

**New Ceramics At St. Pius X**

FOUR FIGURES of glazed terra cotta are now over the altar of St. Pius X Church. The figures are the work of Felix Oudin, a well known sculptor of Paris. An exhibition of his works was seen by Father Murphy during a visit in Paris in 1960. They represent two children making their first Holy Communion, and below the figure of St. Pius X is his coat of arms. The group weighs about 600 pounds, and in mounting them, the members of the parish used care to cement the hooks that support them in the wall.

**St. Joseph Sisters To Confer**

Nazareth Academy will be host to the Sixth Annual Educational Conference of the Sisters of St. Joseph in the Rochester Diocese today (Friday, October 13) at 845 Amer. according to Reverend Mother M. Helene, general superior of the Sisters of St. Joseph.

The program will open with Mass, celebrated by the Rev. Charles Connell, in the school auditorium. Following the Mass, Reverend Mother Helene will welcome the sisters.

About 700 sisters from the elementary, high schools, and the college where the sisters of St. Joseph teach are expected.

The Very Rev. Peter-Thomas Rohrbach, O.C.D., will deliver the keynote address this morning on the subject, "Responsibilities and Privileges of the Religious Teachers." Father Rohrbach will also address the light of modern psychology and theology.

SPEAKER IS the superior of the Discalced Carmelite Monastery in Washington, D.C. He was born, raised, and educated in the New York area, and went to college in Washington. Father Rohrbach received his degree at the Catholic University of America. He has written articles for the Catholic World, the Sign, Ave Maria, and the Catholic Digest. He has also written four books, two of them novels.

Father Rohrbach's latest book, "The Search for Saint Therese," an examination into controversial questions concerning this Carmelite nun, is a reexamination of her life in light of modern psychology and theology.

The Rev. William M. Roche, superintendent of schools, will

address the Sisters at 3 p.m. and close the conference with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

Sectional meetings will be conducted by experts in specialized fields. Among the speakers are: Herbert E. Wilkins, associate supervisor of Foreign Language Education, on "Implementing the New Syllabus"; R. S. Beeler, H. L. Gibson, and L. Wall of the Eastman Kodak Company, speaking on "The Use of Photography in Science Teaching."

Also Miss Elizabeth George of the International Business Machines Company, on "Computers and Education"; Dr. Herman Schneider on "New Trends in Elementary Science." Sister M. Sylvia, S.S.J., of Mt. St. Joseph, Buffalo, will speak on "The Pageant of Literature Program."

**30th Annual CYO Drive Nears Goal**

The CYO will wind up its thirtieth annual membership meeting Tuesday night, Oct. 17, with a dinner meeting at Columbus Civic Center. Nearly 200 men and women workers have been actively engaged in the drive since the first report meeting of Thursday, Oct. 5. **Diocesan Council Conclave Slated Here Oct. 20, 21**

The 27th annual Convention of the Rochester Diocesan Council of Catholic Women will be held on Friday and Saturday, Oct. 20 and 21 at the Rochester Chamber of Commerce. The Convention theme, "Catholic Women—Source of Unity," will be developed by relating it to the various committees of the Council.

PRECEDING THE general sessions on Friday, Rev. E. Leo McMannus, Diocesan Council Moderator, will celebrate a Mass for Board members at Our Lady of Victory Church, with a dinner and special Board meeting immediately following at the Chamber. Mrs. Charles Lehr is the dinner chairman.

General registration of delegates will be at 7:30 p.m. in the Chamber lobby. Highlighting the opening session at 8 p.m., will be a talk by Auxiliary Bishop Casey who will be introduced by Father McMannus, session chairman.

The Bishop's topic, "Organizing for Unity," will emphasize the importance of group activity for Catholic women. Mrs. R. D. Waterman, Diocesan Organization and Development Chairman, will then present an outline of her committee's work. A general discussion led by Mrs. Theodore Strohmeier, former Diocesan Council president, will follow with a social hour concluding the evening's activities.

The traditional Mass at 9:30 a.m. in St. Mary's Church will

open the Saturday program. This is to be a dialogue Mass read by Bishop Kearney, Episcopal Moderator of the Council. Following Mass, delegates will register and obtain their official program at the Chamber. At 11 a.m. they will assemble according to subject preference in designated meeting rooms where various aspects of the Convention theme will be discussed.

"PERSONAL UNITY" will be outlined by Rev. Paul Cuddy. Mrs. William Noonan and Miss Ruth Ashburn, Diocesan Chairmen, respectively, of the Spiritual Development and the "Civic Unity" — Donald E. Robinson, Keynote Speaker; Mrs. F. P. Hommel and Mrs. Michael Culhane, Cooperating With Social Agencies and Public Relations Chairmen; Mrs. Leonard Oliver, Discussion Leader. "International Unity" — Rt. Rev. Msgr. John E. Maney, Keynote Speaker; Miss Josephine Fitzgerald and Miss Eve Firra, Foreign Relief and International Relations Chairmen; Mrs. Jack Williams, Discussion Leader.

Climax of the Convention will be the luncheon in the great hall at 1 p.m. Mrs. Albert R. Spillman, vice-president of the World Union of Catholic Women's Organizations, will be the principal speaker. Bishop Kearney will also address the group and Mrs. Michael Malko, New York State Director of the National Council, will bring greetings from that organization. Names of incoming Diocesan Council officers will be announced and Literature Committee will then explain the relationship of their committee to this subject. A general discussion led by Mrs. George E. Ketchum will follow. The same pattern will be used for the other three meetings.

**St. Mary's School To Be Blessed**

Auburn—Bishop Kearney will dedicate St. Mary's new school in Auburn on Sunday, Oct. 15, at 4 p.m.

Present will be Rt. Rev. Msgr. James D. Cuffney V.F., Rev. John T. Walsh and Rev. James A. Williams, of St. Mary's, the priests of the Cayuga Deaneery and representatives of the City and County of Cayuga.

Also present will be Rt. Rev. Msgr. John E. Maney, Chancellor of the Diocese, Rev. Edward McAniff, secretary to the Bishop and Rev. William M. Roche, superintendent of schools for the Diocese.

MONSIGNOR CUFFNEY signed the contract for the new school in September, 1960. The parishioners had pledged \$282,000 for the school building in May, 1960. The school was built on a 14 acre plot at 17 Clymer Street, 700 feet from South St.

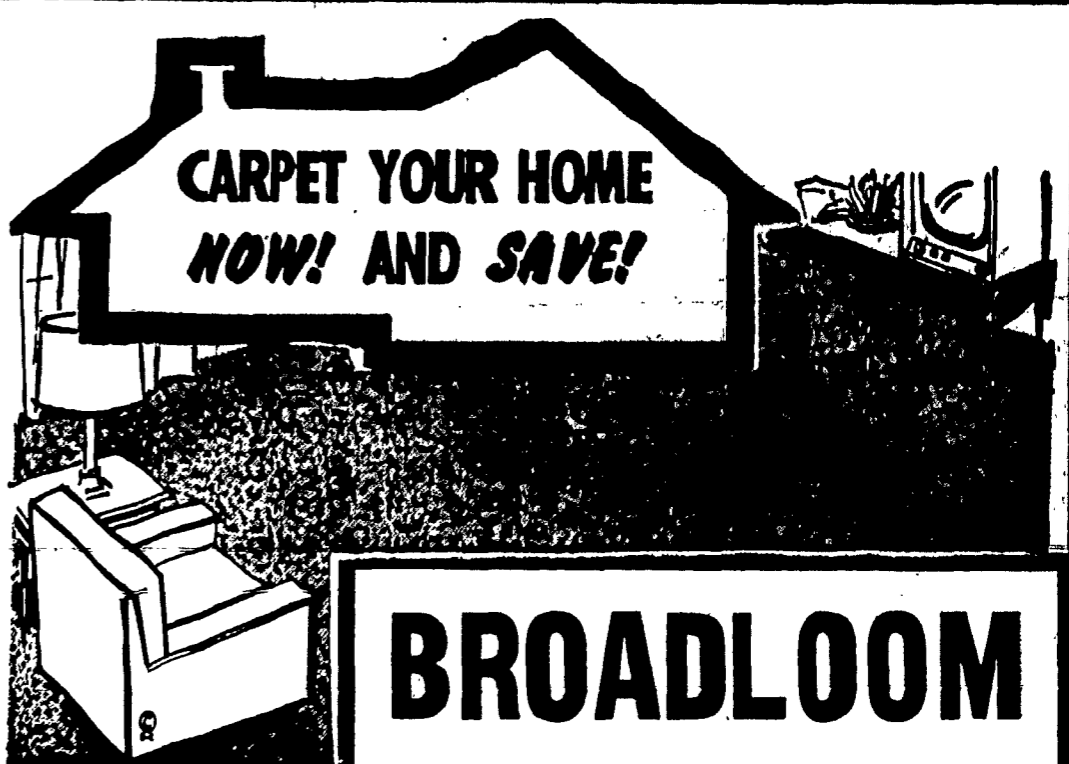
Construction cost of the school was approximately \$456,923 with the William E. Bouley Co., Inc., general contractors for the building. Other Auburn contractors were G. W. Hornbeck, plumbing; Peter Fisher, electrical work; and James J. Hickey, heating and ventilation. The fiberglass draperies were made by the H. R. Wait Company of Auburn. Beardsley and Beardsley of Auburn were the architects.

The school contains 34,600 sq. feet of floor space, is completely fireproof, and was designed for 18 classrooms. A large open

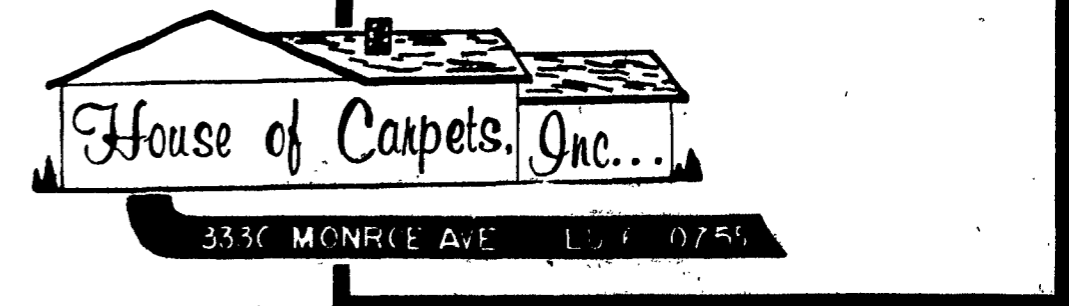
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
