She demonstrated later in Newark at the home of the Charles Perkins when she slipped out of her travel togs and into a just-unpacked grey and white checked tailored sheath and she looked fresh as a daisy.

Share Science Facilities

Lakewood — (RNS) — A Presbyterian minister here called on Protestants to give fuller recognition to the burden carried by Catholics in maintaining a separate school system and suggested that a plan could be worked out for the part-time use of certain public school facilities by parochial students.

In a sermon to his congregation, the Rev. L. Wilson Kilgore, pastor of the Lakewood Presbyterian church, noted there was a definite difference between welfare services and education.

"I believe," he said, "that where national interests are at stake, such as the high costs of technical and scientific education, and should those using the parochial education system desire to use the public facilities, they should be granted."
