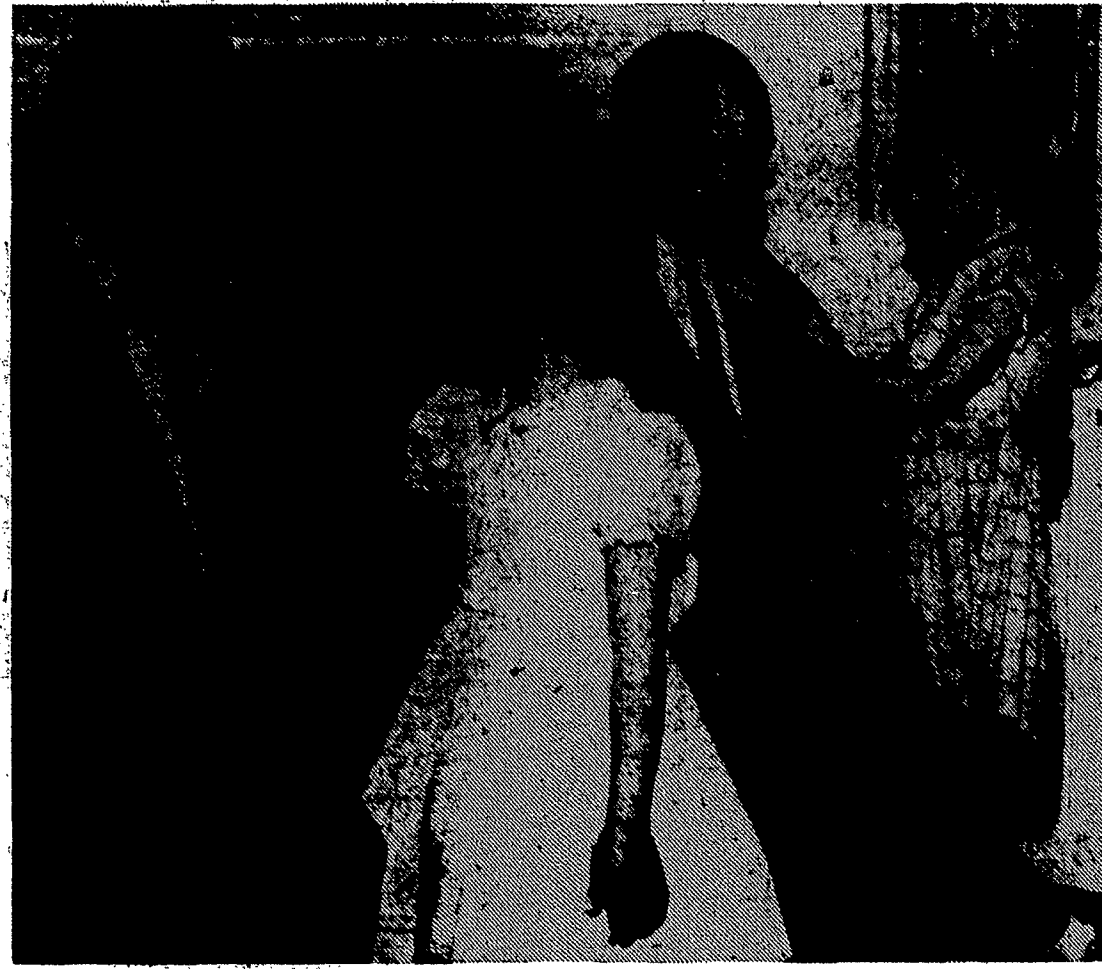

Australian Priest Urges Film Laws

Hobart, Australia — (NC) — Father J. Muirhead, S.J., director of Catholic television for the Hobart archdiocese, has called on Catholics in Tasmania to sign a petition asking for laws to prevent young children from attending horror films and adult shows in general.

Father Muirhead said that the petition has been organized by the Hobart Council for Children's Films and TV, of which he is the vice-president.

The council — a non-denominational body — has advised that the petition may be signed at the Catholic Center here.

The petition, said Father Muirhead, will ask the government to have legislation passed which will ensure that on Saturday afternoons, at least, exhibitors will fulfill part of their moral responsibility toward those whom they have hitherto been harming.

Registration Listed For Reading Laboratory

Registration for the summer session of Catherine McAuley College Reading Laboratory will be conducted during school hours on the following dates: Holy Cross School, June 1; College Laboratory, June 5 and 6; St. Louis School, Pittsford, June 7; St. Michael School, Newark, June 2. Registration is being accepted daily during school hours at Holy Family School, Auburn.

Students from public, private or parochial schools may elect the center that meets their convenience, according to Sister Mary Helena, Registrar.

The reading classes are offered for students from second grade to college; instruction is given in groups of eight, students being grouped according to reading achievement and instructional needs.

Classes are held in daily one-hour periods from July 5-28. Students may elect one of the three morning hours from 8.45 to 12.

All students receive standardized reading and personality tests, and are expected to apply for Wechsler or Binet I.Q. tests. A complete testing program is available to all, including non-registered students.

Speech therapy is available at the main laboratory. Classes in English, mathematics, and elementary French are also being offered.

A parent is expected to apply in person for an initial interview in the case of new registrants, according to Sister Mary de Pazzi, dean of Catherine McAuley College, and director of its special services.
