## Completion In Sight For New School

Corning — St. Patrick's new parochial school, now nearly 75 per cent finished, is expected to be completed during August.

Installation of structural glazing and wainscoting is partially completed, and work on this will be one of the major activities with the completion of the present plastering work.

## Latin Awards Won At Mercy

Three Latin students of Our Lady of Mercy High School merited medal awards and, as a result, won a trophy for the school in the National Latin contest, sponsored by Auxilium Latinum, a Latin magazine. In addition, fifty-eight Mericians received certificates of merit in the contest, according to Sister Mary Eward, head of the Latin department.

## Religious Liberty Talks Likely At Vatican Meet

Rome — (RNS)—Religious liberty is likely to be an important topic at the forthcoming Second Vatican Council because it is intimately related to the subject of Christian unity, according to Augustin Cardinal Bea, president of the Secretariat for the Promotion of Christian Unity.

In a 45-minute interview with this correspondent at his study in the Pontifical Brazilian College, the German-born Prince of the Church, the only Jesuit in the College of Cardinals, indicated that another top matter of discussion would be the situation of the Eastern Orthodox Churches, especially in the light of the Russian Orthodox Church's application for membership in the World Council of Churches.

It has been of great interest to this correspondent to encounter on several different occasions approving references to the December, 1953, address on religious liberty in which the late Pope Pius XII indicated the necessity and propriety of taking into account the varying religious orientation of the nations that have to get along with one another for the sake of peace and cooperation.

Cardinal Bea, conversing in fluent Italian, voiced the opinion that this forward step — recognized as such even in conservative Rome quarters as "papal teachings" — would not be eroded by the Second Vatican Council. He stressed that in general the Council would not impede the progress of religious liberty.

Asked how the matter of religious tolerance would come before the Council, Cardinal Bea suggested the possibility of mixed or composite sponsorship, since religious liberty was a necessary concern of at least three of the bodies engaged in preparing for the Council. These, in addition to the secretariat over which he himself presides, he said, are the Theological Commission and the Commission on Missions.

Some of the most troublesome questions, the cardinal noted, arise in areas long occupied by Catholics and where Protestants are now carrying on a vigorous evangelism.

Citing especially Latin America, Cardinal Bea said it was recognized that, since an estimated 70 per cent of the Protestant missionaries there belong to bodies not af-

filiated with the World Council of Churches, the ecumenical movement is limited in its influence.

He referred to a recent statement in which, he said, a South American prelate told him that, in spite of the hierarchy's goodwill and correct position, it is not always possible to prevent intolerant manifestations in parishes where the priest and his flock are perhaps so more under the influence of the ecumenical spirit and discipline than their Protestant neighbors.

Noting also the inadequacies of human beings only partly Christianized, the cardinal alluded also to what he said was the inherent difficulty of distinguishing properly and practically between a legitimate, obligatory Christian witness and an unbecoming proselytism.

Two of the current lively topics here involving Eastern Orthodoxy are the significance of the Russian Church's application for membership in the World Council and the attitude and activity of Ecumenical Patriarch Athenagoras in Istanbul.

Cardinal Bea said it is too early to speak of Rome's reaction or position and policy with regard to the Russian Church's move. But he intimated he saw no reason for taking a negative stand. Nor did he appear to question the genuinely religious motivation of Patriarch Alexei of Moscow in making the bid for World Council membership.
