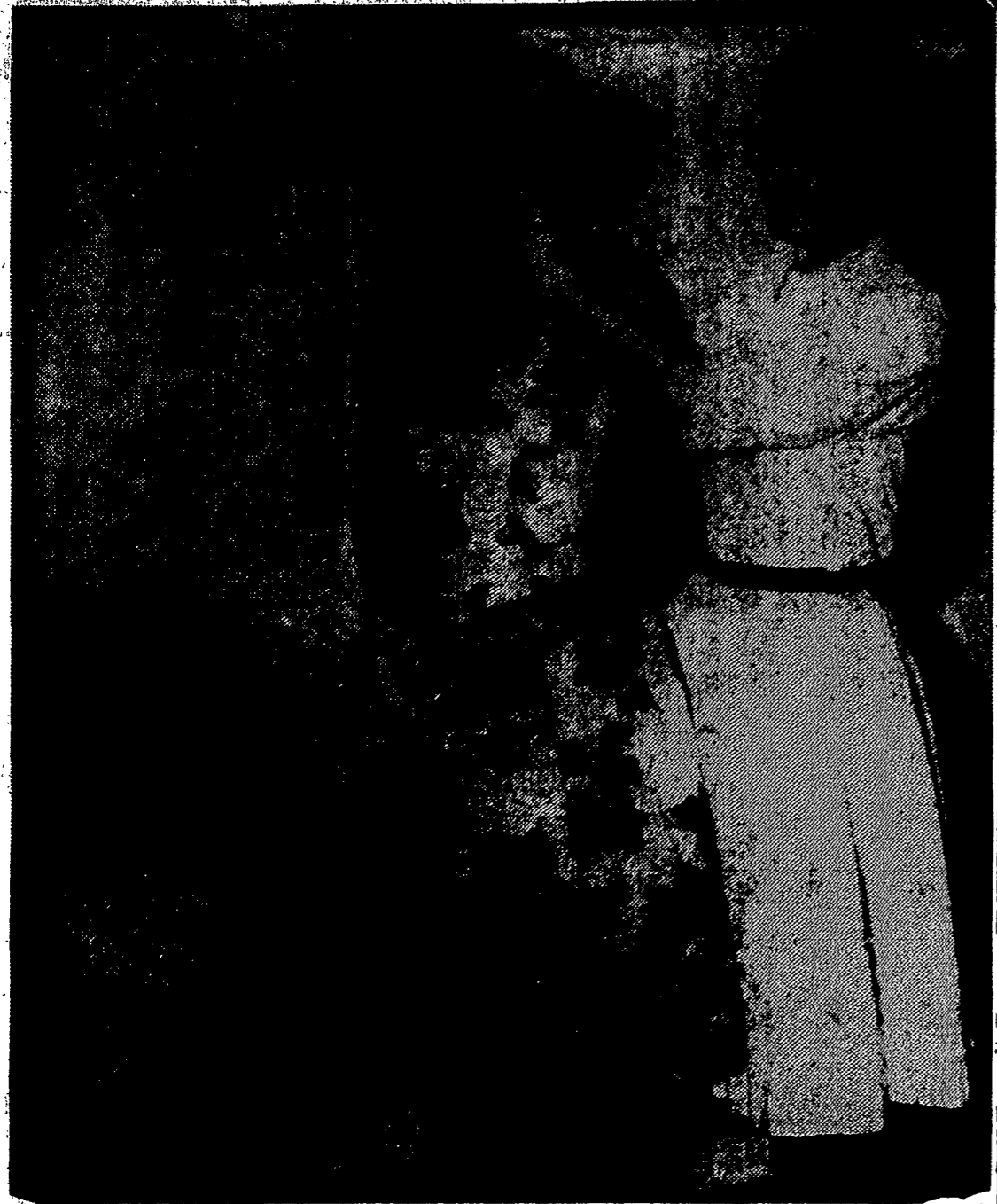

U.S. School, Cuban Aid Urged By State K.C.

The 66th Annual Convention of the New York State Council held on May 26-27 at the Hotel Biltmore, New York City was the scene of the passage of a resolution urging each of the Senators and Congressmen of New York State to support in the final enactment of any law for massive Federal aid to education that there be provided non-discriminating treatment and urgently needed relief to parents of children attending non-public schools.

Another outstanding highlight of the convention was the attending delegates passage of a resolution for the assistance to the refugees Cubans in the United States by authorizing a donation of \$10,000 to the Catholic Relief Services National Catholic Welfare Conference to assist in its work in providing aid to these unfortunate refugees.

In the election of officers, State Deputy, John F. Symonds was re-elected unanimously. Elected to serve with Mr. Symonds were: Robert Nagle of Scotia, New York to be State Secretary; Angelo A. Sansone of Brooklyn to serve as State Treasurer; William A. J. Sheehan, Saranac Lake, to the office of State Advocate and Charles J. Schmidt of East Meadows, Long Island to the office of Warden.

The convention was preceded by a Low Pontifical Mass celebrated at St. Patrick's Cathedral by the Most Rev. Joseph F. Flannelly D.D. Auxiliary Bishop of New York and Administrator of St. Patrick's Cathedral. The preacher of the Mass was Most Rev. Joseph M. Pericone D.D. Auxiliary Bishop of New York who stressed the aims, ideals and accomplishments of the Knights of Columbus from the inception of the Order in New Haven, Connecticut in 1882. The chairman of the Mass Committee was Joseph L. J. Borgatti, P.G.K. of St. Martin of Tours Council.

The Mass was followed by a corporate breakfast and luncheon at the Hotel Biltmore under the chairmanship of George W. Scheidemann P.G.K. of Aquinas Council.

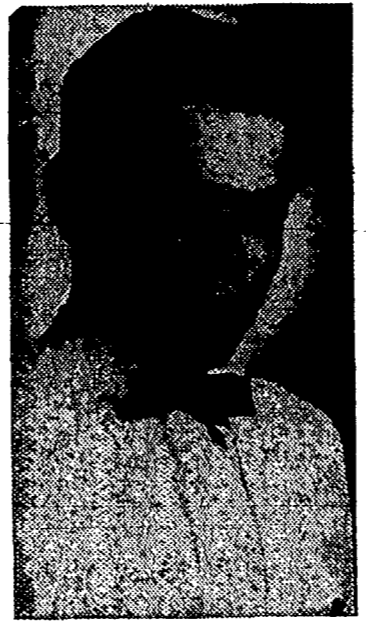
For two years he headed the Diocesan High School Basketball Tournament.

McQuaid Senior To Study Math

Charles Taillie, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Taillie of 2570 Norton St., Rochester, and top ranking senior at McQuaid Jesuit High School, has been selected by Cornell University to participate in a National Science Foundation supported Co-operative College - School Program for High Ability Secondary School Students in Mathematics at Cornell from June 28 to August 11.

He and his classmates in this special Advanced Placement Course in Analytical Geometry and Calculus were selected from approximately 800 applicants from all over the United States.

They will pursue a program designed for students capable of becoming creative scientists after completing their training to the Ph.D. level, using a text which the teacher of the course, Prof. R. P. Agnew, is preparing for publication by McGraw-Hill Book Company.

In the fall, Taillie will enter the University of Rochester as a physics major. He is a New York State Regents Engineering Scholarship winner and has been granted supplementary scholarship aid at the University.

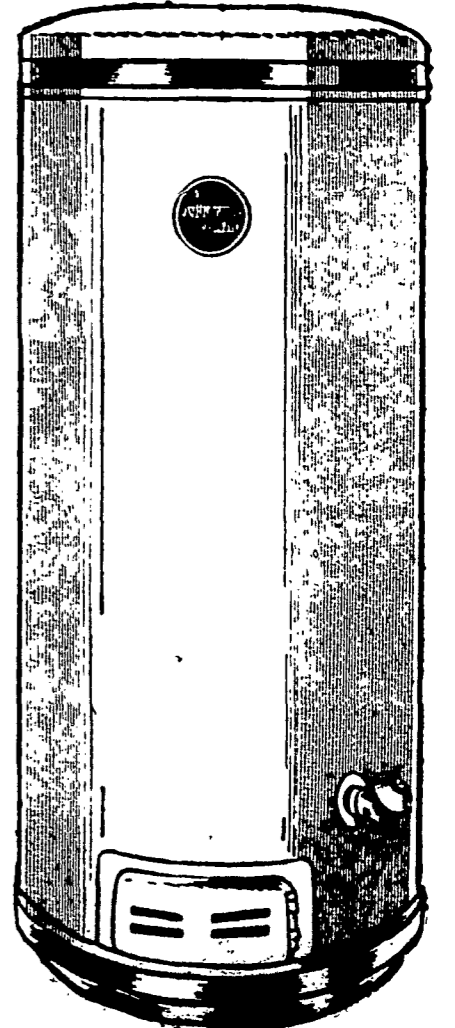

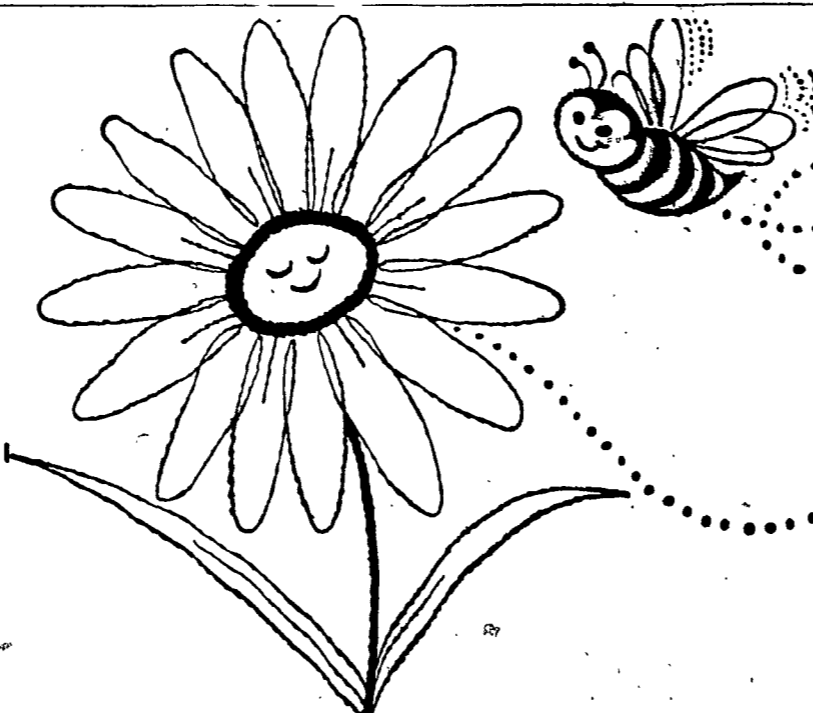
