

Students Chosen For S.A. Trips

Auburn — Mayor Maurice I. Schwartz has proclaimed Wed., June 7 International Fellowship Day in Auburn.

PURPOSE OF the day long observance is to raise funds to send nine Auburn high school students to South American countries this summer.

Among the young "ambassadors without portfolio" will be: Susan Melnick, of St. Mary's parish, who will travel to Cordova, Argentina;

Peggy Weeks, of Holy Family, who will go to Bogota, Colombia; Sandra Carnicelli, of

St. Francis, to Guayquil, Ecuador; Elaine Yablonski, of St. Alphonsus, to Cordova, Argentina; and Olga Lepak, of St. Peter and Paul, to Cordova, Argentina.

MAYOR SCHWARTZ' proclamation says the International Fellowship program is aimed at promoting international understanding and goodwill.

Students go abroad for three and one-third month periods. They live in the homes of South American families and participate in school and community activities.

In exchange nine South American students will reside in Auburn homes during the coming year. Cost of sending students abroad for this period ranges from \$300 to \$600 depending upon the distance of travel involved.

Auburn citizens have been invited to be sponsors of the program by sending \$1 to Auburn Board of Education offices.

Also included in the plans for Fellowship Day is a spaghetti dinner and international exhibition to be held at East High School from 5 to 10 p.m. on June 7.

FIFTEEN LOCAL organizations are helping to sponsor the bazaar which will feature two hours of orchestra music, Russian, Polish, Latin American and Japanese dancers and an international singing group.

Miss Loretta Donahue, of Holy Family parish, is chairman of the Ancient Order of Hibernians display which will feature Irish travel posters and literature, native class pipes, flags, homemade Irish bread and an authentic black thorn stieck, shilleagh and Irish harp.

Mrs. Joseph Pidlipchak, of St. Peter and Paul, is working with representatives of the Ukrainian parish on a display of native handicrafts and cookery.

Mrs. John A. Mendzef, Jr., and the women from St. Hyacinth's parish will prepare a variety of Polish delicacies including pierogi, kolombki, chrusc, groszkapusta, babki and kolacki.

There will also be exhibits from Africa, France, Germany, Great Britain, Iran, Israel, Latin America, Russia and the Orient and Scandinavia.

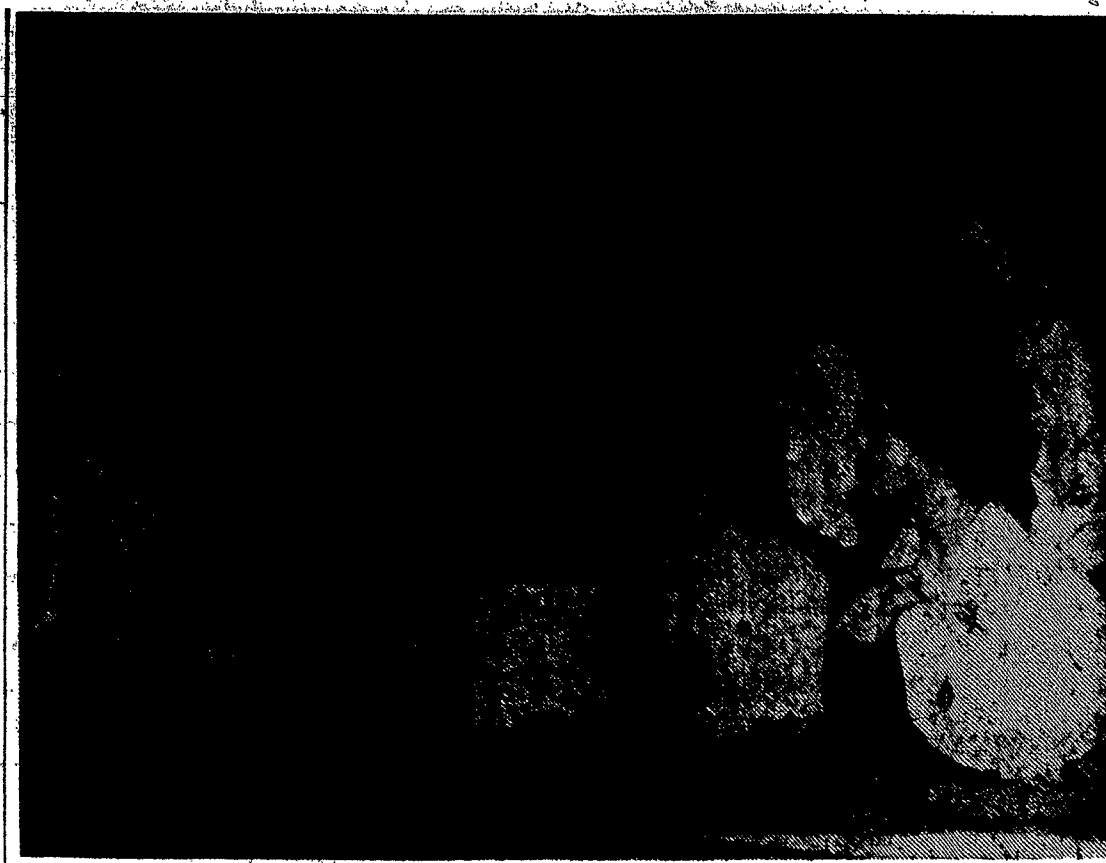
