13-2-1 Record Closes McQuaid's Baseball Year

A 3-1 victory over Webster on Decoration Day morning closed out the most successful baseball campaign in McQuaid Jesuit High School's four-year varsity history.

Junior righthander Tom McHugh's three-hitter over one of the area's top teams gave the Knights a 13-2-1 record, with the last six wins coming in succession. It was the fifth victory for McHugh, against two losses.

TOP MOUNDSMAN for coach Tom Seymour's club was senior righty Jim Jones, a National Merit scholarship winner who was as quick on the diamond as in the classroom. Jones went undefeated in seven starts, garnering 6 wins and standing off Franklin in an eight-inning 2-2 tie.

Appropriately, it was his fellow moundsmen, McHugh, who saved the latter game for Jones, hitting a home run and cutting down two runners from his righthand position. Jones had 3 shutouts, including a no-hitter over Batavia, enroute to a final ERA of 0.42. McHugh, whose ERA was 0.80, had two whitewash jobs, one of them a one-hitter against Greece-Olympia.

The offensive burden of McQuaid's winning season was hefted mainly by three seniors — Tisa, Denny Williams and John Zimmerman. Tisa found the range for homers against Brockport and Greece-Olympia. Williams matched him in extra-base blows, and Zimmerman led in doubles and runs batted in. It was a season for pitching and defense, though, as the Knights' scoring average of only four runs a game indicates. The arms and the gloves were the big items.

In junior varsity competition, McQuaid finished with a 6-4 mark. All of the pitching wins went to freshmen, Dave Celmar and John Wolff winning a pair each, Steve Zeller notching one, and Joe Miller adding the sixth in a free-swinging season's finale against Greece-Olympia.
