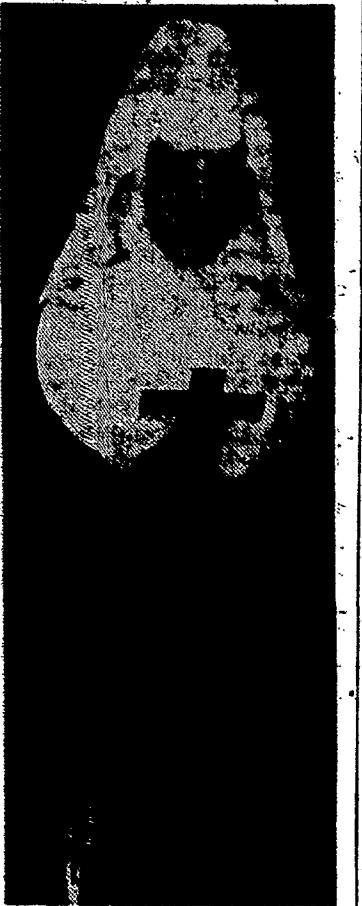
Reception, Profession Rites Held In Allegany

MR. SKIVINGTON, 68, of 7 Rochester St., Scottsville died June 30, 1961 of a heart ailment.

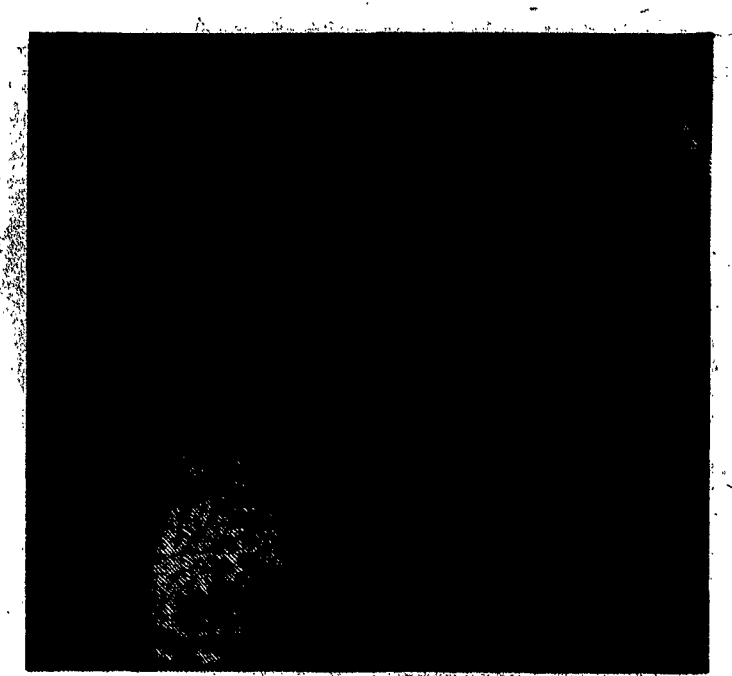
