Deanery Hears Filipina

Geneva — "Ever since I was a little girl in Manila, I had hoped to come to the United States of America. I always thought the American people must be a wonderful people and the United States a wonderful country."

Miss Kay Geronimo of the Philippines made this statement at the First Saturday luncheon of Ontario-Seneca-Yates Deanery, Rochester Diocesan Council, National Council of Catholic Women Saturday.

She spoke before more than 160 members and several clergymen.

"I shall go home this summer after one year among you, knowing that you ARE a wonderful people and that this is a wonderful country. I shall miss you all individually and as a community because of the many kindnesses and the generosity shown me as an exchange student."

Miss Geronimo is a senior and an exchange student at Canandaigua Academy under the sponsorship of the American Field Service program and will be graduated this month.

She was honored at the luncheon by the International Relations committee of the OSY Deanery.

Preceding the luncheon 200 women attended the Mass and Corporate Communion in St. Mary's Church, Canandaigua. The Rev. Thomas Statt, assistant, celebrated the dialogue Mass and gave the meditation on the First Saturday devotions.

THE THREE Canandaigua affiliates, St. Mary's Rosary Altar Society; Court Assumption, Catholic Daughters; and St. Vincent de Paul Society, sponsored the luncheon at Caruso's on Canandaigua Lake.

Father Alphonsus Crimmins of St. Mary's, Canandaigua, welcomed the members and guests from the tri-county area. He paid tribute to their continued and sustained interest in the First Saturday Masses and Corporate Communion and extended a greeting to Rev. James F. Father Baker's Deeds To Be Recited at Lackawanna Shrine

The National Shrine of Our Lady of Victory, and Father Baker's Homes of Charity, are looking forward to a busy tourist season as the result of 1961's being the silver anniversary of the death of Father Baker.

"We have already guided twice as many parties as we did before schools closed last year," reported Very Rev. Monsignor Joseph M. McPherson. "Both local people and out-of-towners have been coming to Lackawanna, N.Y., in spite of the late Spring. We expect that our guides will be very busy with family groups once school is out."

TRAINED GUIDES are on duty from 10 to 4 weekdays and from 1 to 4 Sundays during July and August; and on weekends just before and after. "We are going to try guide service during some evenings as well," Monsignor McPherson added. "There is Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament each evening at 7:30. The Infant Home, which visitors see during the day, can't be reopened, of course; but the first Basilica in the United States is open until about 9 p.m. and a guide may be helpful in the early evening."

Visitors are taken through the marble Basilica, into Father Baker's Memorial Rooms, and into Our Lady of Victory Infant Home. There is no charge. July 29 will be Father Baker Day, with a Requiem Mass at 11 a.m. and a procession to the nearby Holy Cross Cemetery. A plaque for the new 1 1/2-mile Father Baker Bridge will be dedicated August 15. The new Baker Hall Cottages should be opened in time for school.

Guides may be assigned outside of hours upon request, and the staff will advise as to meals and overnight accommodations nearby. Monsignor McPherson invited visitors to write to the Director of Pilgrimages, 77 Ridge Rd., Lackawanna 18, N.Y. for information.

Summer Study Slated For McQuaid Teachers

Four lay faculty members of McQuaid Jesuit High School will continue their studies in summer institutes for mathematics, physics, and history. Three of them will study on National Science Foundation grants, the fourth on a Carnegie Foundation grant.

Mr. Frank S. Noco, instructor in mathematics, will attend a 6-week institute at Georgetown University while Mr. Robert L. Berry will go to the University of Buffalo for a similar period.

BOTH INSTITUTES are sponsored by NSF for secondary level math teachers as part of a continuing program by which those teachers can earn graduate credit towards a Master's degree while learning new approaches to the subject matter. The grants cover tuition, fees, travel expenses plus stipends and allowances.

Mr. Angelo Lamendola, assistant in science projects at McQuaid, will be at the University of Rochester for a 6-week NSF institute embracing modern concepts in physics. Also at the U. of Rochester will be Mr. Giacomo H. Achille, who will attend an Institute on Non-Western History sponsored by the Carnegie Foundation.
