

Jamestown Upsets Irish Aquinas Faces Tough Rival

Stunned early and often last week by underestimated Jamestown, Aquinas Institute is faced with the herculean task of trying to rebound against a strong Fulton team in tonight's game at Aquinas Memorial Stadium.

After opening with impressive wins over Corning (14-0) and Bishop Fallon (48-7), the Little Irish appeared to have lost its spark in the game against Jamestown.

THE RED RAIDERS took charge of the contest early, fell behind by one point when Jim Mahar raced 13 yards for the single Aquinas tally, scored twice to build up a 19-7 half-time margin and then withstood the Irish's belated bid to pull out the verdict. When the final whistle blew Jamestown left the field a 19-7 winner.

Only on occasion did the Irish show flashes of the type of play that carried them past their previous opponents this season.

Quarterback Bill Abel passed well when he had time to set himself, but he wasn't afforded this luxury on many occasions.

Halfback Pete Casartelli was Aquinas' most effective runner against Jamestown as he

picked up 78 yards and helped to set up the Irish touchdown. Aquinas had one other chance to score late in the last quarter, getting inside the Jamestown 12, but here the Raiders exerted strong pressure and the Irish lost the ball on downs.

While Jamestown was definitely an improved team after being soundly beaten by Cathedral Prep of Erie in its last

game, it seemed that the Irish grossly underrated their opponents.

The same mistake will not be made tonight. All week Coach Joe Repko worked his charges on the well-worn turf behind Aquinas with the emphasis on fundamentals.

LAST YEAR Aquinas handed Fulton a 35-7 defeat. Scouting reports this season indicate Fulton will be a tough club to beat. Fulton walloped Phoenix in the season opener, 32-0, and then bowled to Watertown in a hotly-contested game.

Repko may make some starting line changes before tonight's game but, chances are, he will start Casartelli, Mahar and John McCarthy, a junior, who showed great promise in Saturday night's game.

A pep rally and parade to the stadium will take place prior to the 7:30 opening whistle.

Aquinas Track Athletes Tops In Tri-Meet

Aquinas Institute, placing four of its team among the first six finishers, took the measure of McQuaid Jesuit High and a visiting Fordham Prep team from the Bronx (New York City) in a triangular meet at Cobbs Hill Saturday.

The Irish runners, led by Tim Boland and Dick Hogan, amassed a low score of 29 against McQuaid's 43 and Fordham's 54. Boland was the individual winner by 50 yards in 1:09.5.

Hogan kicked past John Krauer of Fordham Prep in the final 200 yards to take second place, and Aquinas' third man, Tom Becker, nipped Mike Connor of McQuaid at the finish to take fourth spot. Bob Boser, in sixth, and Ed Boehm, in 13th, completed the Aquinas scoring.

Connor, only a sophomore, ran 11:37 to lead a McQuaid team that finished almost as a unit. The Knights took eighth to eleventh positions, with Tom Harvey, Jim Fleming, Bill Herbert, and Dave Baldwin crossing the line within 6 seconds of each other.

The Aquinas-McQuaid cross-country rivalry will have a repeat performance on Nov. 4 when the two will meet in the Diocesan Championships.

The victory spark still awaits lighting as McQuaid Jesuit High's football team prep for its fourth outing of the season, a Saturday afternoon tussle at Livonia.

Jarred, 20-7, by two touchdowns passes and an intercepted lateral against Bishop Walsh of Olean last weekend. The Knights are still being shaken down in search of a winning combination. One of them, end Tom Green, figures to see a lot of action at the troublesome outside spot.

The offense continues to puzzle, dominating the play for most of the first half against Walsh, yet being held to 60 at intermission. A pass interception halted the Knights deep in Walsh territory in the second quarter, and the homesters proceeded to drive the length of the field to beat the clock by less than a minute for their first score.

In the third period, a fourth-down McQuaid pass gamble just missed connections and Walsh immediately passed for its second score.

TOM McLUUGH'S passing to Al Maher and Mike Digriggio carried the Knights downfield.
