

Horseheads Fund Appeal This Sunday

High point in the \$150,000 Building Fund Appeal of St. Mary's Church, Horseheads, will be reached this Sunday when more than 250 men will call on their fellow-parishioners in their homes between the hours of 1:30 and 3:30 p.m., soliciting three-year pledges to finance construction of a new church and 4 classroom school addition. The announcement was made this week by the pastor, Rev. Francis J. Reilly.

Committeemen will attend benediction in the parish church at 1 p.m. before starting out on their parish-wide canvas.

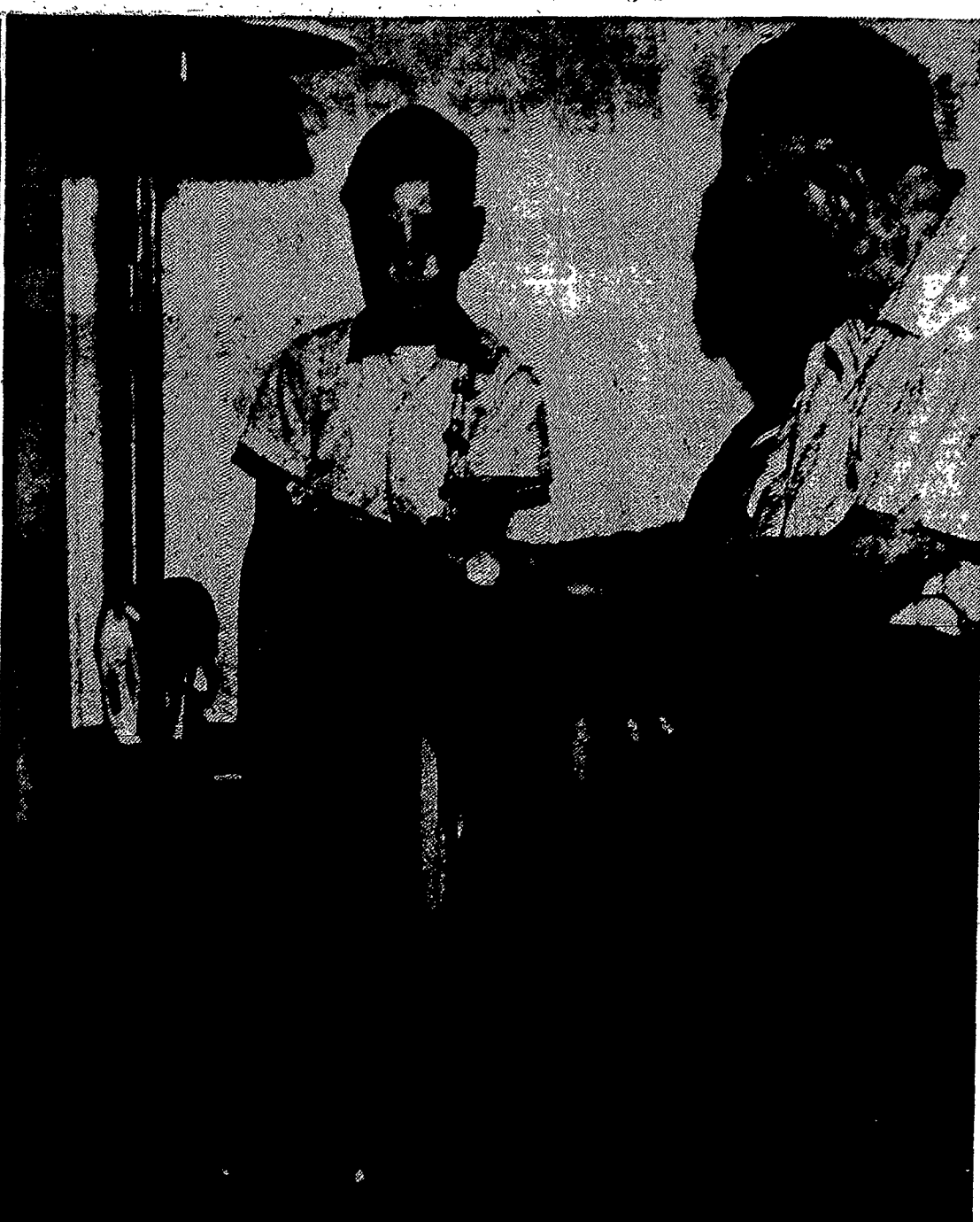
AN ADDRESS BY the Rev. William M. Roche, Rochester Diocesan Superintendent of Schools, will feature the general committee kick-off dinner Saturday at 6:30 p.m., in the school auditorium.

Members of the advance gifts committee heard an address by Rt. Rev. Msgr. Leo G. Schwab, pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes Church, Elmira, and dean of the Chemung-Schuyler deanery of the Rochester Catholic diocese, at their kick-off dinner in the school last Saturday evening, June 10. Solicitation of a limited number of parishioners followed on Sunday afternoon, June 11, with results which the pastor termed "excellent."

Last night a large turn-out of committeemen heard the Hon. Daniel J. Donahoe, Judge of the Chemung County Children's Court at their Pep Rally in the school auditorium.

Under the honorary chairmanship of the pastor and the assistant pastor, Rev. Roger F. Switzer, the general organization is headed by Glenn R. Weiland, with Thomas P. Lynch, as advance gifts chairman and William A. Danaher, Sr., as advisory committee chairman.

Plans call for construction of a combined church and 4-classroom school addition, with the fall of 1963 set as the completion date. With a seating capacity of 275, the new church will supplant the auditorium chapel and release the latter space for an expanded recreational program for children in all age groups, as well as provide additional social program in the growing parish.

Year of 'Big Pay Off'

This was the "year of the big pay off."

Dr. Paul S. Lalonde's sixth trip to Tanganyika to work with the Medical Missionaries of Mary convinced him "person to person service pays rich dividends."

Tanganyika government officials, he reports, recognize the value of the critically needed hospitals and dental clinics of the nuns, the natives show a deep-rooted gratitude to those who aid them and two Princes of the Church voiced their warm approval of the medical mission program.

DR. LALONDE, Rochester dentist, who annually spends January to June in the east Africa equator nation, voiced his own thanks to local industries, civic and religious groups who provided equipment and

funds to expand the crusade of mercy.

Two new hospitals, one in southwest Tanganyika and another in Nyasaland, are about to be opened and all 27 hospitals staffed by nuns of the Medical Missionaries order are in "full operation" — including the order's hospital in Angola, Dr. Lalonde reports.

A novitiate for native girls to train to be nuns of the order will be opened at Ndareda, Tanganyika, this year also. Twelve are currently in training in Ireland at the order's headquarters.

ASKED ABOUT current political events in Africa, Dr. Lalonde stated, "My business is helping Catholic missions. I stay out of politics." He did say, however, the African people are making "tre-

mendous progress to improve living standards, to expand educational opportunities."

"They need hospitals, doctors, nurses that they can't get in a hundred years unless there is a far greater response from Europe and America."

He met Negro Cardinal Rugamba and Cardinal Agagianian, the Vatican's top director of the Church's worldwide mission program. Both told him the missions need more laymen to work with priests and nuns.

Dr. Lalonde's schedule for the next six months — besides taking care of his patients here — lists speaking engagements at several parishes, explaining his work to fellow dentists and doctors at their national meetings this summer and raising funds to ship at least two tons of drugs to the Africa mission hospitals.
