"Georgetown University, in conjunction with Films Inc., a subsidiary of Encyclopaedia Britannica Films, held just such a film festival last summer. It, like ours, was designed to offer a preliminary exploration of how well our own quality films have tackled American realities."

THE NAZARETH festival is part of the college's six-week summer program which began this week. The first film, "Asphalt Jungle" was shown Wednesday night. Other films will be shown on Friday night during the session and on the Fourth of July.

Films in the series include such widely discussed and critically acclaimed motion pictures as: "All About Eve," "East of Eden," "Intruder in the Dust," "Boomerang," "Citizen Kane," "My Darling Clementine," and "On the Town."

It is planned that each film will be preceded by a brief analysis and followed by an informal discussion.

Pope Predicts

'Imprint' on History
Vatican City — (RNS) — The Second Vatican Council is "destined to leave an indelible imprint on the history of the Church," Pope John XXIII declared at the opening of a ten-day session of the Central Commission set up in preparation for the Council.

Presided over by the Pope, the Commission met in the Hall of Congregations of the Vatican Palace, with 31 cardinals, two patriarchs, 12 archbishops and bishops, four superiors general of religious orders and 23 advisers present.

THE PONTIFF said the various other preparatory commissions set up for the coming Council have done much groundwork for it, and now the Central Commission, "the highest and most important, is going to work for the success of the Council."

"Our heart," he said, "opens wide at the hope of greater successes in seeing so united a rising number of participants from throughout the world. The world is waiting for this Council and this waiting is widespread not only among Our own beloved sons, but also among those outside the Church."

Pope John told the members of the Commission that "an arduous and delicate work, indeed, is yours, but in it the light of wisdom, doctrine, prudence and experience is resplendent which the Lord has endowed you with."

Reviewing the historical background of the Ecumenical Councils, Pope John described the

Chaplain Defends Pupils

Berkeley — (NC) — The chaplain of the Newman Club at the University of California has written a letter to State Senator Hugh Burns defending "the vast majority of students" and cautioning the Senator against "irresponsible" charges of Red influence at the university.

Father Joseph Quinn, C.S.P., said in the letter, "The State Senate's fact-finding subcommittee on Un-American Activities has leveled serious charges against the student body of the University of California. Such charges are irresponsible unless they point out not only the bare minority of students involved in subversive activity, but also the large number of patriotic responsible students who have combated it."

"Freedom is a fragile, but precious treasure. It is possible for the enthusiasm of youth to exceed the bounds of prudence. But youth has on the campus as well as on the battlefield exerted its enthusiasm for the defense of freedom. At no cost must we permit the fear of a very real and present danger to curb the exercise of academic freedom at the University of California," Father Quinn said.
