## Reds Quote Pope John

London — (RNS) — Paradoxically, atheist newspapers and radio stations in Communist countries have so far devoted more space and time than the religious press to Pope John XXIII's recent encyclical, Mater et Magistra (Mother and Teacher).

Soviet Premier Khrushchev's comments on the encyclical have been given lavish publicity by the Russian and satellite press and radio, and various atheistic publications in the Iron Curtain countries continue to discuss the encyclical. That these comments are sharply critical does not lessen the obvious importance attached to it in the Communist World.

Argument (Arguments), organ of the Polish Atheist Societies published in Warsaw, provided a prime example of Red interest in the papal document when it devoted 13 full pages to the encyclical in recent editions.

## Sick Calls Restricted

Ernakulam — (RNS)—Secular and Catholic newspapers in India have attacked restrictions placed by Indian Health Minister V. K. Veluppan on the ministrations of Catholic priests to the sick and dying in state-operated hospitals.

Criticism stemmed from a ruling by the health minister which requires that priests must have permission of hospital officials to make sick calls and that all prayers and services be held in chapels or in places assigned by the institutions.

The ruling was believed to be the result of an incident here in the state-operated General Hospital when a medical officer took objection to a Catholic chaplain hearing confessions after normal visiting hours were over.

## Bible Study Center

Beuron — (RNS) — A new wing at the 900-year-old Benedictine Archabbey of Beuron was dedicated here by Archbishop Hermann Schaeufele of Freiburg for use by a world-famous institute on Bible research.

Foundation stone for the expansive addition was laid last year by Augustin Cardinal Bea, head of the Vatican Secretariat for Promoting Christian Unity and a member of the Pontifical Commission of Biblical Studies. The wing will house the Vetus Latina (Ancient Latin) Institute, which had been placed provisionally in another part of the monastery.

Gathering whatever has been left intact from the fragments of old Latin Bible texts, members of the Institute compare their findings to the standard Vulgate Bible completed by St. Jerome in the first decade of the 5th century.

To recreate the past, scholars at the Institute use modern tools of science. Housed in the new wing is a chemical laboratory, tape recorders, electrical typewriters, x-ray and microfilm equipment.

On the research staff of the Institute are eight Beuron monks and eight laymen, including two Protestants.

At the time of his death in 1927, Father Denk gave some 300,000 notes to the Beuron monastery for the continuance of his work which led to the foundation of the Institute after World War II. The complex project is financed by Catholic and Protestant authorities and groups, as well as by numerous West German cultural and scientific organizations.

## Police Feast

"There are people starving in the world," he said, "because of the imbalance between population and resources."

And he acknowledged he knew of no way to solve such problems in the near future, "even in the next decade."

Widespread "promotion of immoral methods" of limiting population, such as contraception, will not work, he said. It would be too expensive and take too long even if planned parenthood exponents were able to promote it with U.S. funds.

"Nobody can offer an easy solution," he said. "I think the population expansion does have some meaning in the history of mankind. It is a challenge to man for the

higher moral standards, for more technical advances to secure regulation which are in accordance with God's Natural Law. And it is a challenge to our social and political organizations. Better social organization is needed between the different countries," he stated.

## No Bells At Night

Montreal — (RNS) — Paul Emile Cardinal Leger, Archbishop of Montreal, ordered here that church, chapel and convent bells in his See shall not be rung before 8 a. m., or after 8 p. m., so that people especially ailing persons, could rest at night.

Cardinal Leger said exceptions could be made on Christmas night, the vigil of Easter and the Feast of Corpus Christi.

He added that care should always be taken to ring bells discreetly so that there would be no unnecessary noise added to the ever-present city din.
