Top Award Given To Question 7

Assist — (RNS) — Catholics have given their highest film award to "Question Seven," a Lutheran movie.

The 1961 Grand Prix of the International Catholic Film Office went to the Lutheran movie after competition here in which an international jury of Catholic film reviewers spent a week evaluating feature motion pictures.

To be eligible for competition, films must have won prizes at other Catholic festivals or been nominated by national Catholic film offices.

"Question Seven," which was produced in Germany by Louis de Rochemont Associates for Lutheran Film Associates, both of New York, had already won several Catholic awards.

It earned the International Catholic Film Office Prize at the Berlin Film Festival, one of the four top awards at the London Catholic Film Festival, a "special accolade" and A-1 rating from the National Legion of Decency in America, and an endorsement from the Catholic Film Guild of Germany.

The movie, which depicts Communist pressures on a Protestant minister and his son in East Germany, was hailed by film critics in New York for its timeliness and dramatic impact in view of the present Berlin crisis.

At the film festival here, the jury was composed of experts from Canada, France, Germany, Belgium, Italy, Egypt, and Luxembourg.

Besides "Question Seven," the other American films considered in the final judging were "St. Francis of Assisi," "Hoodlum Priest," "Sunrise at Campobello," "Raisin in the Sun," "Pollyanna," and "The Sundowners."
