

Alhambra Elects Slate, Plans Golden Jubilee

George R. Powers, assistant treasurer of the Genesee Brewing Company, residing at 5 Cricket Hill Drive, Pittsford, was elected grand commander of the Alhambra No. 25, Order of the Alhambra, at the election dinner meeting held at Our Lady of Victory Parish Hall on Tuesday, Oct. 24, succeeding Philip J. Randazzo, city fireman.

Other officers elected to the grand divan for 1961-1962 are: Joseph A. Wetzel, vice grand commander; William A. Tatyga, grand scribe; Philip J. Randazzo, scribe of the exchequer; Frank T. Domenico, grand chamberlain; Philip R. Winkler, master of the oasis; Donald J. E. Bopp, master of the ward; Alphonse Salvaggio, captain of the bodyguard; Daniel G. Tobin, sentinel of the tower; John J. Considine, centinel of the desert; and Francis X. Donovan, grand advocate. Rev. Edward P. Callens, SS. CC., pastor of Our Lady of Victory Church, is the grand chaplain of the group.

The Order of the Alhambra is a fraternal organization of selected Catholic men whose primary aim is the marking of historical Catholic sites and the education of handicapped and retarded children.

The local caravan has erected three historical markers in the Rochester area. A monument was erected at Dann's Corners on Route 15 in Honeoye Falls to commemorate the first Mass offered in Western New York, while a plaque was erected on the Eastman Kodak building, Platt St. and Plymouth Ave. N., marking the location of the first Catholic Cathedral, St. Patrick's, and a shrine was erected at Genesee St. and West Ave. in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary commemorating the establishment of the pre-Civil War St. Mary's Hospital by the Sisters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul and dedicated in memory of Past Supreme Commander Norman A. O'Brien.

Theatre News

Three Musicals

HOW TO SUCCEED IN BUSINESS WITHOUT REALLY TRYING — is a libellous title because no one ever chased success and scrupulousness with seascak palms, where the General with utters shudders of derelicts. From among them, however, emerges a Greek orphan whose cooking salvages the General's health and whose ingenious good will gives the General a new outlook.

From window cleaner to Chairman of the Board, Finch makes his circumlocutional way but always according to the Rules of the little book which gives its name to the play (from a story by Shepherd Meade).

EVERYTHING STEMS from the same point of view — the cheerful prodding of Big Business: the sets, the costumes, the types at Wicketts Inc.; such a toy — not a pet — not an erector set; the duet, "Love from a Heart of Gold" sung by Rudy Vallee himself as the great Mr. J. B. Biggeley and his latest trophy, Hedy, with the shape of a full blown hour glass, whom he deposits in the stenographer's pool to the distraction of the staff.

There is a gushing "Grand Old Ivy" between Mr. Biggeley and the alert Finch, who knows Ivy by hearsay and "The Brotherhood of Man" shouted out by the whole office force. The incidental dancing is brilliantly amusing and no tongue is ever removed from any cheek in Abe Burroughs and Frank Loesser's top musical except, we hope, in "Rosemary" which Finch sings without instruction from his book.

Theatre parties have taken over the stock of Wicketts Inc. until March but it seems certain that Bob Fosse's dancer will be dancing in 1962 and after. Have we made it clear that HOW TO SUCCEED etc. is the smartest show for many years?

MILK AND HONEY — has quite another viewpoint. In fact, an idealistic one of the young patriots who are reclaiming the Negev desert in Israel. Its weakest moments are its humorous ones. Of the two love interests, one is the bride who is trying to adjust her New York memories to frontier life for the sake of her husband who is splendidly sung and danced as well by Tommy Rall; the other, the melodic romance between a New York secretary, Mimi Benzel, and a New York business man, Robert Weede.

THE POPULAR Yiddish comedienne, Molly Picon is among a group of American widows on tour for a possible widower. Of course, Molly finds one but her niece, Mimi Benzel, flies home alone because Weede is a married man. Even if divorce is the suggested solution any deference to the moral code is unusual in musicals. From the small Yemanite shepherd in Jerusalem with his sheep, to the Hora for Independence Day, the desert wedding and dances, the athletic chorus and rousing chorales, MILK AND HONEY has a warm and wholesome atmosphere with Howard Bay's fine sets and Molly Picon disarming her years with her Yiddish.

LET IT RIDE — has no point at all except the mistaken one that music can be added advantageously to any play, even a farce. As a matter of fact, the original farce, THREE MEN ON A HORSE, was propped up by two capital character actors, Sam Levene and William Lynn. Sam Levene is still in his old gangster role but is hampered by the songs as is George Gobel as little Erwin, the greeting card writer who could guess winning horses. The heavy handed interpolation of some "Birthday Girls" is no help but a chorus of cops in a song and dance, "Just and Honest Mistake" revives Act II. But whenever the story perks up, an untimely lyric smotheres it.
