Golden Jubilee Graduation Rites Slated At St. Josephs

St. Joseph's Hospital School of Nursing will graduate thirty-five young women at its fiftieth annual commencement exercises at St. Peter and Paul's Church, Elmira, on Sunday, July 30, at 4 p.m.

BISHOP KEARNEY will award diplomas and pins and confer honors at this golden jubilee graduation. Commencement exercises will

be followed by Mass offered by Bishop Kearney.

The graduates will be honored at a banquet to be held in the Dunn Memorial Residence following the graduation ceremony with the Bishop as guest of honor.

Other guests will include members of the clergy, Board of Directors of the hospital, the Medical Staff, and the School of Nursing Advisory Committee.

The graduates will entertain their parents at a luncheon at noon of the commencement day at Lib's Supper Club.

Geneva School Raised To Major Seminary

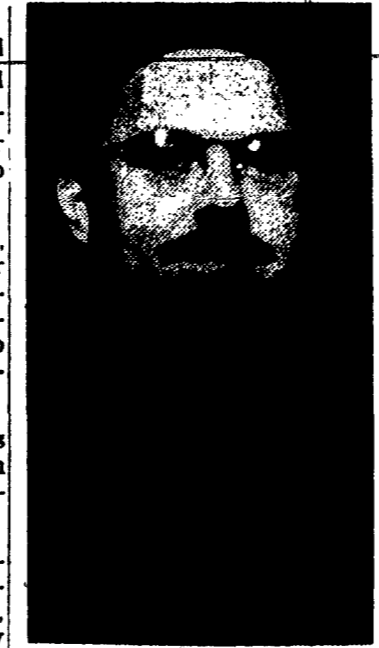
Geneva — Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary of the Capuchin Fathers in Geneva, formerly a minor seminary of high-school level, has been established as a Major Seminary.

The Major Seminary will serve as a house of theological studies where Capuchin students will spend the last four years of their training prior to ordination.

Very Rev. Michael Ristori, O.F.M., has been named rector of the new theological seminary. Father Michael was stationed in Geneva from 1954 to 1957 as rector of the minor seminary.

The minor seminary and its faculty members have been transferred to Staunton, Virginia.

Other members of the monastery and faculty are: the Reverend Fathers Pius Caccavalle, Christopher Pollini, Anthony Giudice, Philip Ragone and Roch Robito.

McAuley Reading Program Marks Tenth Anniversary

Seven hundred and forty youngsters, representing 70 schools, are receiving daily instruction in reading techniques under the auspices of Catherine McAuley College Reading Laboratory during the month of July. Students are instructed in groups of eight, 340 at the college's special services wing, 400 others at the branch laboratories.

SISTER MARY DE PAZZE, director of the entire program, administrators of the various branches are Sister Mary Terence, Holy Cross; Sister Mary Joseph, St. Louis; Sister Mary Rosaria, Holy Family, Auburn; Sister Mary Faith, St. Michael's, Newark. A staff of 82 sisters accepted at the reading laboratory in this program which has been in progress the year around since 1951. Sister Mary Helena serves as registrar, assisted by Sister Mary Malachy.

All students have had a reading achievement test and a personality test so far. Group parent conferences were held this week in all branches to interpret personality test results to parents. Psychological testing is being conducted on an individual basis daily throughout the summer; clinical intelligence, personality, reading and aptitude tests are individually administered and interpreted in follow-up interviews with parents.

Only children of average or above average intelligence are accepted at the reading laboratory. An intensive study of 30 superior children with reading disabilities is being completed

at the lab at the present time. It points up the significant role personality factors play in reading achievement, according to Sister Mary Peter who is directing this research.

Many guests have visited the reading laboratory including school administrators, reading specialists, psychologists, and teachers.

THE CHILDREN reflect a "glad-to-be-here" attitude. They enjoy the experience of being in a reading group where abilities are so well matched that competition is a challenge to which they are equal. A wide variety of teaching media is used, including film-projectors, tape recorders, recordings, dramatic scripts, word games, etc.

Speech diagnosis and therapy are offered in conjunction with the reading program. Sister Mary Plus, speech therapist, conducts classes in speech correction daily in groups of four.
