Refreshments will be served by the committee. Members may play cards. Dancing and group singing are planned.

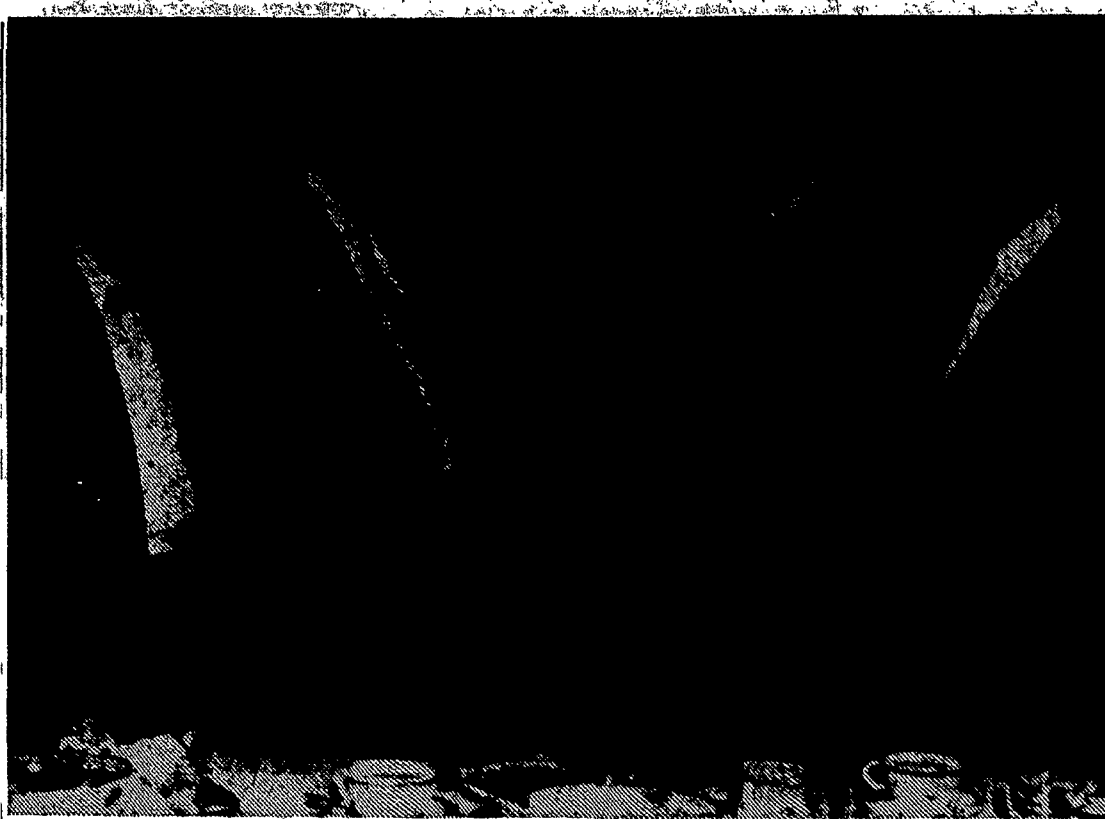
Guests will be the Rev. John P. O'Beirne, pastor of St. Patrick's Church and the Rev. James Malley, assistant pastor.

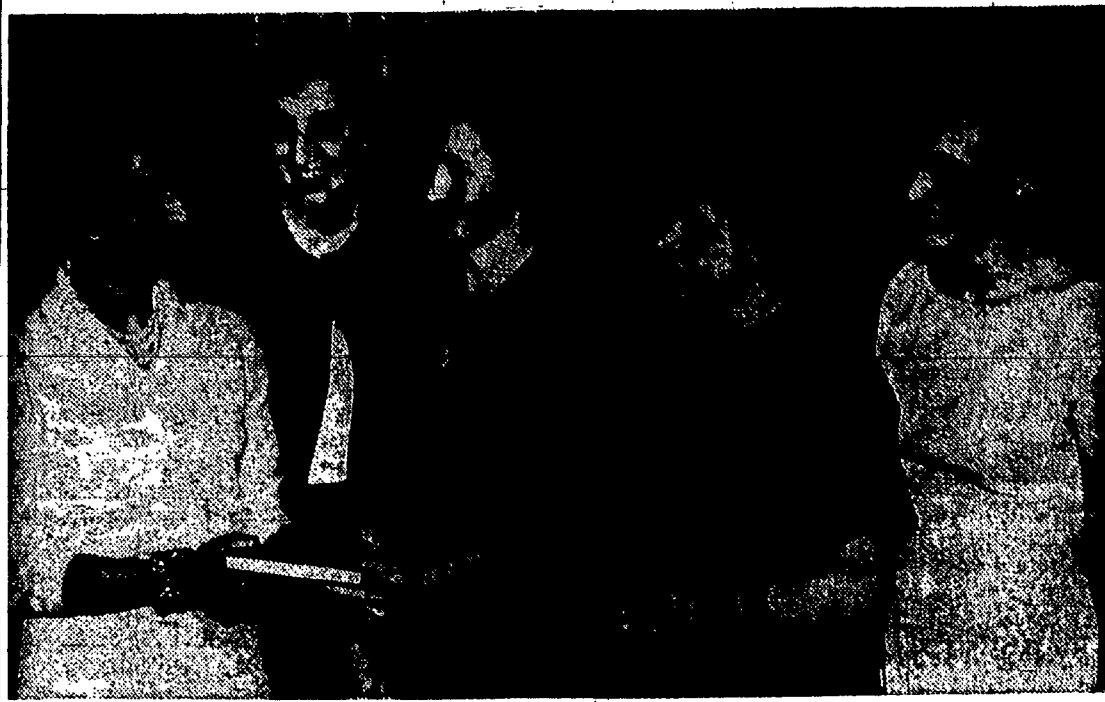

## Knights Told Duty To Aid Youth Program

Canandaigua — Members of the Canandaigua Council, Knights of Columbus heard George F. Train, city manager of Auburn speak on Mission in Life abetted by faith at a meeting in the council rooms, Tuesday, May 16 at 8:30 p.m. The speaker was introduced by Edward Delaney, grand knight.

Mr. Train was city manager of Auburn for 14 years. He was formerly from Manchester, N.Y., and was a night telegrapher at the Lehigh Railroad while attending school. He is now the president of Finger Lakes Association, with headquarters at Penn Yan.

He said that God has ordained us to do good on earth. Our obligation is to do the very best for youth and their future which is also for the future of our country.

WORLD WIDE communism, he said, is spreading and the Catholic Church is the biggest obstacle in the way. Recreation and competition build strong bodies for the future driving force of the world and for life. These must be properly supervised, he continued.

He cited an example of the 1,810 inmates in the Auburn state prison, a predominate number were non-athletes.

Competition, he said, besides building one's self, creates the necessary strength for success in business, life and even war. He went on, where faith in God and in our brothers has been neglected, we are defeating the purpose for which we were created by God. As members of the Knights of Columbus, we are lay apostles and must justify the faith God has put in us.

The practice of these beliefs is no necessary because the world is watching our youth.
