Hornell School Plan Expanded, Msgr. Gannon Marks Jubilee

Hornell — Another room will be added to the proposed expansion of St. Ann's School as a result of the pledges to the current building campaign, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Lawrence W. Gannon, V.F., pastor, announced Sunday.

Monsignor Gannon said that the \$218,000 subscription to the building drive will make possible a seven-room addition rather than the six rooms originally planned.

He expressed his gratitude to the Rev. Vincent P. Collins and the Rev. Robert A. Meng, assistant pastors, the campaign leaders and the 400 men of the parish who made the door-to-door solicitations as well as to the members of the parish for the "generous response which can not be adequately acknowledged in mere words."

The goal for the drive to enlarge St. Ann's School was set at a \$150,000 minimum. A few days ago, campaign returns showed that a total of \$218,000 had been donated or pledged for a two-year period. The amount now is sufficient to add another classroom as well as make needed improvements in the existing school.

Among those improvements are the lowering of classroom ceilings; modernization of the lighting system; thorough redecoration and renovation.

Monsignor Gannon celebrated Mass Monday for all the children in the parish at 9 a.m. The occasion was the 35th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood on June 12, 1926. He was elevated to the rank of Monsignor by Pope Pius XII, who named him a Domestic Prelate on June 26, 1955.

Monsignor Gannon came to Hornell on Sept. 28, 1948 from St. Patrick's Church, Mount Morris. A year after his arrival in Hornell the Federation Building was sold and the money used to repair the exterior of the church, school and convent.

This work, which required six months, consisted of removing the stucco from the exterior and replacing more than 20,000 bricks.

The following year the interior of the church was repainted and the exterior of the rectory was remodeled and repainted. Large scale improvements in St. Ann's School in-

cluded complete redecoration and the establishment of a room in the basement which since has become known as the Pine Room.

In 1952, the sanctuary of the church was beautified by the installation of three marble altars. Since then, many improvements have been made including a new altar rail, re-carpeting of the church, repair of windows and roof and new doors in the Erie Ave. entrance.

Aside from numerous improvements made in the church, convent, school and rectory, new property was purchased by the parish on the Sapulding Farm on the Schwarzenbach Highway. This since has become St. Mary's Cemetery.

Despite the number of physical improvements made to properties, no debt was incurred. Instead, the existing parish debt has been reduced considerably during Monsignor Gannon's pastorate.
