon.

Burial was in St. Patrick's Cemetery with Father Kane, Father McDonald, Father Nolan, and Father Valente officiating.

An honor guard consisted of Eugene Linzy, Jay Whitaker, Abe Chiffon, and Harry Johnson, immediate friends of the deceased.

An honorary escort of the First Degree Assembly, Knights of Columbus, was headed by William Caster and included Christopher Carroll, Frank Christiano, Anthony Pierleoni, Frank Cassanta, George

Ryan, Henry McDonald and Henry Hennessy.

Delegations of city officials, police, legal officials and firemen attended.

Judge Kane died Sunday, May 14, 1961 after suffering his fourth heart attack. Born Thomas Anthony Kane on Dec. 9, 1896, he was the son of T. A., and Mrs. Mary D. Kane. He was born in the home at 36 Genesee St., where he has always resided. His father was a prominent Geneva business man.

The judge was active in a number of civic and community affairs and in church activities. He held many offices in local clubs and organizations.

The Geneva Lions Club in 1951 gave him its first annual award as "outstanding Geneva citizen, who has accomplished great things."

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Mary D. Kane, and his sister, Miss Ellen T. Kane.

Orthodox Backing Aids Measure

Washington—(NC)—The sponsor of a bill combining public and private school aid said it has won the support of two Orthodox Jewish groups.

Rep. Herbert Zelenko of New York said his bill, which was endorsed earlier by Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York, is supported by the Agudath Israel of America, an Orthodox educational organization, and the Rabbinical Alliance of America.

REP ZELENSKY'S bill (H.R. 8430) combines the administration's program of general Federal aid to public schools with a three-year, \$50.9 million program of grants to private schools to help buy equipment, and build facilities for instruction in science, mathematics and foreign languages.

Cardinal Spellman, in a letter to the New York Congressman, said that although the bill does not provide "complete equality of educational opportunity, it does go a long way towards achieving that objective."

Priest-Brothers Serve 94 Years

Cincinnati—(NC)—St. Pius parish, served by two priest-brothers for a combined total of 94 years, observed its 50th anniversary with a Solemn Mass offered by Archbishop Karl J. Alter of Cincinnati.

Father John H. Berning, 83, who was assigned to establish the parish on October 13, 1910, is still the pastor. He has been a priest for nearly 57 years.

HIS BROTHER, Father Louis H. Berning, has been assistant pastor at St. Pius since his ordination to the priesthood in 1917. And the church organist, Leo Moelder, has served the parish for 50 years.

Several of the 14 sons of the parish who became priests participated in the anniversary Mass (May 7).
