College Sets U.S. Film Festival

"If people want messages, echoed one of the new Hollywood prophets recently, 'they can go to Western Union.'"

Armed with this inspiring creed, he has made a tidy fortune with such modern classics as "Hercules," which left the critics in tears but grossed \$5,000,000. "Hercules Unchained," its equally panned successor, which grossed \$4,000,000. "Atlantis," which made \$2,000,000, and "Godzilla" (the story of a sea monster that one day pops out of the ocean and destroys Tokyo in one minute and forty-three seconds,) which grossed only a million.

ALL THESE FILMS, unambiguously shelled by the critics, used a common formula for success: action and sex.

All four also share another common distinction: they will not be shown at the American Film Festival scheduled at Nazareth College as part of the

joint six-week summer session, offered by Nazareth and St. John Fisher College which began this week.

Although Sister M. Evelyn, dramatist teacher at St. Agnes High School, member of the summer school faculty, and director of the film program—has never seen these particular films, she is familiar with the effect that they—and others like them—have on popular culture.

"The film festival, idea," she says, is one answer to the steadily deteriorating level of quality in motion pictures and all our mass media."

Advanced Deadline

Because of the Fourth of July holiday, news and advertising deadline for next week will be Monday noon, July 3.

The idea is not new. It has been championed by many intellectual leaders who maintain that one way to raise the level of motion pictures and television is to create a more discriminating viewing audience, and that colleges and universities should play a major part in that effort.

SISTER EVELYN agrees with this concept. "We began to give serious thought to our own film festival," she says, "after a recent article which appeared in America by Father William J. Lynch, professor of English at Georgetown University.

"Father Lynch maintains that such programs are necessary because the film industry has taken away our freedom to see what is best, or at least what is good, and that we must create alternatives.

"He points out that colleges and universities should be expected to participate more actively in that effort." (Continued on Page 12)
