Pondicherry — (RNS) — Thirteen Catholic doctors have pledged themselves here to an hour of free medical treatment daily in the service of the city's poor.

The program was begun at the suggestion of Archbishop Ambrose Rayappan of Pondicherry. It constituted an extension of a junior guild formed three years ago of Catholic students at the government-operated Pondicherry Medical College. These students have won the praise of many observers for their work in assisting the poor sick.

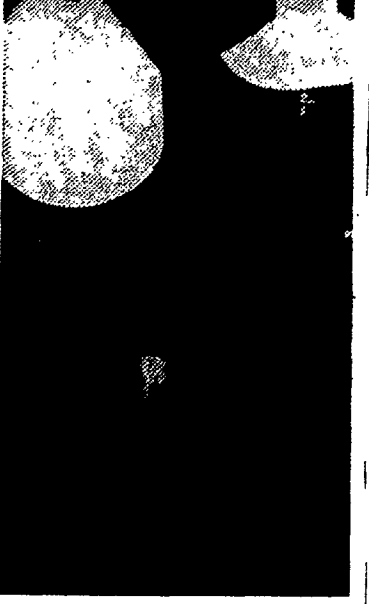

Conferences will run consecutively so that a couple may start on any Sunday and complete the course in four weeks, excepting the holiday Sundays.

A CERTIFICATE will be issued at the completion of the series.

First in the series will be held at St. Ambrose Hall, 31 Empire Blvd., on Sunday, Sept. 3. All conferences begin at 3 p.m. The talks and the question periods following will last approximately one and a half to two hours.

Speakers and their topic for the first series will be: Father Dunn, "God's Plan in Love and Marriage"; Mr. and Mrs. Wilfried Rohrig, "Marriage in Practice"; Dr. Thomas Sweeney, "A Catholic Doctor Looks at Marriage"; Rev. Walter Cushing, "Spirituality in Marriage."

All couples contemplating marriage are invited to these lectures. No reservation is necessary. Registration for the course will be made at the first conference the couple attends. There are no fees but a donation is asked to help defray expenses.

It is reported that almost 500 couples attended the conferences during the year.

Milan — (NC) — A Japanese professor and his wife have been received in the Church after having become interested in Catholicism at the house of the Discalced Carmelites in Tokyo.

Reds Warn Parents

Vienna — (NC) — The Hungarian communist regime is using the recent trial of 12 priests and laymen in Budapest as a pretext for intimidating people who want religious instructions for their children.

It was learned here that the intimidation began the very week the Budapest court handed down its jail sentences against the nine priests and three laymen charged with plotting to overthrow the communist regime.

THE SENTENCES, ranging from two to 12 years, were imposed on June 19. The 12 convicted were deprived of their civil rights and all their belongings were confiscated.

On June 23 and 24, during the very brief period allotted for registration of children for religious instruction, many parents were told what the trial meant: On asking the local headmaster to enroll their children for the religion classes—all held either before or after regular school hours—they were warned they were on dangerous ground.

The Budapest trial had shown, the parents were told, that many priests belong to a reactionary organization of "reactionaries, royalists and hangers-on of the former big landowners and capitalists." Thus if the local priest assigned to give religious instructions turned out to be a member of the secret anti-state group, the parents who asked that their children be taught by him might be in for serious trouble.

State Dept. Asks Prayer

Washington — (NC) — The United States has called upon the people of the world to pray for the success of the nuclear test ban conference in Geneva, Switzerland.

The U.S. document, issued by the State Department, detailed how the Soviet Union has frustrated efforts for three years and 330 sessions of the test ban meeting. The document said everything except prayer has been tried.

"For the sake of humanity, the Soviet Union must reconsider its stand," the document says. "The people of the world must pray that the final effort on the part of the United States and the United Kingdom to conclude a test-ban treaty will be rewarded with success."

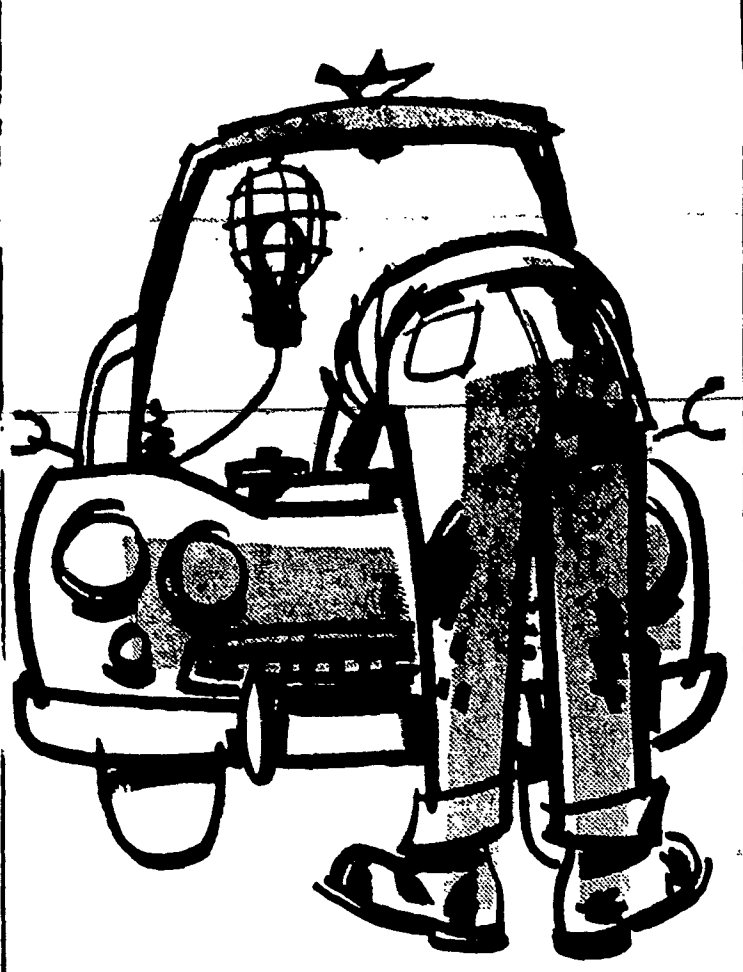
Youth Throng Expected

Washington — (NC) — Cardinal Spellman of New York will offer the closing Pontifical Mass at the sixth national convention of the National Council of Catholic Youth.
