- Grade 8—Introduction to the Bible—Sister Mary Evangelina, S.S.N.D., Holy Family School.

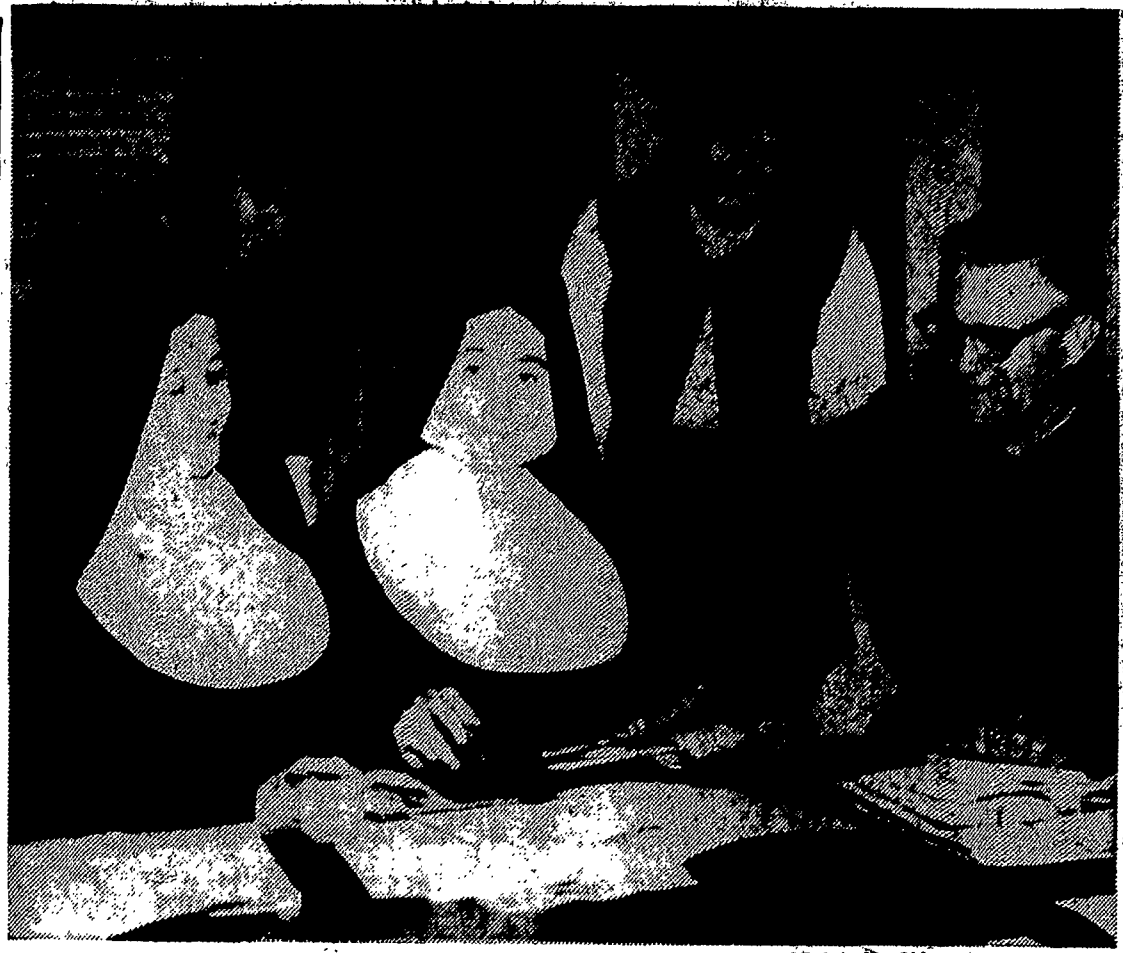
The latter part of the morning session concentrated on demonstrations on curriculum.

THE AFTERNOON session opened with Science Reading Associates' Laboratory in Action demonstrated by Sister Mary Cleopine, S.S.N.D., from Holy Family School. Sister Mary Cleopine specializes in SRA and, with about 30 children she illustrated the program through every phase.

During the lessons our philosophy was interwoven and the basic principles adhered to in every respect. The thirtieth annual membership campaign of the Catholic Youth Organization had an enthusiastic conclusion Tuesday night when the workers reported the record-breaking total of 4262 members for 104 per cent of the 4,100 quota. Later returns will increase this number substantially.

OF THE THREE groups of workers the special gifts committee headed by Brendan J. Meagher won top honors with 1802 members. The men's division led by Fred W. Sarkis was second with 1,461 members while the women's division, under Mrs. James I. Mooney and Mrs. J. William Quinlan reported 999 members. Congratulations to all workers were extended by General Chairman Joseph J. Miller and CYO Director Rev. Eugene H. McFarland.
