Father Hedges, a native of Hornell, is coordinator of all the Newman Clubs in colleges and universities throughout the Rochester Diocese. He was principal speaker at the luncheon which was sponsored by the Steuben Deanery, Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, in honor of Our Lady of Fatima. There were more than 60 women present at the luncheon held on River St.

"WE ARE PRODUCTS of a materialistic, secular world which may rub off on us unless we are secure within ourselves. Our Faith gives that security

if we know it — and live it," Father Hedges said.

Speaking of the lay apostolate, which refers simply to the good Catholic people taking an active part in advancing the teachings of Jesus, Christ, Father Hedges emphasized the necessity of being informed.

"Use your understanding, your wisdom and above all, your prayers, to practice and to impart the truths which will make all men free."
