

Magazine Drive Over \$18,000 At McQuaid High

McQuaid Jesuit High School's annual magazine drive soared over its \$18,000 subscription goal at its conclusion last week. TWO CLASSES in sophomore year came close to doubling their quotas as the sophomores rolled up a school high of 120 per cent. The freshmen were close behind the 112 percent, followed by the seniors and juniors.

Mr. William Halligan, S. J. was school coordinator of the drive. Net proceeds are expected to exceed \$5,000, a sum that will enable McQuaid to continue its IBM report card system, purchase audio-visual equipment and school furnishings, and also place a fund at the disposal of the Student Council.

Foreign Affairs Analyst Scheduled At Nazareth

Henry C. Wolfe, who has just returned from another annual first-hand observation of Europe, will speak in the Nazareth College auditorium Thursday, Oct. 26, at 8 p.m. The lecture, which will be open to the public, will be on General Charles De Gaulle.

WOLFE FOUND that the rapid economic recovery of many areas of Europe has had profound political repercussions. While this progress is thoroughly admirable and certainly much needed, he feels that the changing political attitude constitutes a grave challenge for American foreign policy.



For more than 40 years, Wolfe has been one of the leading American foreign affairs analysts. He wrote "The German Octopus" and "The Imperial Soviets" long before the American political circles recog-

nized the dangers in those two countries' growing nationalisms. In June, 1939, he forecast the Nazi-Soviet Pact which was signed three months later; in November 7, 1941, he startled his audience at New York Town Hall by predicting that Japan would blitz us; and in July, 1955, he forecast the Hungarian anti-Soviet uprising which came 15 months later.

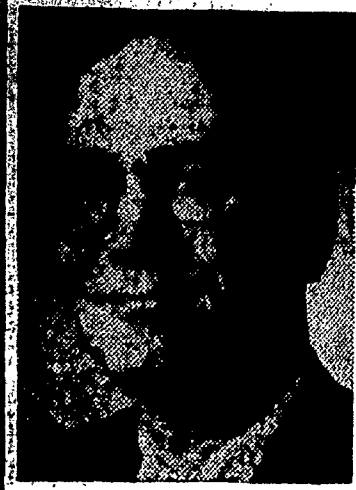
Wolfe has been decorated by eight foreign countries for his outstanding work in the field of international relations. HIS LATEST honors have come from Brazil, which awarded him the Order of the Southern Cross, the country's highest decoration; from Italy, which awarded him their highest decoration, the Order of the Star of Solidarity; and from France, which conferred on him the Legion of Honor.

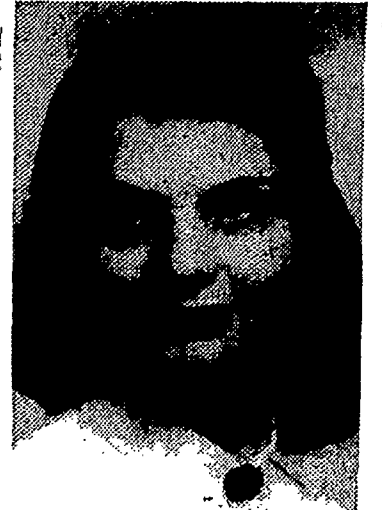
Bishop Offers Teresa Doyle Funeral Mass

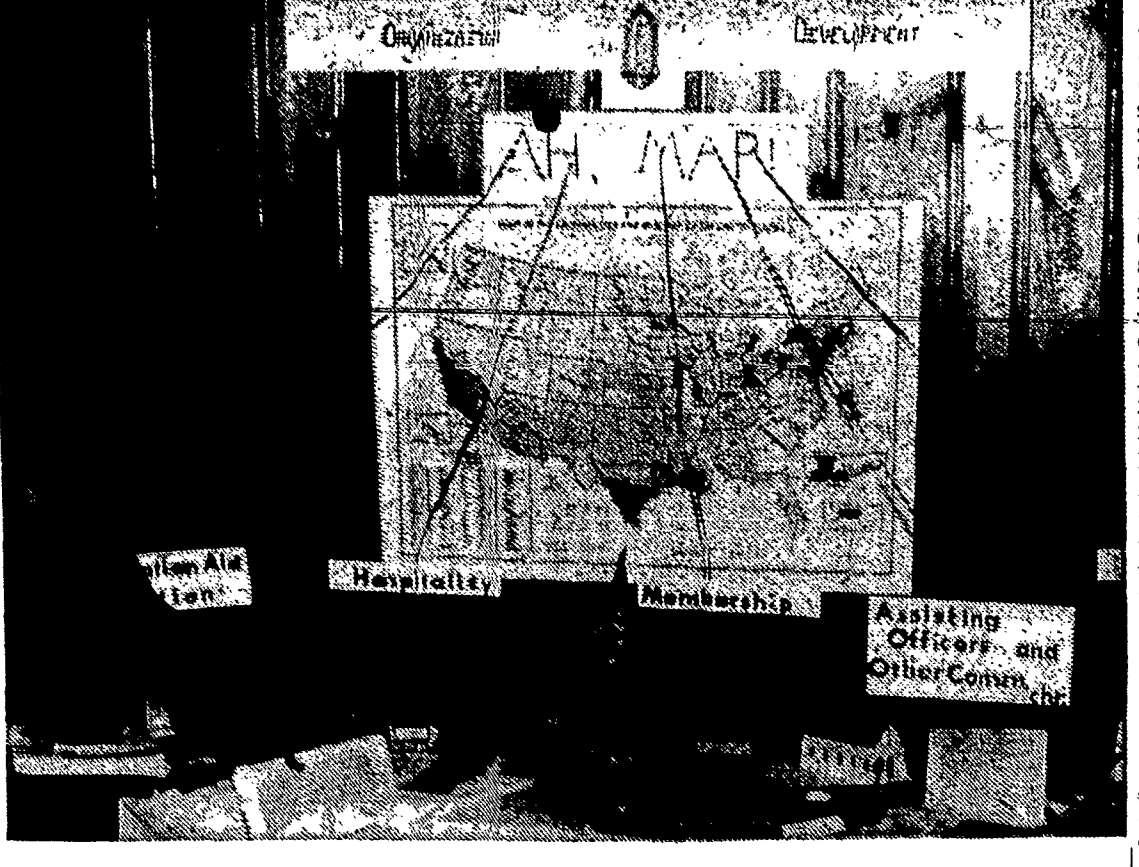


Exhibit At DCCW Convention
