## Citizens, Workers Rights

Geneva — (RNS) — Forthright statements by two leading Geneva representatives of the International Federation of Christian Trade Unionists, a predominantly Roman Catholic organization, were heard at the 45th annual assembly here of the International Labor Organization.

One of the speakers was George Eggermann, permanent representative of the International Federation of Christian Trade Unionists, a predominantly Roman Catholic organization. The other was Father J. G. Stokman, O.F.M., representing the Netherlands government.

understood," Eggermann declared in a general debate on labor relations, "that our federation places all its energy and force at the service of man. For us man is something other than a producer, a complex of bone and muscle.

"For us, what is at stake is the place of man in society, the dignity and freedom of men, a whole concept of social life. What counts for us is the will we bring to bear to give man the chance to be more 'a man,' to develop himself, in short, to fulfill himself.

"What we do not admit is the slave-man, the servant, the creature of the machine, or of the wielders of power, whether they derive that power from the state or from money."

Father Stokman stressed that respect for the human dignity of the worker is "really the essential element" in all relations between employers and workers.

"Whatever may be an individual's philosophy," he said, "we will all agree that the human being must be unreservedly respected. We must recognize that the other man is equal to ourselves, that he has the same rights and carries with him the same profound source of value and dignity.

"That is why we condemn discrimination based on color, race, sex, religion, nationality or political views. That is why the work of man can never be considered or treated as merchandise to be sold or hired for profit. That is why also there must be consultation in the undertaking between management and the staff.

"The human dignity of the worker is meaningless if it does not include for the worker the right to express himself and to have a real influence as regards his own labor, or as regards the technical, economic and social questions of which he has knowledge."

It was Oliver Wendell Holmes who said that if anyone should give him a dish of sand and tell him there were particles of iron in it, he might look for them with his eyes and search for them with his clumsy fingers and still not be able to detect them. But if he had a magnet to sweep through the sand it would draw to itself the almost invisible particles by mere power of attraction. And then he went on to say that the ungrateful heart like his fingers in the sand may sweep through the day and discover no mercies in life. But the grateful person goes through the day as the magnet and finds many blessings. The one on the lookout finds something good in every creature of God.



Like an artist fashioning a picture we make our own world. Changes are constantly occurring outside us but the changes inside us must be of our own making. Defects in others may jar us like chuck-holes after the winter's thaw. And they are just as easy to find. We do not have to look for them.

But we will be none the happier for finding them. They irritate least when we can miss them. If finding flaws in others has any effect on our personality it is only this: That it makes us more self-satisfied and proud in the thought that others are perhaps worse than we and so we need not think of improving ourselves. Like the Pharisee of old we thank God that we are not like the rest of men. And we go on our way . . . unjustified.

Conversely if our vision like the magnet sweeps over the dross of man's character and pulls out rather the image of God in him we are encouraged to be better. Though at first the good points of character may be invisible with the magnet of kindness and charity we will be able to draw them out. And we will be the better for it.

We will be encouraged to love our neighbor for the image of God that is within rather than criticize him for evident shortcomings on the surface. We will realize that if there is any dignity in man it is only because he is able to resemble God in some degree.

Then let's get out our magnets of Christian charity and sweep over the personalities of our friends and fellow workers. All mankind and especially you and I will be the better for it.
