'Switch' Vote Said Negligible

St. Paul — (RNS) — The net result of the Presidential election campaign was progress in relations between Protestants and Roman Catholics, Charles P. Taft, chairman of the Fair Campaign Practices Committee, said here.

Taft, here to speak at a legislative workshop sponsored by the Minnesota Council of Churches and Hamline University, said intelligent discussion

of religion and attitudes of candidates contributed to better understanding.

"But Ike and Nixon got off the track in saying that religion was not an issue," he said. "Some religious questions were relevant to the campaign, and were legitimately brought up."

Taft said he saw no evidence of either party exploiting religion, "but there was just as much crazy stuff as in the election of 1928 — like a pamphlet blaming the assassination of Lincoln on the Catholics."

He believes such smear attacks clearly backfired. "The Jewish vote in New York was wobbly, but swung to Kennedy at the end, probably because of the attack on another minority," he said.

"Actually, a comparison with previous elections shows that the Protestant and Catholic vote only varied about one percent from the normal party preference, but the Jewish and Negro vote switched 4 to 5 percent."

Braves Find Clutch Performer

1. Need will no longer be the basis for determining eligibility for financial aid.
2. Incoming freshmen must have demonstrated ability to reach a predicted grade 1.7 (2.0 is a C) in their first year.
3. Athletic tenders in any one year will be reduced to 80 (it originally had been 100).

Sen. Mundt Backs 'Freedom Academy'

Jamaica, N.Y. — (NC) — U.S. Sen. Karl E. Mundt of South Dakota urged the establishment of a national Freedom Academy to train personnel in anti-communist methods.

He called for creation of such an institution in an address at a Freedom Institute convention at St. John's University here.

During the ceremony he received an honorary doctor of laws degree.

Sen. Mundt said that for 40 years the communists "have been engaged in a deliberate and carefully planned political warfare training program."

He said the Free World must understand this program "not so we can mimic it, but rather so we can develop the operational skills and frame our positive programs to effectively counter and defeat its carnivorous thrusts inside the boundaries of freedom."

"In a nutshell this will be the mission of the Freedom Academy," he said, adding that legislation to establish such an institution has been introduced in Congress.

RYNE DUREN tied a major league record with 4 strikeouts in one inning but wound up with a defeat last Thursday as the White Sox beat the Angels 6-4. A pair of unearned runs broke a 7th inning tie and led the Duren's defeat, his third.

Appealed to Congress to retain the special postal mail rate structure for religious and nonprofit publications in the second and third mail classes, contending that proposed increases in these rates "threaten economic disaster to many nonprofit religious publications."

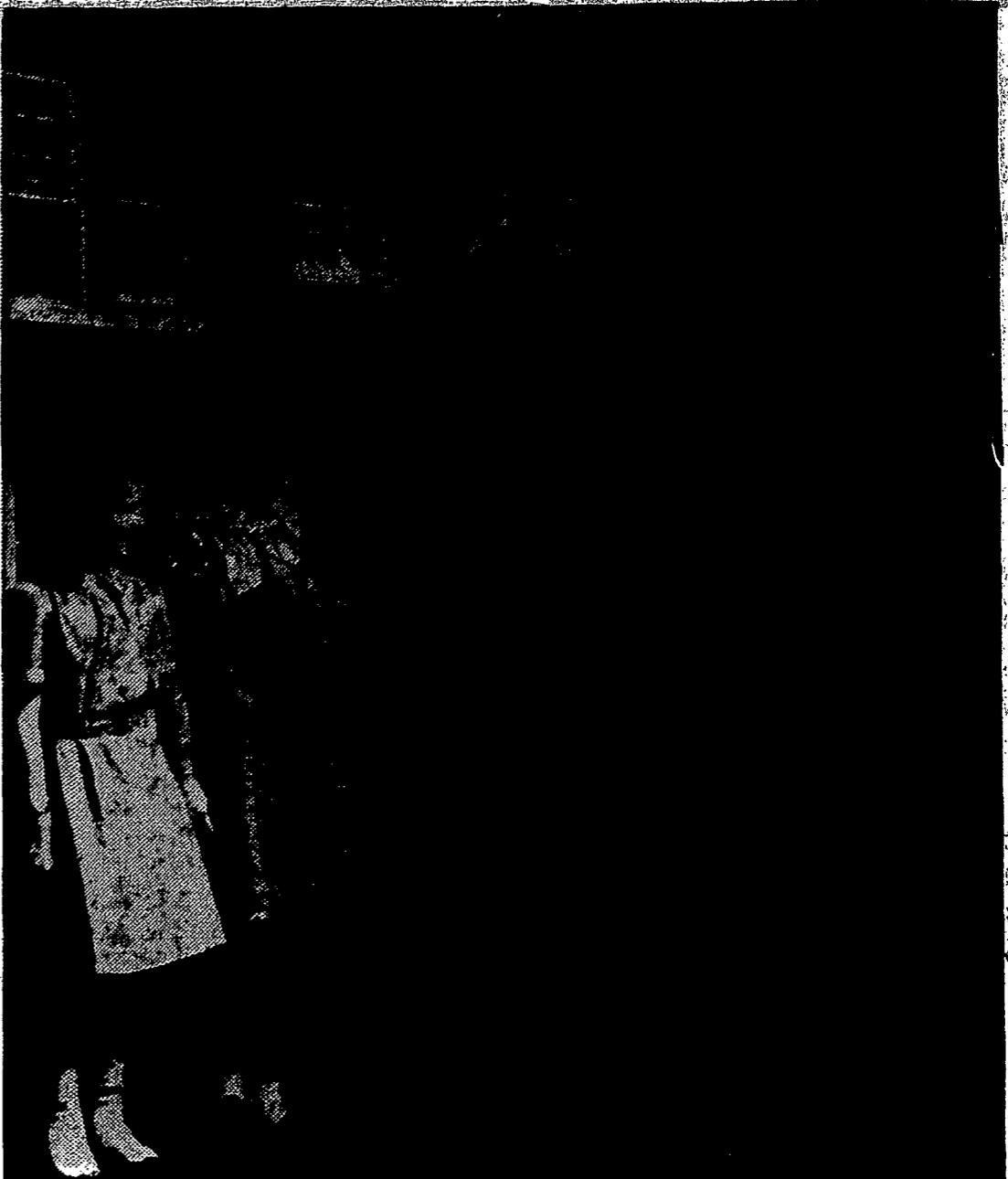
Expressed sympathy with those whose freedoms are stifled by communist regimes in Cuba and throughout the world, and urged that "every intelligent effort" be made to preserve freedom.

ASKED CONGRESS, if it deems Federal aid "essential to the proper education of school children," to include "children of those parents who exercise their natural and constitutional right of choosing independent schools." Further suggested was a "thoughtful consideration of the more equitable manner in which most of the provinces of Canada meet this challenge."

Resolved to provide leadership "in the achievement of total integration in the United States by means of observing, and commenting on the law of Christ and the law of the land in regard to charity and justice."
