

McQuaid Knights Open Grid Season At Auburn

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Waterloo — The family of Rev. Francis J. Taney, M. M. wishes to thank all who so kindly helped to make his project for the Philippines such a great success.



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The new look will be very much in evidence in the McQuaid Jesuit High School line-up when the Knights open their 1961 football campaign next Saturday night against Mount Carmel at Auburn.

McQUAID coach, Joe Mancarella and assistant Tom Seymour could count only a dozen holdovers among the 60 grid-ers who turned out for the first practice session, and only half of that small nucleus will be starting at their accustomed spots.

Probably the most important vacancy to be filled is at quarterback. Senior Tom McHugh, a lineman last year, and juniors Paul McConville and Dick Spies are all working at that slot, but it will take a few scrimmages before a clear-cut first line man emerges. Whoever he is, he'll have two seasoned runners in fullback Mike DiGregorio and halfback Tony Zollo, with another newcomer, junior Bill Bruckel, filling the third running position.

DiGregorio, who carried for a 6-yard average and 3 touchdowns last year, is getting stiff competition from junior Dick Burns, and Zollo, hobbled by a leg injury, may give way to junior Joe Hallett. With Bruckel, the speed man, apparently set, Mancarella could well wind up with an all-junior backfield on opening night.

Up front, veterans Al Maher at end, Bill Soehner at tackle, and Joe Pilato and Henry Cashette at guards are set as starters, though Soehner, at 250 the heaviest man on the squad, will play only on defense. Another letterman, Ted Fink, who played mostly as a defensive line-backer last year, has been switched to tackle and, despite his 170 pounds, rates in his coaches' books as a key man.

TWO JUNIORS up from the J.V. man the other two for-

ward spots, Tom Fuerst at center and Dick Kleisley at a wing. Keeping the pressure on these still-inventive starters are seniors Al Wagner and juniors Jim Pezzulo, Steve Tisa, and Tom Walther. They'll figure prominently in any platooning the Knights do.

Despite the squad's predominant greenness Mancarella looks for an improvement, possibly a decided one, over last year's 2-6 record. His team will have over a month of grooming before its first home appearance.

Four road games — Mount Carmel, Hornell, Bishop Walsh of Olean, and Livonia — are scheduled before the home opener against Christian Brothers Academy of Syracuse on October 21. C.B.A. is one of two new foes the Knights will meet this year. The second is Canisius of Buffalo, who'll invade the Clinton Ave. campus on October 28.

Boy Friend Stumps Speed Reader

New Orleans — (NC) — They'd better stock up on books at Loyola University's library.

Mary Jo Hunt of Atlanta, Ga., has arrived on campus and she's rarin' to read.

Mary Jo, a freshman scholarship student majoring in social science, reads at the rate of 11,300 words a minute. She can finish several books an hour. The 284,000 words of the best-selling novel "Exodus" took her about 25 minutes.

Her reading is not merely fast, either. When she finishes a book she can give a summary and quote passages that appealed to her.

"I took a reading dynamics course," she said. "Now I feel I've been given the golden key to all the libraries in the world. And believe me, I aim to use that key."

But Mary Jo's skills don't help her at all with one big reading problem—letters from her boy friend.

"His handwriting is so terrible I not only can't read his letters fast, sometimes I can't read them at all," she said.

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
