

Catholic Women's Club Schedules Year's Events

Two events planned by the program committee of the Catholic Women's Club will start their activities for the fall season.

Fifty members selected by their membership chairman, Mrs. Ronald J. McDonald will meet for luncheon at the Chatterbox Club to receive their cards for renewal of present memberships at 12:15 on Friday, Sept. 22. At the same time plans will be made for extending invitations to Catholic women to identify themselves with the Club.

THE DRIVE is particularly significant since it marks the beginning of the 40th year of the Club.

Incorporated to "promote works of an educational and charitable character and the improvement of the religious, intellectual and, as far as possible, the temporal welfare of young women," the Club has fulfilled the purpose for which it was founded, a spokesman said.

These and other interests provide an outlet for those Catholic women who will find enjoyment and satisfaction in being a part of the life of the community.

The drive will continue for two weeks.

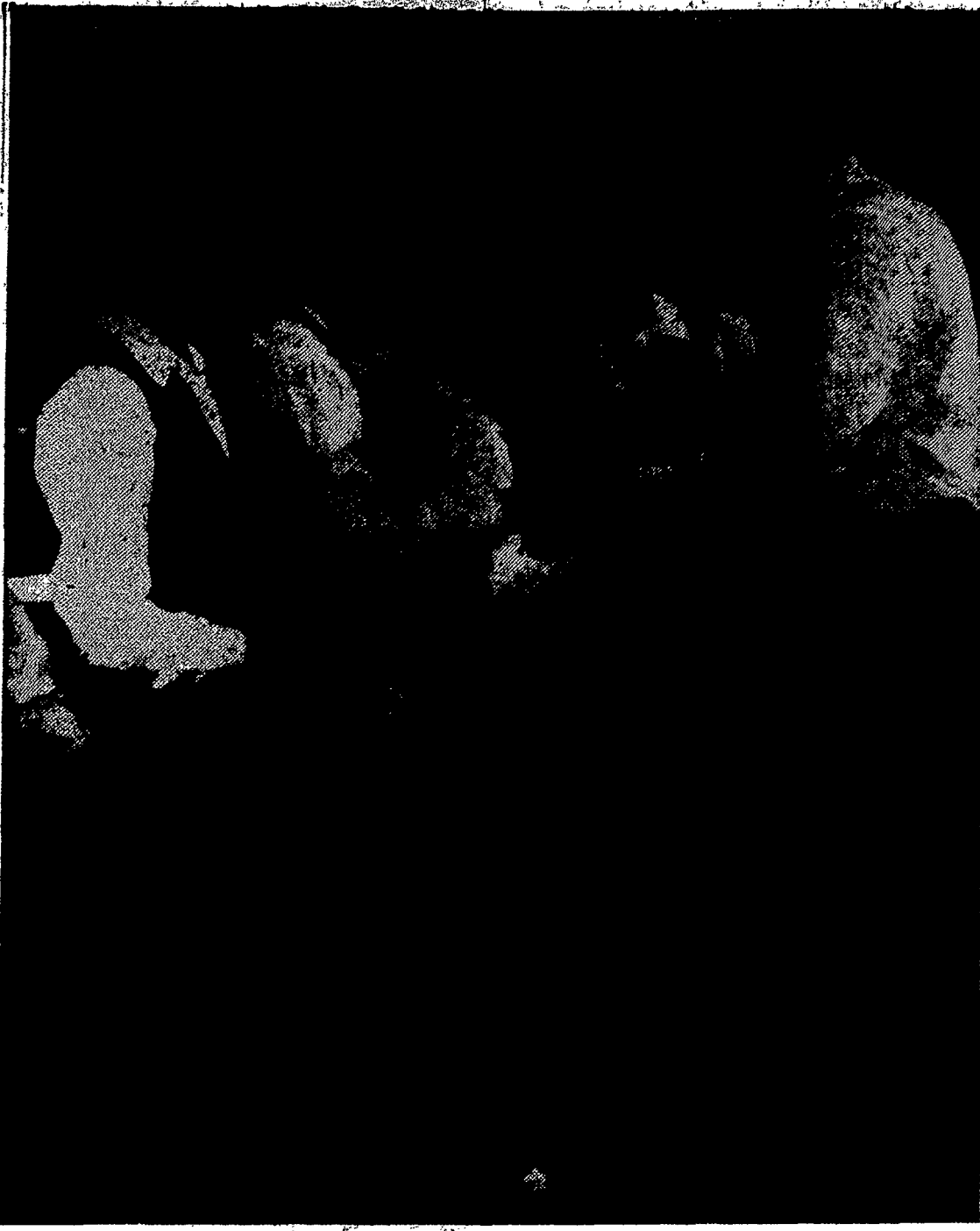
With the growth of interest Catholic interest in Medical Missions, members of the Club welcome the opportunity to hear the speaker.

Another event being planned is the Jubilee banquet to be held that night in the Community War Memorial.

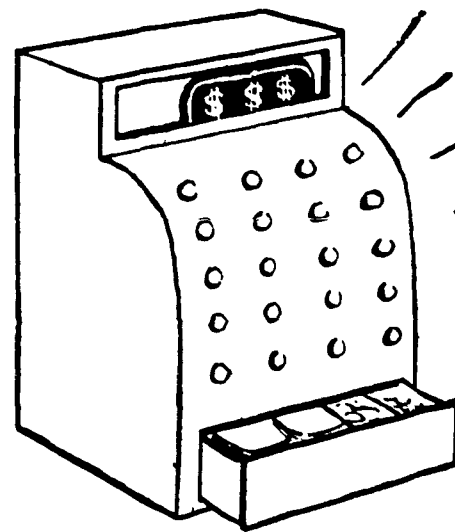
Reception
