Join NAACP Laymen Told

Minneapolis—(RNS)—Two pleas to Catholic laymen to align themselves with forces seeking social justice in this country and in Latin America were made here at the convention of Serra International.

A bishop urged them to work for better housing for Negroes and other racial minorities through agencies like the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) and the Urban League.

A priest-expert on Latin America called on them to support the effort being made there to change the image of the Catholic Church from one favoring the rich.

The pleas were directed to Serra club members who are generally business and professional men of a high economic level. Members of the organization work to encourage vocations for the priesthood.

Bishop William G. Conner of Greensburg, Pa., in calling on the Serra members to associate themselves with the NAACP and the Urban League, noted that these organizations label of "red-dominated."

"Those who know, as I do from personal experience with local branches of these organizations, have never had reason to doubt the essential goodness and sound patriotism of their leaders and their members," he declared.

"Grave inequities" exist in housing among both Negroes and whites in the North as well as the South, the bishop said. "It is well to remember," he continued, "that it is one of communism's first rules to exploit the late Mr. Berthold Knorr and Mrs. Mildred Knorr, Cuba, Miami or Minneapolis."

Boston — (RNS) — "Have gong will travel," Richard Cardinal Cushing said in effect today in a winsome paragraph of his "News Notes," a column he writes for Boston's archdiocesan weekly newspaper, The Pilot.

In a jocular item titled "Words Without End, Amen," The Cardinal allowed that "as most of you know, I am a man of a few million words," but pointed out that "this is a family trait. All the Cushings were great talkers."

The prelate, who often is required to speak publicly several times daily, guessed that "I will have to bring someone along with me at future engagements with a bell or a buzzer."

"Someone has told me," he said, "that you are fine for about 15 minutes, but when you get to the half hour mark we are more interested in physical survival than in spiritual sustenance. From then on, we just live in hope."

With his new and signaling companion, the Cardinal predicted "I will get the gong when I hit the 15-minute limit. And this ought to be the best news a lot of you have heard in a long time!"

BUILDING MATERIALS

Not enough thought is given to the way we build our heavenly home. The foundation is laid for us. That is our faith in Christ. As St. Paul writes: "The foundation which has been laid is the only one which anyone can lay; I mean Jesus Christ."

But what kind of material is used to add to this foundation? Here we find differences, for the builders are many and the materials are various. St. Paul continues: "But on this foundation different men will build." Some will use "gold," others "silver," others "precious stones," still others "grass" or "straw." We see examples of this all around us. Some Catholic give their entire lives to Christ and His Church, and other make great sacrifices of their time, their talents and their possessions, some offer only a few minutes a day in prayer and thirty minutes on Sunday, while still others give Christ but a fleeting thought.

How will the different material be tested? St. Paul adds: "Fire will test the quality of each man's workmanship. He will receive a reward if the building he has added on stands firm; if it is burned up he will be the loser." The day of reckoning when our motives and our accomplishments will be judged is even now approaching. Let us remember that God is not as interested in quantity as He is quality. Gold, silver and precious stones may be small in bulk compared to grass or straw, but how sad it would be to meet the Saviour with nothing but ashes in our hands.

Some of you readers have an abundance of the world's goods, be it money in the bank, stocks, bonds, real estate, etc. Are you building on the foundation of Christ with it? You say you need it to live on. Right! But while you are living on the income you can be building with golden or silver merits. Here is how. 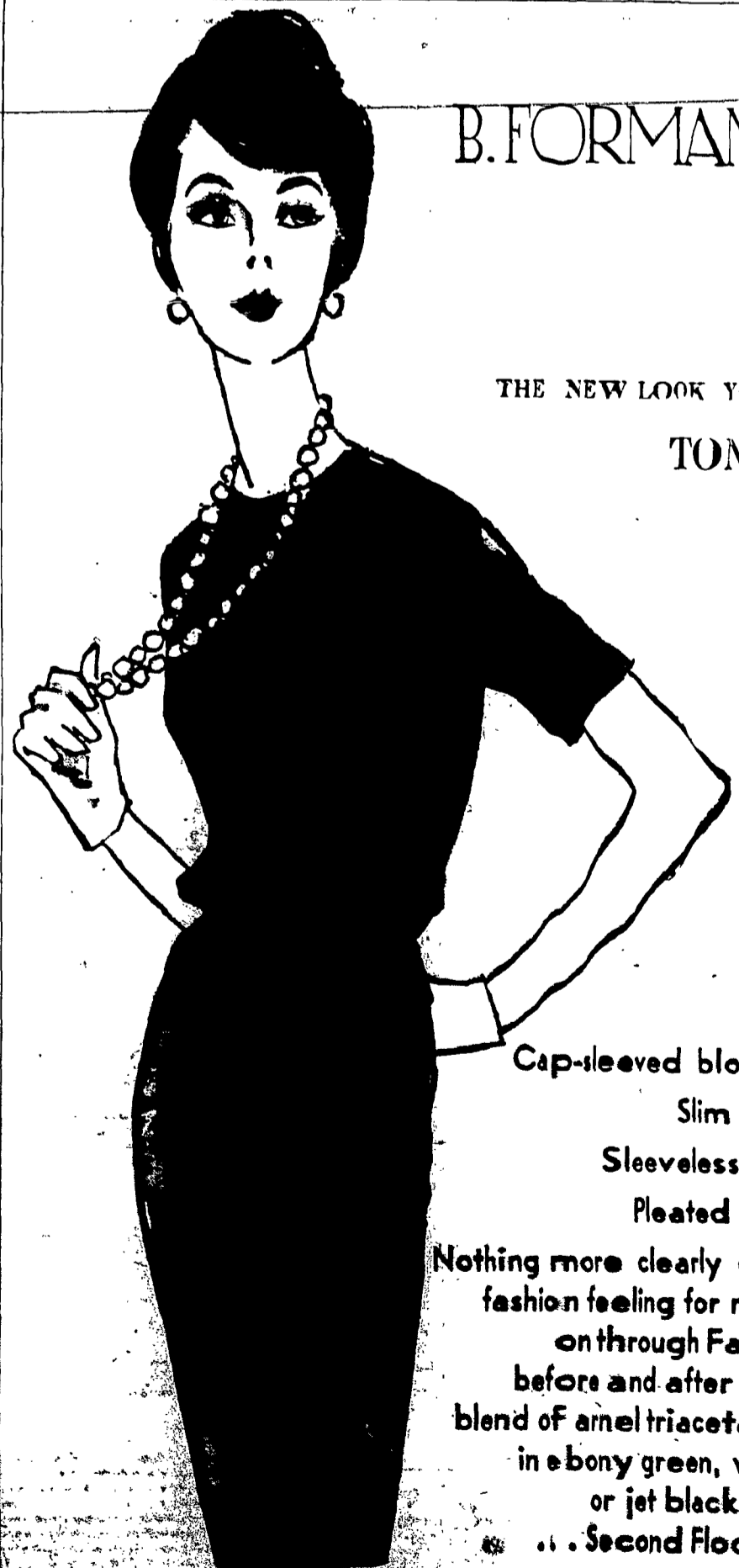
