Funeral Mass for Sister M. Celesta Brady of the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph was offered in Nazareth Convent, 4245 East Ave., Pittsford on Saturday, Sept. 16.

SISTER CELESTA who entered her community in 1899 died Sept. 13, 1961 at Nazareth Convent.

Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Albert H. Schnacky assisted by the Rev. James Slattery, deacon; and the Rev. R. Richard Brickler, subdeacon. The Rev. Daniel Brent was also in the Sanctuary.

Sister Celesta taught in old St. Patrick's School, Corpus Christi School, St. John's School, Greece; Holy Apostles and St. Francis Xavier Schools before being assigned to St. Peter and Paul's School, Elmira.

A native of Ireland, Sister Celesta retired as a teacher in 1956.

She is survived by a niece

and nephew, both in Buffalo.

St. Isaac Jogues, St. Rene Goupil and St. John LaLande, received the crown of martyrdom in this village after intense sufferings inflicted by their captors.
