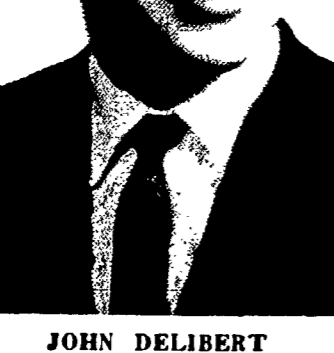

Toronto — (RNS)—A trailer mission which provides seamen in this Great Lakes port with lounging facilities and pastoral counseling was opened on Toronto's waterfront by Jesuit Fathers.

Appointed director of the new Catholic mission was the Rev. E. McGuire, a priest-educator. He is a member of a Toronto clergymen's committee, representing five denominations, which was set up at the request of the Toronto Harbor Commission to aid seamen.

The new trailer will provide seamen an opportunity to watch television, read and consult a priest. Mass will be celebrated in the trailer if it proves feasible, Father McGuire said.

Bible Now In Chinese

Hong Kong — (NC) — Franciscan scholars have completed in translating, and began the first Catholic translation of the entire Bible into Chinese. The work took 16 years. Ten priests worked from the original languages of the Bible to render it, in the words of an official Franciscan publication, "in the common Chinese tongue, with simplicity and elegance." The translating team was led by a Sicilian and included a German as well as several Chinese.

The Old Testament was published in eight volumes, the last of which appeared in 1954. The last of three volumes comprising the New Testament has just come off the press.

Father Gabriel M. Allegra, O.F.M., who has supervised the team of translators since 1945, paid special tribute to the Chinese priests.

"They have brought an originality of thought, integrated with close study and adherence to the spirit of the original text, to bring out the fullest meaning of the Scriptures," he said.

The complete edition will be available to Overseas Chinese throughout the world. It includes detailed commentaries and historical notes.

The translators now will devote their energies to producing a one-volume edition of the Bible.

THE IDEA of translating the Bible into Chinese came to Sicilian-born Father Allegra when he was rector of the mission seminary at Hengyang, in the province of Hunan, a quarter-century ago. He saw that the lack of a Chinese Bible was a great gap in Chinese Catholic life. A Protestant version was considered inadequate, largely because it was translated from the English.

Before sickness sent him back to Europe in 1939, Father Allegra had undertaken an intensive study of Chinese, collect-
