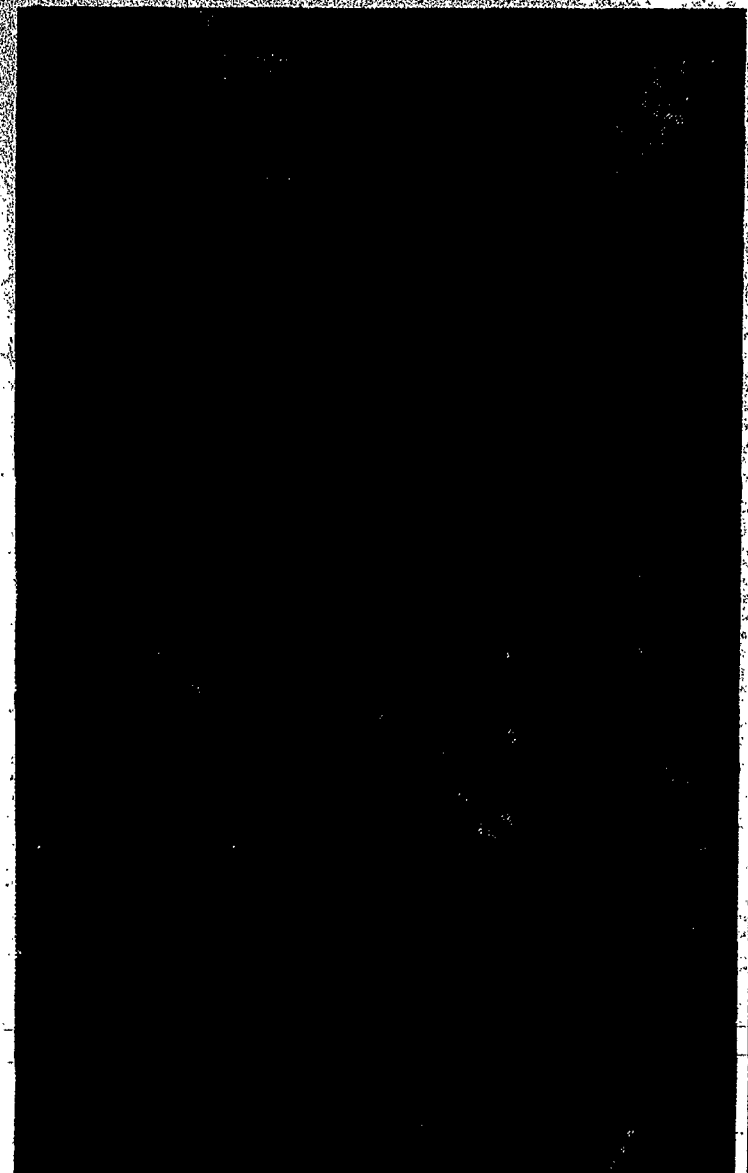

Miami — (RNS) — Several of the 10 Cuban prisoners sent to this country to arrange for the exchange of 500 tractors for the 1,200 men captured in the abortive invasion of Cuba in April attend Mass at Gesù Catholic church in downtown Miami. Special prayers were said for the rebel prisoners and others jailed in Cuba.

Rome Paper Raps Alabama 'Shame'

Vatican City — (RNS) — Gains in the movement for racial integration and equality in the United States were seen by Osservatore Romano, the Vatican City newspaper, despite what it called "the racial shame of Alabama."

It said that while outbreaks of racial violence in parts of the U.S. have caused universal concern, there were indications that integrationist ideas were gaining ground in the country.

Osservatore said the recent events in Montgomery had stirred reverberations around the world.

It said it was "unbearable" that "groups of citizens in one of the most developed democracies should still be unable to regulate their political conception of the state."

However, it noted, "It is a fact" that the movement against racial segregation is "spreading in the United States with resolute and unchecked vigor."

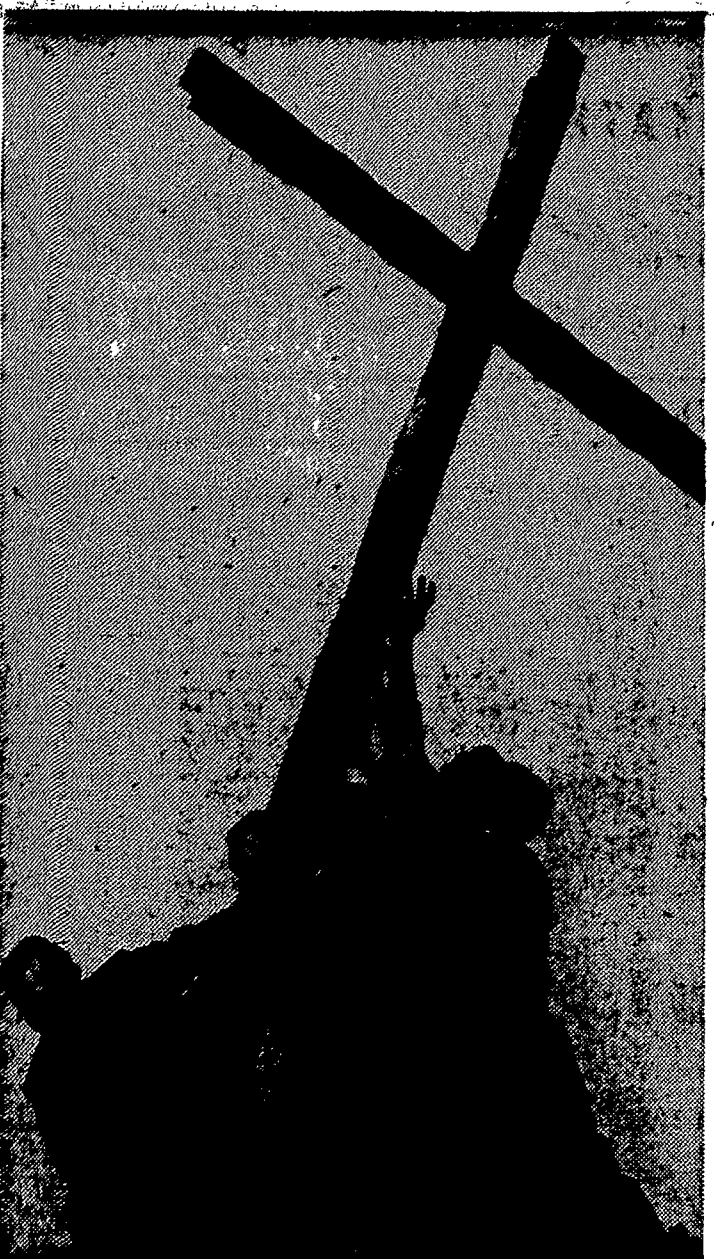

New Sciences For Seminaries

Vatican City—(NC)—The Holy See is considering plans to make sociology compulsory in all seminaries. It is also thinking of requiring seminarians to study foreign languages during their vacations.

These projects are reported in the newly released "The 1960 Activities of the Holy See," an annual Vatican publication which reviews the work and programs of all parts of the administrative offices of the Holy See. The body responsible for seminary projects is the Sacred Congregation of Universities and Seminaries.

THE REPORT said the congregation is preparing a program of study which will provide sociology courses in all seminaries to prepare seminarians the better for their work as priests. It said the congregation has also concluded that foreign language studies should be instituted for vacation periods since languages today "are more useful than ever before for one's studies and for life."

During the year 1960 the congregation sent apostolic visitors to seminaries in Germany, Mexico and Brazil and began visits to institutes for ecclesiastical formation in Chile. The program of visitation is a new part of the congregation's work. It aims at providing more specific information for local Bishops as well as for the congregation.

Three Prelates' Anniversaries

Monsignor Hoefen was born to Ignatius and Margaret Hoefen on May 21, 1885, and attended St. Michael's parochial school.

Ordained by Archbishop James Quigley of Chicago on June 10, 1911, Monsignor Hoefen's first assignment was on the teaching staff of St. Andrew's Seminary. The following year he was appointed assistant pastor of St. Michael's Church, Rochester, where he served for 11 years.

In 1923, Monsignor Hoefen was named pastor of Holy Trinity Church, Webster. During his thirteen-year pastorate at the Ridge Road parish, currently celebrating its centenary, Monsignor Hoefen supervised the construction of a new parochial school, dedicated in 1925.

The golden jubilarian, who was named to his present assignment on Sept. 29, 1936, this year also marks his silver anniversary as pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help parish.

During his pastorate, Monsignor Hoefen directed the construction of a new convent in 1942 and the new Our Lady of Perpetual Help rectory in 1950.

Having relieved the parish of its indebtedness, he supervised the redecoration of the church and installation of a new main altar in preparation for the parish golden jubilee in 1954.

During the same year, Monsignor Hoefen guided the renovation of Our Lady of Perpetual Help School and Hall. He also established a parish credit union to assist parishioners and friends in financial matters.

A member of the Diocesan Building Commission, Monsignor Hoefen was raised to the rank of a Domestic Prelate on Jan. 26, 1956.

MONSIGNOR PREDMORE will offer an anniversary Mass on Sunday, June 18 at 5 p.m. in Holy Apostles Church.

Bishop Kearney will preach the jubilee sermon. Assisting Monsignor Predmore at Mass will be the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Francis B. Burns, deacon and the Rev. Joseph L. Nothnagle, subdeacon.

The parish choir will sing the Mass in honor of St. Cecilia which was composed by Monsignor Predmore. Following Mass, a dinner will be held for the clergy. A parish dinner is scheduled for Sunday, June 4 at 6 p.m.

Solemn Mass for the children of Holy Apostles School will be offered on Monday, June 5

at 9 a.m. and in the evening a jubilee presentation will be given by the children beginning at 7:45 p.m.

Son of William F. and Mary Nier Predmore, Monsignor Predmore was born on Jan. 22, 1886. He attended Immaculate Conception School in Rochester.

A classmate of Monsignor Hoefen, Monsignor Predmore also was ordained by Chicago's Archbishop Quigley on June 10, 1911.

His first appointment was as curate of St. Mary's Church, Elmira, where he served for eleven years. In 1922, he was named chaplain of the State School of Correction at Industry.

Monsignor Predmore was assigned the pastorate of St. John's Church, Spencerport, in March 1925 and 16 years later, in March 1941, he received his present appointment as pastor of Holy Apostles Church.

During Monsignor Predmore's administration the church was redecorated in 1947 and a new convent was erected in 1950.

In honor of the 75th anniversary of Holy Apostles parish in 1960, Monsignor headed a drive that culminated in the renovation of the school and addition of six school rooms. New and enlarged parking facilities were also completed.

Pope Pius XII honored Monsignor Predmore with the rank of Domestic Prelate on Jan. 26, 1956.

Long a member of the Diocesan Music Commission, Monsignor Predmore is a composer and has authored books and articles on church music.

Papal Legate Saved Jews Rabbi Relates

Jerusalem — (RNS) — How hundreds of thousands of Romanian Jews were saved from Nazi gas chambers in Germany during the Hitler regime, through the intervention of a Papal Legate was told by a rabbi at the trial of Adolf Eichmann here.

IN A WRITTEN statement, Dr. Alexander Safran of Geneva recalled that while he was Chief Rabbi of Romania he appealed to Archbishop Andrew Cassulo, Papal Nuncio to Bucharest, to intervene on behalf of Jews being deported to Germany.

Rabbi Safran said the prelate visited the Holy See and returned with Vatican authority to persuade the government to halt the deportations.

Archbishop Cassulo, a native of Italy, was Apostolic Delegate to Turkey when he died in Istanbul in 1952 at the age of 82.
