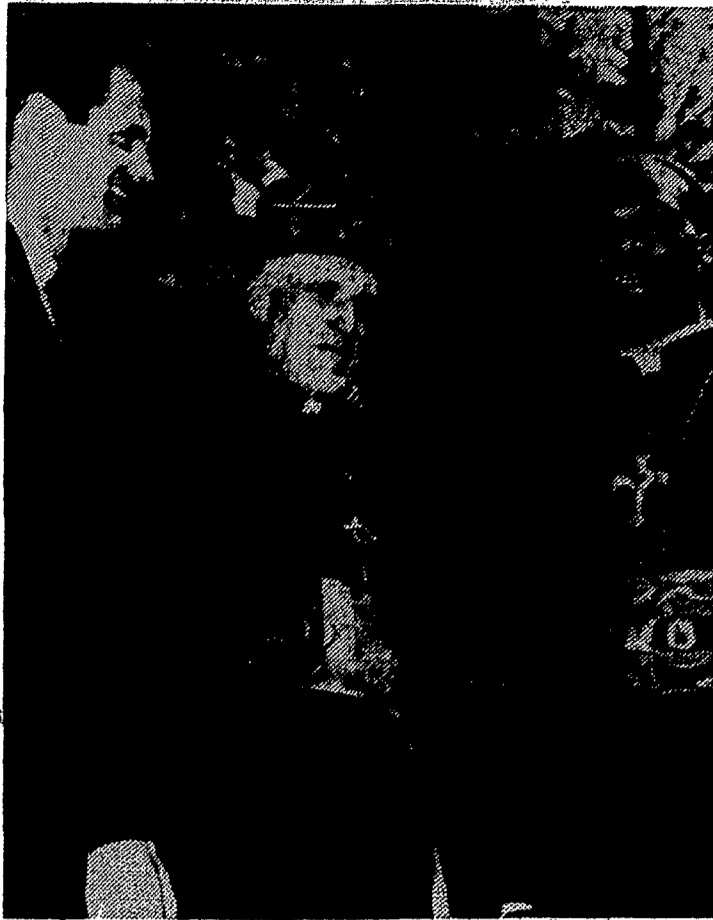
Dear Miss Culklin:
