**Next Step?**  
**'National' Church in Cuba**  
Havana — (RNS) — Increasing reports that a "National Catholic Church" would be established in Cuba followed in the wake of the expulsion here of Auxiliary Bishop Eduardo Boza Masvidal and 135 priests.

With less than 200 priests left to minister to the island's population, which is at least 90 percent nominally Catholic, it is expected that the government might make a move now to establish a Church patterned after the so-called National Catholic Church that exists in Red China.

At the time Castro came into power in January, 1959, there were about 800 Catholic priests in Cuba, of whom about two-thirds were Spanish-born. Most of the Spanish and other foreign-born priests have been expelled since then, almost 400 left after the ill-fated rebellion last April.

**CEREBRAL SOURCES** — when asked not to be named, pointed out that although the government might draw a number of "dissatisfied clergy" to fill the ranks of its own Church, it has not yet managed to enroll a single bishop — a necessary ingredient if the National Church is to bear a semblance of "authenticity."

This is so, they say, because a bishop, once elevated, has authority to ordain as many priests as he sees fit. This is a power which stays with a bishop regardless of his standing with Rome.

The Chinese Communists have made use of this, and it is believed the Castro government also would like to use the stratagem. About a year ago it was rumored that the Cuban leader had approached the late Bishop Alberto Martin y Villaverde of Matanzas, who died last November, to head a National Church, but the reports were subsequently denied by ecclesiastical and government officials.

Observers believe that the most obvious candidate to head the new church would be a priest who had been a member of the National Church and who had been expelled.

**Avoid Priest To Integrate**  
Detroit — (NRS) — Laymen are often more effective in "stabilizing" a changing area than a priest who unintentionally can be a "stumbling block" in integrating a community, two officials of the Detroit Archbishop's Conference for Human Relations told the Midwest Clergy Conference for Negro Welfare here.

They were the Rev. Raymond I. Maiberger, conference president and chairman of the Archbishop's Committee; and the Rev. Clement Kern of Most Holy Trinity Church, chairman of the committee's Community Relations Subcommittee.

Father Maiberger explained that the layman is most effective "because he's on common ground with everybody else. He has a house. The priest knows the teaching of the Church but he tends to sit back out of human respect for others."

Father Kern, meanwhile, said it would be "best to bypass the local priest" and select lay leaders in seeking to promote integration of an area. He recalled an experience where priests attended an integration meeting and were "murdered" by lay block captains. Later, he added, lay parish leaders contacted the block captains with better results.
