Billion For New Churches
Washington — (RNS) — Church construction totaled \$340,000,000 during June, the Department of Commerce reported here, equalling a record for the month established last year.

Construction by non-public schools and colleges reached \$50,000,000 during June, exceeding by \$4,000,000 the figure for June, 1960. The Commerce Department now forecasts that building activity by non-public educational institutions, many of which are church-related, will total \$610,000,000 this year, compared to a revised figure of \$566,000,000 for 1960.

Editors To Discuss Pope's Encyclical
New York — (NC) — Two Catholic editors will discuss the recent encyclical Mater et Magistra by His Holiness Pope John XXIII on the CBS-TV work program "Lamp Unto My Feet" from 10 to 10:30 a.m. on Sept. 3. The program is carried on WVET-TV Channel 10 in Rochester.

The editors are Father Raymond T. Bosler, editor of the Criterion, Indianapolis archdiocesan newspaper, and Donald J. Thorman, managing editor of Ava Maria, weekly magazine published at Notre Dame, Ind.

The program has been designed as a special for Labor Day to interpret new social teachings. The Catholic portions of the "Lamp Unto My Feet" program are produced in cooperation with the National Council of Catholic Men.

New York — (RNS) — An Alabama priest shared honors with such distinguished theatrical names as Lindsay and Crouse, Mary Hammerstein as the National Catholic Theatre Conference concluded its convention here by honoring outstanding work in the field for 1960-61.

Father Anthony Zoghby of Mobile was involved in two awards. The Little Theatre Guild, which he founded and supervises, won a conference award for community theatre work, while Father Zoghby himself was given the \$500 Alfred E. Van Horn award for his supervisory activity.

As they completed their convention here, the delegates elected the Rev. Gilbert V. Hartke, O.P., head of the drama department at Catholic University, Washington, D.C., as conference president for the 1961-62 year. He succeeds the Rev. Gabriel Stapleton.

New Vice President of the conference is Robert Smitt, news editor of the Catholic Courier Journal.

Father Hartke earlier had been awarded a silver Jubilee trophy award which cited his work at Catholic University where more than 200 plays Other award winners have been produced under his supervision. He is a member of the President's Committee for the Arts and is also a member of the American National Theatre and Academy.

Endorsed By Vatican

Vatican Radio recalled "the strong stand taken by the United States bishops in their 1958 statement on discrimination and the Christian conscience." It said that statement had been "an unmistakably clear call for action."

English At Mass
Oklahoma City — (RNS) — Hundreds of the more than 2,300 participants in the 122nd North American Liturgical Week were reported to have signed petitions for greater use of English in the Catholic liturgy, even to the extent of eventually having the Mass all in the vernacular instead of in Latin.
The petitions will be forwarded to the Secretariat for Promoting Christian Unity, set up in Rome in preparation for the Second Vatican Council.

August Cardinal Bea, S.J., president of the secretariat, recently requested Catholics to speak-out-on-the-question-of Latin versus the vernacular.
Father H. A. Reinhold of Pittsburgh, Pa., a member of the National Catholic Liturgical Conference's board of directors, told the sessions he believes that Pope John XXIII is in favor of vernacular and that he hopes for a change to it in the Mass are planned on the forthcoming Ecumenical Council.

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
