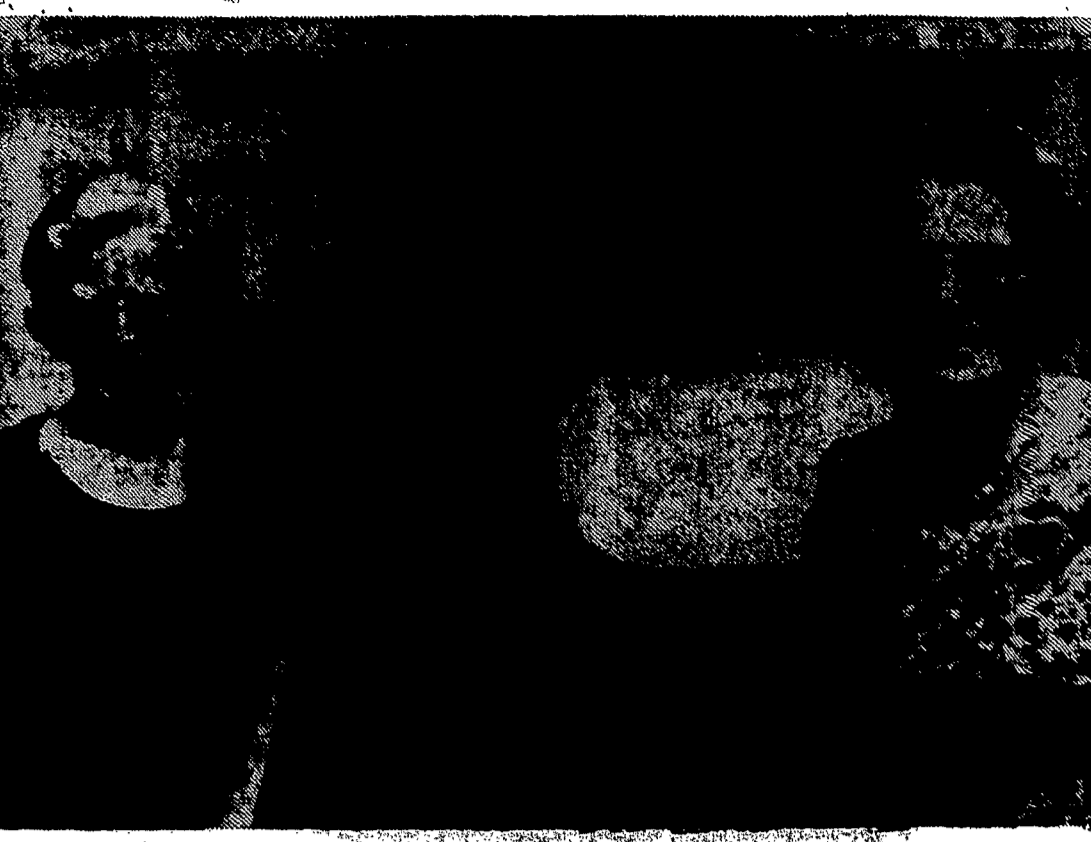

The Elmira K. of C. Track Club athletes took part in their final meet of the year when they competed recently in the 27th Firefighters Track and Field Meet at Buffalo.

The club, up against some stiff opposition, but yet with spirits reinforced by participation in the First New York State AAU Track and Field Championships held at Elmira August 19, returned home with two third place ties.

GLENN MALLETT, club coach and an AAU commissioner, accompanied 10 lads to Buffalo.

Showing well enough in the pole vault to earn a third place tie was Colin Chvany.

Jim Williams gained a trophy on his third place finish in the broad jump.

Two outstanding area football standouts made a fine showing by gaining the semi-finals in the talent-laden 100-yard dash feature. They were Tom Salmon, who Coach Jim Haggerty is counting on to boost Notre Dame High's grid fortunes from the quarterback slot, and Henry Green, Elmira Free Academy speed merchant.

Green was especially hampered by a troublesome sinus condition at Buffalo.

Marv Rouse, New York State AAU broad jump champion and a strong favorite in that event in the Firefighters Meet, had to return to Winona State (Minnesota) College, where he is a senior, and could not compete.

FIVE AREA high schools were represented on the K. of C. team. They were Notre Dame, EFA, Southside, Horseheads and Odesa.

K. of C. Track Club members and fans who accompanied them were especially pleased as they watched the Tarrytown Spiked Shoe Club, State AAU champs in both relays run at Elmira, streak to the national championship in the 440-yard relay.

The same team that electrified the Elmira fans — Al Washington, Lee Prins, Bud Blenheim and John Parker — came within three seconds of the national mark.

All relays run in conjunction with the Firefighters Meet are conducted for the national championships.

## Colleges Expand Co-op Courses

St. John Fisher and Nazareth Colleges will enter the second stage of a program designed to integrate academic programs and facilities next week when students begin crisscrossing between the two campuses to take advantage of courses not offered by their own colleges.

A TOTAL OF 11 cooperative courses will be offered during the coming academic year, six at Nazareth and five at St. John Fisher. When the program was launched last February only one class in Biology was available to students of both colleges.

In making the announcement yesterday, Sister Helen Daniel, president of Nazareth and the Rev. Charles J. Lavery, president of St. John Fisher, pointed out that the much broader academic alliance scheduled for this year is an indication of how well the educational experiment has succeeded.

"The results of both our pilot class in Biology and the joint summer school program conducted by Fisher and Nazareth have been highly encouraging," said Father Lavery. "We feel that this year's expanded cooperative program is the logical next step in the experiment."

DURING THE coming year, Nazareth students will be able to take two courses in anatomy at St. John Fisher as well as attend classes in comparative Animal Physiology, Advanced Physics and Chemistry. St. John Fisher students will study art, Russian, Bacteriology, History of Mathematics, Differential Equations and Chemistry at the women's college.

The two colleges began their unique educational experiment last February with the aim of "providing an academic program of the highest calibre, while keeping the cost of education down as far as possible." The plan, when fully implemented, will sharply increase the scope and variety of courses available to students at the two colleges. In addition, students will benefit from expanded research facilities, such as libraries and laboratories.

The two colleges, located within one half mile of each other on East Avenue in suburban Rochester, have a total enrollment of nearly 1,500 students (including Catholics and members of other religious denominations) and combined facilities of over 120, lay and religious.
