

Mercy Nuns Conclave At Motherhouse

The pros and cons of programmed learning seemed to be the most provocative conversation-piece at the Sisters of Mercy Fifth Annual Community Institute, held Oct. 13 at the motherhouse.

JEROME LYSAGHT of Eastman Kodak and the University of Rochester College of Education faculty, presented a lecture and demonstration of the teaching-machine approach to learning, a sequel to the lecture given at the diocesan institute last month.

Sister Mary Agnes, Supervisor of the Sisters of Mercy schools, conducted a principals conference, attended by the administrators of the 25 elementary schools conducted by the Sisters of Mercy in the diocese.

Departmental meetings were held in the fields of music, foreign language, and mathematics. A special session was conducted for in-service beginning teachers, geared to their special needs.

Under the chairmanship of Sister Mary Dominic, Catherine McAuley College Alumnae held a meeting devoted to study of the various religious sects popular in this country. Tolerance and sympathy were stressed as important aspects of the apostolizing process, in the spirit of the forth-coming Ecumenical Council.

The afternoon was devoted to the spiritual life of the community, under the direction of Mother Mary Bride, Mother General of the Sisters of Mercy.

New St. Mary's School Blessed In Auburn Rite

Auburn — Bishop Kearney dedicated St. Mary's School last Sunday afternoon, Oct. 15.

The procession of clergy and altar boys formed at the north entrance and marched to the south entrance where the blessing took place. The Bishop was escorted by Fourth Degree members of the Knights of Columbus.

HE WAS ASSISTED at the blessing of the school by Rt. Rev. Msgr. James D. Cuffney of St. Mary's who supervised the erection of the new building and Very Rev. Edward J. McNiff, the Bishop's secretary.

Monsignor Cuffney signed the contract for the erection of the building in September 1960. Classes were held in the new school for the first time on Sept. 6, 1961.

Attending the ceremony were Rt. Rev. Msgr. John E. Maney, chancellor of the diocese, Rev. William M. Roche, diocesan superintendent of schools, the priests of the Cayuga Deanery, and fifty nuns of the Rochester Diocese.

Also attending were Mayor Maurice L. Schwartz, City Manager George F. Train, State Senator George Metcalf, Members of the City Council, Superintendent of Auburn Schools Malcolm Reed, members of the Auburn Board of Education, principals of the public elementary and high schools of Auburn, representatives of the William E. Bouley Company, general contractors for the school, Beardsley and Beardsley, architects, G. W. Hornbeck, plumbing, electrical, heating and ventilation contractors.

BISHOP KEARNEY prefaced his talk with congratulatory remarks. He stressed the need of Catholic Elementary School education stating that there is "a stronger-than-ever need for proper guidance of young school children in the primary grades to know and observe the teachings of the church, and that the only proper way to fulfill this need would be on primary grade level."

Following the ceremony the parishioners and guests toured the new school. The school was designed for sixteen classrooms,

faculty room, library, health room and cafeteria. Nine classrooms are in use this year for 408 students. A large open area in the center of the building will serve as a cafeteria on one side, a chapel on the other and eventually this will be classroom space.

Sister Joseph Gilmory is principal of the new school. She is assisted by five nuns and three lay teachers.

The cornerstone of the school was laid on Sept. 15 in the presence of the nuns and pupils of the school. Monsignor Cuffney placed the cornerstone following the celebration of Mass in the school.

THE COPPER BOX which he placed in the cornerstone contained the names of the parishioners of St. Mary's, names and pictures of the children attending St. Mary's School in 1960-1961, a history of the parish from 1868 to the present time, history of the diocese with pictures of the Bishops, a copy of the sermon preached by Bishop McQuaid at the laying of the cornerstone of the old school, a copy of the Catholic Courier Journal dated September 8, 1961, and numerous clippings and pictures of activities of St. Mary's parish.

College Gets \$12,000 Grant From Kodak

Nazareth College of Rochester received \$12,000 from the Eastman Kodak Company as its share of the company's 1961 aid-to-education program.

Nazareth is one of the 58 privately-supported colleges and universities receiving direct and unrestricted grants this year from Kodak. The grants are based on the number of graduates from these institutions who joined Kodak five years ago and are presently employed by the company.

FIVE NAZARETH graduates qualified this year after five years of employment at Kodak. Grants amount to \$600 for each year of normal academic work successfully completed by each graduate to meet the requirements of a regular degree program.

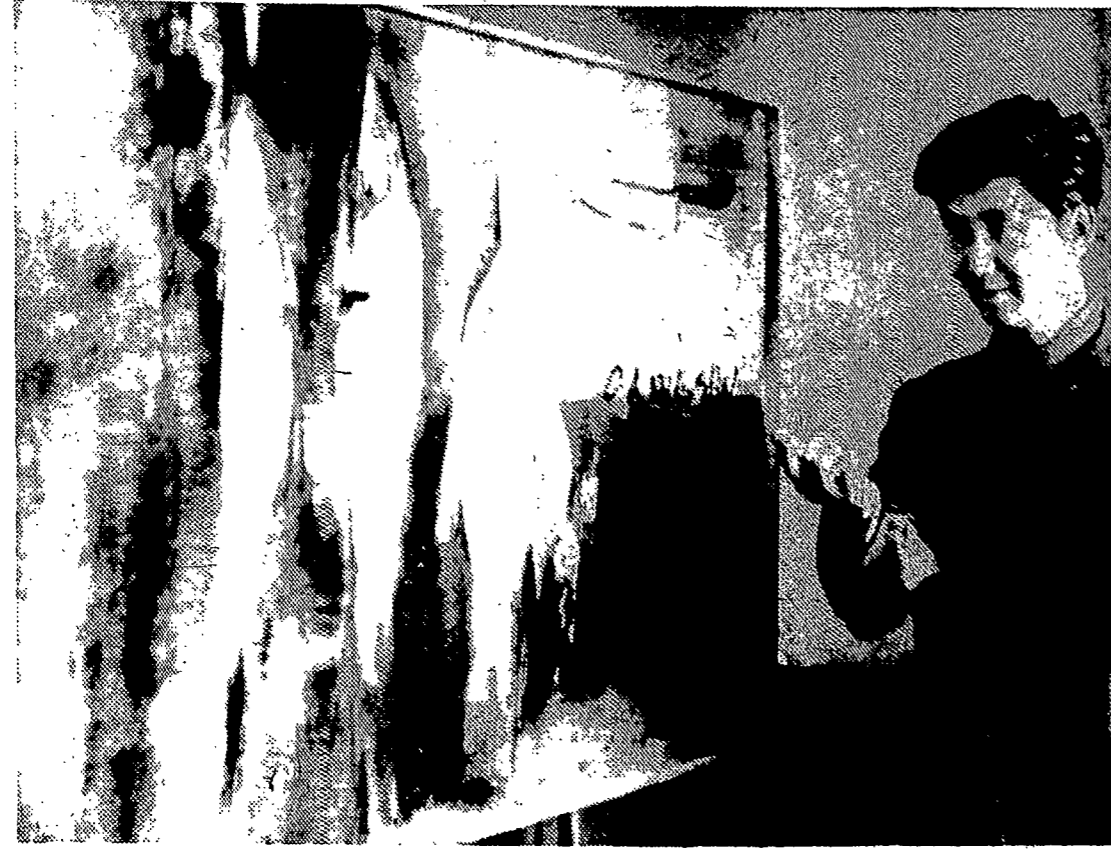
Nazareth also receives support from other corporations through its membership in the Empire State Foundation of Liberal Arts Colleges, an organization composed of 28 colleges in New York State. During the week of Oct. 30 presidents and directors of development of the affiliated colleges will call on corporation executives to discuss financial contributions for the coming year.

Two Worlds Blend In Art

"Beauty knows no boundary pass them on to my students," at Nazareth College, the young public will have a chance to see between East and West.

That's the philosophy of Ou Mi Shu (last name Ou, first name Mi Shu) 33-year-old visiting instructor in the Nazareth College art department. And he will offer some samples of how the two worlds can be delicately blended in a one-man art show to be held at the college from Oct. 22 to Nov. 22.

DURING THAT TIME, the public will have a chance to inspect a rich variety of oil paintings, water colors and mixed media which incorporate some of the Nazareth instructor's basic beliefs. Here are a few of the more important:

Beauty in art springs in beauty in life. Unless the artist can appreciate the beauty of life and understand people, their strengths and weaknesses, he will not be a true artist.

A young artist should not aspire to one school or norm of painting. These things can never be planned. An artist can only work toward truth and beauty from his own experience. If he does, he will eventually find his own "school" or group of artists with whom he shares common artistic beliefs.

All art should be a combination of dynamic and static qualities, a blend of the spontaneous and serene. These qualities are always present in a true work of art. They will vary in proportion as the artist himself changes in his outlook toward life.

One must live artistically in order to paint artistically. As the artist grows in experience and understanding, as he refines his life in the image of truth and beauty, his art will grow correspondingly.

"I have tried to incorporate these basic tenets in my own work and I am now trying to
