FATHER GILLIGAN leaves his present position as director

of students at St. Ann's Monastery, Scranton, Pa., for his new mission apostolate in the Far East. His priestly life has been devoted to training and education of Passionist students for the priesthood. He taught philosophy in Passionist monastery seminaries in Jamaica, N.Y., Dunkirk, N.Y., Boston, Mass., West Hartford, Conn. and Scranton.

Born May 2, 1920 in Rochester, Father Gilligan attended Holy Apostles parochial school and St. Andrew's Seminary high school in Rochester, and Holy Cross Passionist Preparatory Seminary, Dunkirk, N.Y. He was professed a Passionist Aug. 15, 1941 at St. Paul's Monastery, Pittsburgh, Pa. Following studies at Passionist monastery seminaries in the East, he was ordained a priest Feb. 26, 1948 at St. Michael's Monastery by Bishop James A. McNulty of Paterson, N.J. Following his ordination, he went to Rome, Italy for graduate studies at the Angelicum College where he obtained a doctorate in philosophy.

He is a brother of Paul Gilligan and Mrs. John Mastrella, both of Rochester, and Mrs. Robert Heffron of Sunnyvale, California.

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Legion of Mary Praised For Info Booth At Fair

"The Most Precious Blood" was the theme of the Catholic Information exhibit sponsored by the Rochester Comitium of the Legion of Mary at Monroe County Fair, last week.

Attention of visitors was focused on a central display of a painting of the Crucifixion with drops of the Precious Blood trickling into a gold chalice. This painting was made and given by a Brother from Saint Michael's Mission House and portrayed the theme of the exhibit. Red draperies were placed along both sides of the painting. Colored posters of the Consecration were placed on either side to recall the words of Jesus spoken when He was on earth "This is My Body." An altar prepared for Mass was erected and a mannequin of a Priest vested for Mass was placed in front of the altar. White draperies decorated with gold formed the background of the altar.

Another feature on display was a Legion of Mary altar. Blue draperies formed the background for the altar and a poster of the basic duties of active Legionnaires was placed on the wall next to the altar. It was noted that several visitors, fascinated by the display, paused in front of the Legion

altar, and Legionnaires found themselves continually explaining the Legion. This was also the focal point for signing up Auxiliary members.

PAMPHLET RACKS were placed along one wall displaying a large number of pamphlets for teenagers, many of the Sacraments and various other titles. Two thousand pamphlets were distributed. Two thousand Catholic Comic Books donated by a publisher were distributed. In addition other pamphlets of known interest were displayed. Catholic magazines, such as The Catholic Digest, St. Jude, Ave Maria, Li-gurian and nine other Scapulars and Miraculous Medals were given out. A generous offering was given by the Pius Mission Guild of Nazareth Academy and a selection of various pamphlets was purchased with this amount. A rug loaned by a local furniture store covered most of the floor space.

The booth was staffed by 90 Legionnaires scheduled to work in two hour shifts. They were assisted by six St. Bernard Semarians, who donated several hours at the booth.

Among visitors was Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, who on visiting the exhibit, congratulated Legionnaires and spoke of the exhibit as being "very attractive."

Mayor Peter Barry admired the exhibit and praised Legionnaires for their work in the Lay Apostolate.

The Legion of Mary appreciates the large number of visitors who called and although it may be many years before the far-reaching effects of these Legion contacts are realized, it is felt that every Catholic came away better informed and inspired to do something for his faith.

Arthur Stedziewski directed operations under the guiding hand of Comitium Director, Rev. James Marvin, while Mrs. Mary Schell directed Legionnaires as staff workers.

'Undertow of Past'

Denver — (NC) — Communism is "the undertow of the past," not "the wave of the future," the head of the Knights of Columbus said here.

Supreme Knight Luke E. Hart declared that communism is "a system contrived for the degradation of men by dragging them backward and downward into the dark ages of slavery."

Hart addressed an audience of 1,500 at a dinner Tuesday, Aug. 15, during the 79th annual convention of the Catholic Men's fraternal society, which has more than 1.1 million members in the U.S., Canada, Mexico, Cuba, Puerto Rico and the Philippines.

AT THE OPENING session of the convention Supreme Knight Hart read messages of greetings from Pope John XXIII, President Kennedy, Canadian Prime Minister John Diefenbaker and the papal delegates to the U.S., Canada and the Philippines.

In his address to the convention dinner Hart expressed dismay at "persons of apparently sound mind and honest purpose" who display "excessive eagerness to be... 'good sports'" when it comes to judging communism.

"There appears to be an extraordinary and mystifying urge to compromise everything in sight... for the convenience of international scoundrels who

"It will be an evil day for our nation — or any nation — when separation of Church and State is equated with separation of man from his God," Hart added.

Noting that Pope Pius XII described laymen as not merely members of the Church, but as "being the Church," he said.

"As not only members of the Church, but as 'the Church,' we must each be a living gospel which may easily be read by all — in which Christ may be seen as the way, the truth and the life by all whose lives are touched by ours."
