

Pastors Briefed On Fund Drive

Newly appointed pastors and parish moderators of the "pledge redemption campaign" attended a briefing session on the current Catholic High Schools building program at Sacred Heart Cathedral School hall Monday evening.

TWO NEW high schools are now under construction in Monroe County, one on Kings Highway in Irondequoit and the other on Maiden Lane in the Town of Greece. Both will accommodate 1600 pupils, boys and girls to be taught in separate classrooms by separate staffs. Both are scheduled to open with freshman classes in September, 1962.

At this week's meeting Monsignor John S. Randall, coordinator of the fund drive which topped the \$5,800,000 figure last autumn, reported to the priests on methods to assure pledges made at that time will be met.

Hopes were voiced for continued loyalty of parishioners in prompt payment of pledges.

Million Mark Passed In KC Members

A record 1,143,714 members will be reported at the K. of C. International convention in Denver, Colo., August 15-17. It is announced at the headquarters in New Haven, Conn., this week.

A report, to be given to the convention by Supreme Knight Luke E. Hart, shows that 426,384 of these members have more than \$1.1 billion in insurance in force under the fraternal society's program.

The K. of C. program of Catholic advertising, now in its 13th year, has brought more than 4,100,000 inquiries from readers. It has resulted in the enrollment of more than 425,000 in a free course of religious instruction by mail, conducted by the society's Religious Information Bureau in St.ouis.

The 79th annual convention will draw 400 official delegates, representing 4,894 K. of C. councils located throughout the U.S., Canada, Mexico, Cuba, Puerto Rico and the Philippines. About 5,000 additional Knights and members of their families will take part in the convention program.

Delegates will act upon some 150 resolutions at their concluding session, August 17. These will include such questions as the admission of Red China to the United Nations, Federal aid to education, and the Cuban situation.

Uganda Official Speaks At Mercy

Mr. Aesop Lule, under secretary for school organization in Uganda, Africa spoke on the status of education in Uganda to the faculty and student body of Catherine McAuley College Tuesday.

Mr. Lule, on sabbatical leave from the Office of the Ministry of Education to pursue advanced studies in educational administration at the University of Rochester, is a graduate of the University of London.

HE OPENED his talk with a message of gratitude to the Catholic Church for its great contribution to the education of the African people. "Except for mission schools and the generosity of human and financial resources that makes them possible, most Africans, including myself, would be uneducated today," he said.

Sister Mary de Pazzi, dean of Catherine McAuley College presented Mr. Lule to the congregation. Movies on East Africa were presented in connection with the lecture.

Mr. Lule expressed enthusiastic endorsement of the Peace Corps, mentioning that teachers especially are urgently needed in Africa, and that, since all instruction beyond the sixth grade is in English, language is not a barrier, despite the fact that the natives speak six distinctly different languages.

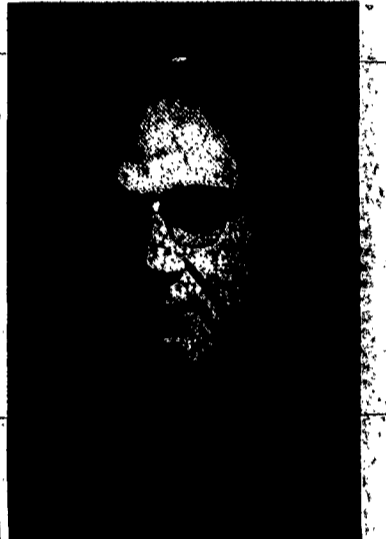
Father Dorsey succeeds Rev. Robert Fischer, who was named director of studies for the Basilian Fathers and recently elected to the General Council of the Basilian Community.

FATHER DORSEY is a native of Syracuse and took his early education in that city. He received a B.A. degree from the University of Toronto in 1938 and was ordained a priest in the Basilian Community in 1942. He taught high school in Detroit and at Aquinas Institute in Rochester.

The new St. John Fisher dean did graduate work in English at the universities of Detroit, Ottawa, and Catholic University. He received his M.A. degree from the latter institution in 1946.

In 1947, Father Dorsey was appointed to St. Michael's College, University of Toronto, and has been on the faculty since that time.

FOR MANY years, Father Dorsey has been active in student affairs and is a well-known preacher in high schools and colleges. He has been a national executive in the World University Service of Canada, national chaplain of the Canadian Federation of Catholic College Students and director of alumni affairs and faculty advisor of the Student's Administrative Council of St. Michael's College.

Hibernians Plan Fete For Guests Of St. Ann's

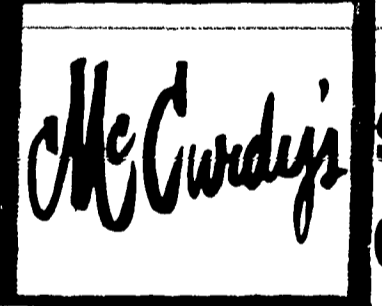

The guests will leave St. Ann's Home on Lake Ave. at 1:30 p.m. and travel by chartered bus to the Hibernian Club.

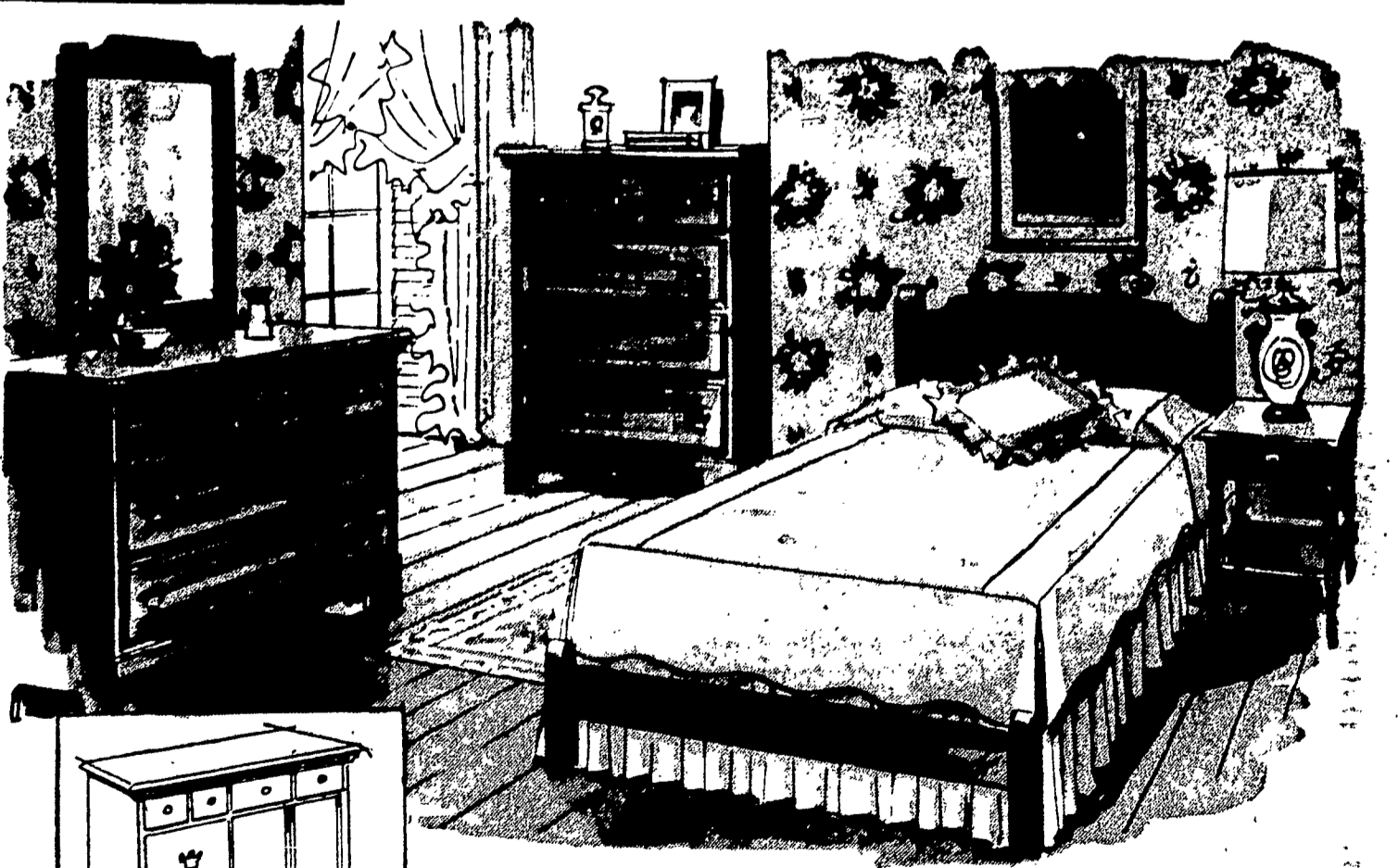
Lunch and other refreshments will be served and the guests will be entertained by music, singing and the dancing of prize-winning Hibernian Dancers.
