John J. Downs Requiem Offered By Priest-Son

Funeral Mass for John J. Downs was offered in Holy Rosary Church, Monday, Oct. 16 by his son, the Rev. Robert J. Downs, assistant pastor of St. John the Evangelist Church, Rochester.

Mr. Downs, 74, a 50-year member and former business representative of Local 86, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (AFL-CIO) died Oct. 13, 1961, at his home, 156 Aynoue E.

Mr. Downs is survived by his wife, Mrs. Maude Downs; another son, William L. Downs; his granddaughter, Barbara Downs and his brother Thomas E. Downs.

Army Doctor, Native Here, Dies at 54

Word has been received of the death of Colonel Marco R. Bonsignore, MC, Commanding Officer of the 20th Station Hospital in Europe on Oct. 5, 1961 following a coronary occlusion. He was 54.

A native of Rochester, Colonel Bonsignore lived at 1240 Clinton Avenue North when he entered the Army in 1940. He was graduated from Gettysburg College with a BS degree, and went abroad to earn his MD at the Royal University of Rome, Italy, and do postgraduate work in orthopedic surgery in Vienna, Austria.

He returned to Rochester for internship and residency training at the Monroe County Hospital, and was later visiting physician at the Rochester General Hospital, and at St. Mary's.

Colonel Bonsignore served as an orthopedic surgeon with the 26th Infantry Division in Europe during World War II, where he won the Silver Star for gallantry in action during the three major campaigns in which he took part: during the Korean War he was in charge of the Army's Orthopedic Center at Fort Campbell, Kentucky.

A MASTER OF the Italian language, the Colonel attended the Army Language School early in 1935 to learn Spanish, and then went to Venezuela for two years as Medical Advisor to the Venezuelan Army.

On his return he served as Commanding Officer of the U.S. Army Hospital at Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Md., until he went to Europe in July 1959.

Colonel Bonsignore was a member of the American Medical Association, the Rochester Academy of Medicine, Monroe County Medical Society and New York State Medical Society.

His wife, Alice, and their four younger children plan to remain in Europe for some time. The oldest son, Michael, a midshipman at the Naval Academy, Annapolis, will escort the remains to California for interment at Golden Gate National Cemetery at San Bruno. The colonel's mother, Mrs. Sam (Altagline) Bonsignore, now lives at 208 North Morada, West Cobera, California.
