

# Aquinas Rips Corning, Jerry Gears Glitters

Aquinas Institute's Little Irish unveiled another potent football machine last Friday evening — smashing Corning Free Academy, 14-0, with a display of talent and poise.

Fullback Jerry Gears scored a brace of touchdowns with big Jim Chatterton adding the extra points.

Gears, a senior, sprinted 20 yards for one score and dashed 50 yards off a double reverse for the other.

THE GAME, broadcast over a Corning network, was played in Corning Memorial Stadium before a capacity crowd of over 5,000.

After the game Irish coach Joe Repko admitted, "Our defense performed better than expected from pre-season indications. I have very confidence now that we're going to be real strong — as we were last year — on defense. Our boys are hitting with authority, letting the other guy know they are on the field."

Next Sunday Aquinas will open at home against Bishop Fallon of Buffalo. Last year Aquinas romped over an inexperienced Fallon team, 41-7.

The Fallon eleven will remain a question mark until kickoff time at 2 p.m. Sunday at Aquinas Memorial Stadium.

The Irish will outweigh the visitors up front, averaging 187 to Fallon's 170. However, Fallon is reported to have a lot of pep in the backfield with veteran Vince Sanchez in the quarterback slot. Both starting halfbacks, Joe Grifasi and Bob Zucarelli, are experienced with speedy George Lanke, a sophomore, at fullback.

## CYO In The News

THE NEW season of swim and gym classes for girls of elementary school age is beginning this week at the C.Y.O., 50 Chestnut Street.

These classes, consisting of calisthenics, tumbling, trampolines, etc., in the gymnasium, and swimming instructions in the pool, are held on Mondays and Fridays from four until six in the afternoon throughout the school year; that is, from September until school closes in June.

In the gymnasium, these girls who learn quickly and display a particular aptitude for all phases of gym work, have the opportunity of joining the C.Y.O. Gym Team. A Gym Circus is planned each year, in which all gym classes participate.

THE INSTRUCTION in the swimming pool is primarily aimed at Water Safety, or "waterproofing" each girl. In addition to teaching the fundamental water skills as outlined by the American Red Cross Water Safety Department, the C.Y.O. offers the possibility of joining either the Swim Team or the "Aq-Colleens."

Each year, those girls who have reached twelve years of age and have the required ability in swimming are given a course in Junior Life-Saving. The C.Y.O. Women and Girls' Annual Water Show includes all the girls who are active members in its program of events.

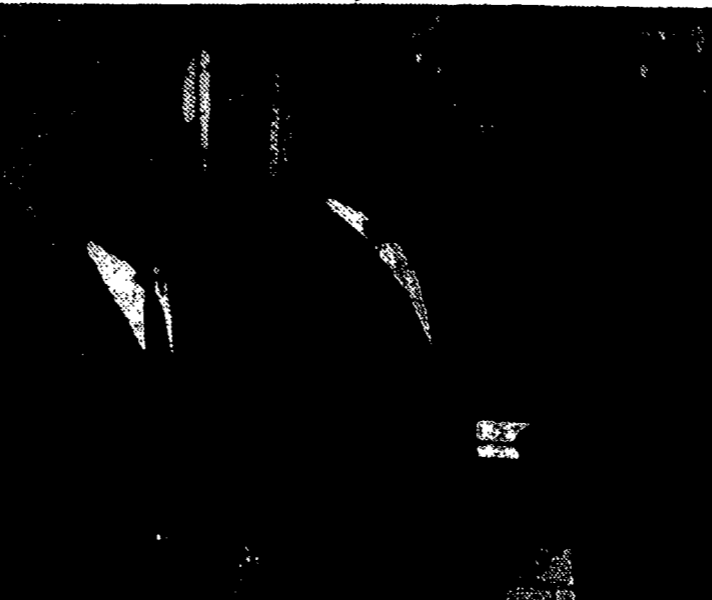
