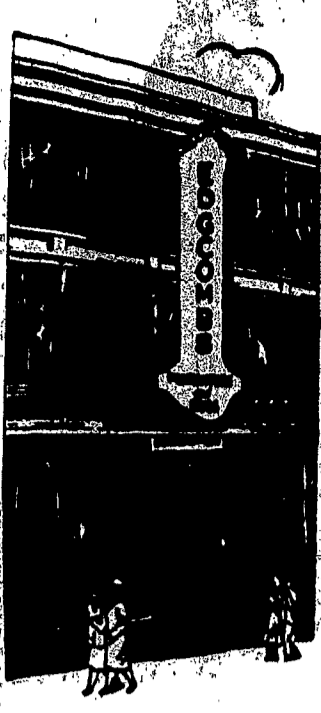
# Want to Join Peace Corps?

Washington — (NC) — Unselfishness and a capacity for hard work will be essential for Peace Corps volunteers, according to the agency coordinating Catholic participation in the project.

Included among the required qualities of a volunteer in a list prepared by the Peace Corps Desk, National Catholic Welfare Conference, are these:

- "A willingness to undertake tasks requiring considerable sustained effort under conditions of discomfort and possibly danger."
- "Interest in the ability to learn the manners, customs, languages and history of peoples with whom he will work."
- "An interest and ability in activities requiring physical stamina."
- "A willingness to perform dull, routine or even unpleasant tasks necessary for the implementation of the program of the Peace Corps without thought or regard to personal gain."
- "Ability to get along and work with others."
- "A sufficient knowledge of the United States — its history, its economy, its government, and its social structure — to permit applicant to impart an understanding to people of other countries."

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## Like A Hundred Years Ago

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## Time To Learn 14th Language

Kuala Lumpur — (RNS) — The first thing the Rev. Xavier S. Thani Nayagam did on arriving here was typical of a man who knows 13 languages. He started to learn his 14th — the Malay tongue.

Father Xavier, who is the new head of the Department of Indian Studies at the University of Malaya, immediately went to the nearest bookshop and bought three Malay primers.

The 47-year-old priest-scholar, a native of Ceylon, explained: "From my experience, I find that the best way to start learning a new language is by using children's books, linguistic records and the Berlitz method."

He said he learned English, Sanskrit, Tamil and Sinhalese in school in Ceylon. Sanskrit is the classical Hindi language, while Tamil and Sinhalese are spoken on Ceylon.

While studying for the priesthood, he learned Latin, Greek and Hebrew. He added Italian while studying at the Pontifical University in Rome, and French, German, Dutch, Spanish and Russian through untutored study.
